An Association of the Lord-Lieutenant, Deputy-Lieutenants, Mayor, Justices of the Peace, Aldermen, Common-Council, Clergy, Gentlemen, and others His Majesty's Subjects of the Town and County of Haverford-West. Presented to His Majesty by Brigadier Ferrers, in the Absence of John Barlow, Esq; their Representative in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Justices of Peace of the County of Aberdeen. Presented to His Majesty by Collonel Middleton, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Berkeley.

Which Association and Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Hague, March 3. The Treaty for renewing the Alliances between Great-Britain and this Republick, concluded at Westminster the 17 of last Month, having been transmitted hither, is according to the usual Forms sent to the respective Provinces for their Consent to its being ratified by the States General. On the 29th past, the Turkish Aga who has been here some time soliciting Satisfaction for a Ship taken about 5 Years ago by a Zealand-Privateer, having desired to make a Visit to the British Minister Mr. Horatio Walpole, was prevented by that Minister: The Aga received and entertained him suitably to his Character. Yesterday the Counts Schaesberg and Efferen, Ministers of the Elector Palatine, had a Conference with the Deputies of the States General for foreign Affairs, and communicated to them His Electoral Highness's Answer to the Terms on

which their High Mightinesses had proposed to consent to his Imperial Majesty's Cession of Limburg to him.

Edinburgh, Feb. 28. The Peers of Scotland having assembled this Day at Holy-Rood-House, pursuant to His Majesty's Proclamation dated the 6th of last Month, have chosen the Earl of Haddingtoun to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to Sit and Vote in the House of Peers of the present Parliament of Great-Britain, in the Room of the Marquis of Tweeddale Deceased. The Duke of Argyll having disposed the Troops under his Command, into such Quarters as are most proper for hindring the dispersed Remains of the Rebels from drawing together again in any Number, is come hither: And on the First of next Month His Grace will set out for London. Letters from Fort-William of the 19th Instant give an Account, that the Forces of the Rebels being all dispersed, the Earls Marshal, Linlithgow, Southesk, Viscount Killyth, Lord Tinmouth, and others of the Heads of them, came the Night before to Achinacarick, the House of Cameron of Locheel, Nine Miles from Fort-William, there to consult which way to take to avoid falling into the Hands of the King's Troops.

Sentenced to stand on the Pillory, to suffer Six Months Imprisonment, and Fined Ten Marks. Jane Cole, an old Offender, convicted of Publishing a false Bill of Sale, or Assignment, for the Wages of Henry Bradbury, Mariner, in the Edgar, being 43 l. 16 s. 3 d. The like Sentence. Ann Aaron, alias Orrin, Elianor Forrest, and Alice Joyner; the two last are old Offenders, were all Three convicted of Publishing a false Letter of Attorney, for receiving the Wages of Harvey Loudher, Mariner, in the William and Mary Yacht, being 42 l. 10 s. 2 d. The like Sentence upon each.
