W Hereas Thomas Forfter Junior, late of the County of Northumberland, Elquire, who is a Perfor of a middle Stature, inclining to be Fat, well faped, except that be floops in the Shoulders, fair Complexioned, his Mouth wide, his Nofe preity large, bis Eyes Grey, fpeaks the Northern Dialett, and about Thirty Five Years of Age, was lately Apprehended and Committed to the Goal of Newgate for High Treafon, in Levying War againit Us within this Realm, dd, on Tuelday the Tenth Day of this Inflam April, make his Efcape out of the faid Goal; We therefore have thought fit, with the Advice of our Privy-Council, to iffne this our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and command-ing all our loving Subjects whatfoever, to ufe their utmoff Endeavour to difcover and apprehend the faid Thomas Forfter, and to carry him before the next Juffice of the Peace, who is hereby required to Com-mit him to the next Goal for High Treafon, there to remain till be fail be difficated by due Courfe of Law; of which fuch the Juffice of the Peace is bereby required to give immediate Notice to One of Our Principal Secretaries of State. And for the Encouragement of all Perfors to be digent and eareful in endeavouring to differe and apprehend the faid Thomas Forfter, We do bereby further de-clave fuelies of the Peace the faid Thomas Forfter, fail bave and receive as a Reward the sum of One Thoufand Pounds, which the Lords commiftioners of Our Treafury are hereby required and durefted to pay accordingly. Hamburg, April 14. As we have had no Letters from Norway for these three Posts, we have no fur-ther Advices of the Situation of Affairs in that Kingdom. Our Letters from Copenhagen of the 11th leave us likewife in the fame Uncertainty, they having had nothing from Norway for near a Forthaving had nothing from Norway for near a Fort-night, nor any News of the Frigate called the White Eagle, which carried feveral General Officers to that Kingdom. Vice-Admiral Gabel, who was hin-dred from putting to Sca the 4th, as he intended to do, failed the 7th, and paffed the Sound with the Squadron under his Command on the 8th about Four in the Morning with a fair Wind; and about ten or eleven Hours after a great Canonading was heard from the Northwards; which gives occafion to a Report, that the Danish Fleet met and engaged that of the Swedes from Gottenburg; but the Wind being contrary to the bringing any Intelligence of the Rea-fon of that Firing, nothing certain was known at fon of that Firing, nothing certain was known at Copenhagen con erning it when the laft Letters came away. The King of Denmark has given Orders to four Battalions more to hold themfelves in a Readipels to be transported to Norway. Some Advices fay, that his Danish Majesty is soon expected in fay, that his Danish Majetty is toon expected in Holftein, in order to proceed to Stettin; where, 'tis prefumed, he will have an Interview with the Czar aud the King of Prussiar Some of the Muscovite Troops arrived in the Camp before Wismar on the 11th, and the reft were expected the Day following The Danish General M. Dewitz having before fammoned the Governor of the Town to furrender, fammoned the Governor of the Town to furrender, and feeing him not include to it, went away to Lu-bec: But fince the Arrival of the Muscovites the faid

Governor fent his Aide de Camp with a Trumpet to the General, who not finding him in the Camp has fent an Express after him to Lubec.

Bruffels, Abril 18. The States General not being yet put in Poffestion of the Lands which are yielded to them by the Barrier-Treaty for an Extension of their Limits, they have deferred giving up the Civil Government of the Towns in their Poffession : Wherefore this being the usual Time of the Year for the Letting the Revenues of those Places to farm, Monseur Pesters, who at present takes care of the Affairs of the States General in these Countries, went Yesterday to Ipres, being likewise Intendant of that Chattelleny, to farm out the Revenues there for a Year. Monfieur Copieters, one of the Gouncellors of these Finances, went with him to look after the Emperor's Interest on this Occasion: For tho' the States General receive the Revenues of those Places at prefent, yet they are accountable for them to his Imperial Majefty, and mult deduct the Produce from the annual Subfidy of five hundred thouland Crowns allowed them by the 19th Article of the Barrier-Treaty. The two Imperial Regiments of Dragoons have received Orders to march very foon to Hungary; but we are affured that they will be replaced in a flort time by a greater Number of Foot, which is reckoned more fit for the Service of these Garrifons.

rilons. Hague, April 21. The Baron de Heems, Envoy-Extraordinary from the Emperor, has received a Letter from Count Kinigfegg, dated at Bruffels the zoth, giving an Account that the Day before he had an Express from Duffeldorp, with Advice that a Courier from Vienna had brought the agreeable News to the Elector Palatine of the Empress' be-ing happily and fifty delivered of an Arch. Duke. ing happily and fately delivered of an Arch-Duke. The separate Article of the Treaty for renewing the Alliances with the Crown of Great Britain, which came lately Signed from England, has been tranf-mitted by the States General to the fiveral Provinces in order to be ratified. Our Letters from Hampurg of the 17th tells us, that the Advices they had from Norway by the way of Copenhagen fay, that the King of Sweden had not made any further Progrefs in that Country for want of Attillery. They men-tion, that a Detachment of 700 Swedes, which had been fent to view the Pafles to the Silver and Copper Mines, had been beaten. They add likewife, that the Swedifh Magazine at Mofs had been furprized, with the Troops which guarded it; but as the Particulars were not known, the dathed it, but as the fail ticulars were not known, the Advices feem to want Confirmation. There is no further News of the fuppoled Sea-Fight, and Vice-Admiral Gabel is faid to be in Jutland, to take on board the Regiments of Budde and Cicignon. has offered to capitulate. Invernefs, April 6. Laft Night Lieutenam-General Cadogan arrived here; the Troops encamped at Muy within five Miles of this Place, and to Day they will march to Bordlam. This Example has had a very good Effect; for the Lieutenant-General has fince had an Account from Collonel Clayton, that the Camerans have laid down their Arms and fubmitted to Mercy; and Messages are come to him from Glengary and Capoch,

Lapoch, to let him know that they and their Men would do the lame: Whereupon a Party is fent to take Polleilion of Glengary's Houle, and receive the Arms of his Men and of Capoch's. The People of Clan Renald offer, likewife to deliver up their Arms and fubmit to Mercy. So there now remains none in Rebellion but Lord Sea-forth's Men and the Macdonalds in the Illands. forth's Men and the Macdonalds in the Islands. The Lieutenant- General defigns to order to Morrow a Detachment into Lord Seaforth's Country; and affoon as he goes to Fort William, which will be the 9th Inftant, he will fend Collonel Cholmley with 400 Men to the Illands; for which Service he has given Directions to prepare a fufficient Number of Boats at Fort William, to carry this Detachment to the Illands, under the Convoy of two imall Frigates which he had de-fired fhould be fent to Cary Lough, where we hear they are already arrived.
