his farprizing Expedition he had chas'd the Enemy from our Gates, we saw his restless Vigilance carry him back in time to Stirling to bassle the Rebels Purposes, and drive them to their former Quarters.

Amidst the numerous Mischiefs which attended the late pernicious Rebellion, we find one Cause of Joy: It is, that we hope we have approved our Loyalty and Duty to the Best of Kings; and that by so doing, Your Majesty will credit us when we declare, that with Lives and Fortunes we ever will desend that Constitution whereby our Religion and Liberties are inseparably linked with the Maintenance of our Protestant Soveraign and His illustrious Family upon the Throne. Hambourg, April 10. 'Tis advifed from Copenhagen, that Vice Admiral Gabel after he has put a shore the Reinforcement of Troops with which he is failed for Norway, is to cruise with his Squadron off Gottenbourg. These Letters add, that the Swedes have not yet been able to make themselves Masters of Aggerhuys, for want of Artillery. On the 3d Instant the King of Poland arrived at Dantzick, and will stay there till the Czar leaves that Place, which he designs to do on the 14th.
