THE following Address has been presented to His Majesty by Mr. John Stirling Principal of the University of Glasgow, introduced by His Grace the Duke of Montrose, Chancellour of that University; and the said Mr. Stirling had the Honour to kiss His Majesty's Hand.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.
The Humble Address of the Chancellour, Rector, Vice-Chancellour and Principal, Dean of Faculty, and Professors of the University of Glasgow.

May it please Your Majesty,

WE are so sensible of the Divine Goodness in deliv'ring these Nations from the Ruine that threaten'd all that could be dear to them, by sitting Your Majesty on the Throne of Your Ancestors, and of the invaluable Blessings we enjoy under Your Majesty's auspicious Government, that we cannot but express our utmost Abhorrence of a Rebellion against so good and gracious a Sovereign, and well design'd to impose on these Realms a Pretender to Your Majesty's Crown, train'd up in all the Principles of Popery and Tyranny, to the utter Subversion of our Religion and Liberty, and manifest Danger of the whole Protestant Interest.

It is not surprizing, that the Pretender, managed by Popish Enemies Abroad, and prompted by desperate and attainted fugitives, should have dared to invade Your Majesty's Dominions, or that those who are act'd by a blind Zeal for Romish Superstition and Idolatry, should have kindled the Flame of this Rebellion; but that any who call themselves Protestants should have encouraged this open and flagrant Attempt in favour of Popery; and, without the least Provocation, fomented to traitorous an Enterprize against a Prince of known Zeal for our Religion and Liberty, who expresseth the most endearing Tenderness and Clemency towards all His Subjects, is most astonishing, and must needs fix a lasting Reproach upon them; and can be no otherwise accounted for, than as the natural Effect of these absurd and pernicious Doctrines, which have been of late so industriously taught and propagated by some, who, while they pretend to engross Loyalty to themselves, do, nevertheless, what lies in their Power to excite a Spirit of Sedition and Rebellion in all who are under their Influence.

With the greatest Pleasure we have observed the Divine Providence declaring against this desperate Undertaking, confounding all the Designs and Measures of the Rebels, defeating them both in Scotland and England, till at length the Terror of Your Majesty's Arms has put them to a precipitant Flight, and driven the Pretender out of Scotland, without daring to make the least Resistance; so that he and his Friends have the Mortification to see the Weakness of his Party, and how insignificant his Presence hath been, either to animate them, or to increase their Number. In all this, as we admire and adore the wonderful Mercy of God, who giveth Salvation to Kings, and with Hearts full of Joy presume to congratulate Your Majesty upon so remarkable a Series of Success, so we most humbly acknowledge Your Majesty's great Goodness in having the Dangers to which the Nation was exposed

so much at Heart, that neither the Rigour of the Season, nor any other Opposition of the Rebels, could divert Your Majesty from using all possible Endeavours towards putting a speedy and effectual End to this unnatural Rebellion.

On this Occasion, Great Sir, we beg Leave to assure Your Majesty, that as our Business hath been, so it ever shall be, to instill into the Minds of the Youth committed to our Care, such Principles as next to their Duty to Him by whom Kings Reign, shall engage them to a firm Allegiance to Your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, and steady Adherence to the Succession in Your Royal Family: And we shall never be wanting, by all Means proper for us, to the utmost of our Power to assert and defend Your Majesty's just and undoubted Title to the Crown, and the Protestant Succession by Law established, in Opposition to the Pretender, and all others who shall presume to disturb Your Majesty's peaceable Possession of it.

That all Attempts against Your Royal Person and Government may end in the firmer Establishment of Your Throne, and produce in all Your Subjects a deeper Sense of the Happiness of being under Your Majesty's wise and benign Administration; that the Almighty and only Wife God may confound and defeat all the Designs of Your Enemies at Home and Abroad; direct You to such Measures as the future Happiness and Tranquility of Your Subjects may be established on a solid Foundation; preserve Your Majesty to be the Father of Your People, a Blessing to all the Churches of Christ, and the Great Patron of Learning; and that the Crown may long flourish on Your Sacred Head, and afterwards be transmitted to Your Royal Progeny, even to latest Posterity, shall be the most hearty and fervent Prayer of,

The following Addresses have also been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and other Gentlemen, at the Assizes held for the County of Devon on the 26th of March 1716. Presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and other Gentlemen, at the Assizes held at Chard for the County of Somerset, on the 2d of April 1716. Presented to His Majesty by the Honourable George Dodington, Esq; His Majesty's Lieutenant of the said County, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Council and Representatives of New Hampshire in New-England, having been transmitted hither, has been presented to His Majesty by Colonel Burgess, introduced by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

All which Addresses His Majesty was pleas'd to receive very graciously.

Madrid, March 30. N. S. On the 26th Instant in the Morning their Majesties went from the Escurial, and arrived the same Evening at Segovia, where they design to take the Diversion of Hunting, and to return in a few Days hith. The cold Weather and the Snow incommoded them very much in their Journey to Segovia. Orders have been given to the Commissary General of the Cruzada to equip the 6 Gallies which are at Cartagena, that they may be in a Readiness to sail to Italy. 'Tis understood that they are intended to be sent to the Pope in order to be made use of against the Turks; and the said Commissary notwithstanding his Representations to the contrary, has had repeated Commands to hasten the Equipments as much as possible. The Bishop of Oviedo, who is accused of being a Follower of the Doctrine of Molinos, and has on that Account been censured in the Inquisition for these six Years is now sent for to Rome to have the Cause examined here, and an Inquisitor is ordered to go along with him. Advices from Cadiz tell us that the Marquis of Valero, Viceroy of New Spain sailed from thence the 18th Instant four Ships went with him, two whereof are to go to Vera Cruz, and two to the Havana, to take on board the Treasure which has been recovered from the Flota that was lately lost in those Parts. The Council of the Indies having dispatched these Ships, have now represented to the King the Necessity of sending to Buenos Ayres the Soldiers, and other Military Provisions some while since designed for that Garrison; but this Business will require Time for its Expedition. We hear from Barcelona that a Regiment of Walloons has been added to that Garrison, to help in carrying on the Works on those Fortifications.

Dublin, March 25. This Day the Parliament of this Kingdom met, pursuant to the Order of Adjournment of the 8th Instant, and adjourned again to the 3d of May next.

From the Camp at Blair of Athol, March 30. On the 27th Lieutenant General Cadogan arrived here with some of His Majesty's Troops; and was Yesterday joynd by Major-General Montesc with the rest of the Detachments which were expected. Since our Arrival, all the Rebels in these Parts, and in the Brays of Angus and Mar, who had not delivered up their Arms, have brought them in, and surrendered at Discretion. We have Advice from Colonel Clayton, who was detached with a Party into the Laird of Appin's Country, that the said Appin's Men and those of Glenco had given up their Arms, and submitted likewise at Discretion. Those of Badenoch, whither a Detachment was also sent, have done the same; so that all the Rebels between the Tay and the Spey, are now disarmed. The King's Troops have paid during the whole March for every thing that was furnished to them, and such exact Discipline has been observed, that there has not been the least Complaint.
