Westminster, March 6.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Oldes, Gentleman-Usher of the Black-Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to the Bill intituled

An Act for the more easy and speedy Tryals of such Persons as have levied or shall levy War against His Majesty.

St. James's, March 9. The following Association has been presented to His Majesty.

An Association of the Lord-Warden of the Cinque-Ports, the Lieutenant of Dover-Castle, the Mayors, Bailiffs, Deputies, Jurats, Common-Council, Clergy, and other the Inhabitants of the said Cinque-Ports, two antient Towns and their Members, together with their Representative-Barons in Parliament. Presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Dorset and Middlesex, Constable of Dover-Castle and Lord-Warden of the Cinque-Ports, attended by the Representative-Barons in Parliament.

Which Association His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Vienna, Feb. 29. The Differences between the Emperour and the Republick of Genoa, are accommodated on the following Terms.

1. That all Subjects of His Imperial Majesty now serving in the Genouese Gallies, shall be discharged.
2. That the Senatour who insulted the Catalonian Officers shall be degraded, and be obliged to repair to Milan to acknowledge his Offence.
3. That Salt brought from Sardinia, and Landed at Genoa to be carried up into the Milaneze, shall pay no higher a Duty than one Crown the Measure of three Bushels, which before paid one and an half.
- And, 4. That they shall settle with General Zumjungen, and pay the Expence of the Motion, made by the Imperial Troops on this Occasion. Letters from Constantinople of the 9th Instant give an Account, that a Number of the meaner Sort of People had assaulted the House of the Emperour's Resident M. Fleischman, but some Jannisaries coming in seasonably, prevented their entering and plundering it, and the Grand Vizier sent to M. Fleischman to excuse this Outrage. These Letters continue to speak of the extraordinary Preparations which the Turks are making by Land and Sea. The Emperour's Army in Hungary, is to form a Camp the End of next Month.

Copenhagen, Feb. 29. Admiral Seeftedt is ordered to go to Pomerania, thence to bring-home the Flotilla and the Transports which were made use of in the Descent upon Rugen; only two Prames are to be left, and are to have their Station near Wismar. The Horse-

Guards and two other Regiments of the Forces which during the Frost came over from Holstein into Fuhnen, are ordered hither; and the rest are to return to Holstein, part of them being to be employed against Wismar, which is designed to be besieged in Form. All Diligence is used in fitting out a Squadron here of 12 Men of War. The Swedes are fitting out Ships of War at Carelsrona, and also at Gottenborough. 'Tis said his Danish Majesty will in a few Days pass over into Holstein, to go and meet the Czar.

Hambourgh, March 10. On the 29th of last Month the Czar arrived at Dantzick, and remained there when the last Letters came away. 'Tis expected the King of Poland will come thither, or to Thorn, to have an Interview with his Czarish Majesty, whose Troops that have been some time in Poland are said to be in full March to the Camp before Wismar, in order to assist in the Siege of that Place, for which Siege several Pieces of heavy Cannon are to be brought from Straelfund, as soon as the Roads become more practicable than they are at present. 'Tis also talked that the Czar proposes to have an Interview with the Kings of Denmark and Prussia.

Brussels, March 12. Yesterday Devenitz's and Count Maldeghem's Regiments of Foot, and this Day Prince Eugene's Dragoons; were reviewed by Count Vehlen, General of the Cavalry, and Commander in chief of the Emperour's Forces in the Austrian Netherlands; and they all made a very good Appearance: They will speedily begin their March, being designed to serve in Hungary. The Detachment of Stearne's Regiment of British Foot which was in the Castle of Ghent, lies at Ostend ready to embark for England, but is detained by contrary Winds.
