THE following Addreffes have been pre-
fented to His Majesty.

An humble Adreff of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Juftices of the Peace, Clergy, Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of Lincoln, met at the Affizes held at the Caſtle of Lincoln, the 12th Day of March, 1715-16. Preſented to His Majesty by Sir Cecil Wray, Baroet, High Sheriff of the ſaid County, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Ancaſter, Lord Great Chamberlain of England.

An humble Adreff of the Provincial Synod of Aberdeen. Preſented to His Majesty by Mr. James Anderſon, Miniſter, and by Mr. James Robertſon, One of the Members of that Synod; introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viſcount Townſhend, One of His Majesty's principal Secretaries of State.

Which Adreff's His Majesty was pleaſed to receive very graciously.

Ratiſbon, April 23. The Emperor's Demand of an Aid for the approaching War with the Turks, which had been communicated on the 19th, was then propoſed in the Dyet, and the Diſpatch of it recommended by the Auſtrian Miniſter that the Reſolutions to be taken might be of Uſe and Effect for the preſent Campaign. Several of the Roman-Catholick Miniſters had already received Inſtructions to ſecond this Requeſt, as to the Succours in general; and the Palatine Miniſter declared in particular, that he had Orders to propoſe the furniſhing a compleat Body of 30000 Men, with all Neceſſaries; but finding the Imperial Court would rather have this Aſſiſtance in Money, or at leaſt in Infantry alone, he would wait for further Directions. On the 20th in the Morning Prince Lowenſtein received a Courier, with the Emperor's Orders to notify to the Dyet in Form, as he immediately did, That the Empreſs was brought to Bed of a Son on the 13th in the Evening, who had the Title given him of Archduke of Auſtria and Prince of Aſturias. Upon which the Dyet reſolved to congratulate His Imperial Majesty, and to return him Thanks for the Notification, by a general Concluſion. On the 26th Prince Lowenſtein will give a publick Entertainment on this Occaſion.

Copenhagrn, April 25. The 20th Inſtant we had Letters from Norway, which brought Advices from that Country as far as the 13th, of which the moſt material are, That at the coming away of the laſt Letters, Vice-Admiral Gabel was arrived with his Squadron in the Road of Flagge near Frederickſtadt, and that he intended to land his Troops in thoſe Parts; the Swediſh Army lay divided in three Bodies, the great and chief Corps being ſtill at Chriſtiania, and the two other ſmall ones, (of about 6 or 800 Men each) lying the one between Moſa

and Frederickſtadt, and the other between Swinfund and Frederick-Hall: It was preſumed that theſe two little Bodies would be in danger of a Deſeat, unleſs they quitted their Poſts; but, as we are ſtill inform'd, the Swedes ſeem to be providing for a Retreat, and particularly, they are making a Paſſage over the Swinfund, and have lately ſent General Aſchemberg with a Detachment of 600 Horſe towards Sweden, as it is believed, to ſecure ſome Paſſes, which are of Importance to favour their return home. We expect more circumſtantial Accounts of Affairs in thoſe Countries by our next Letters; in the mean time our Court appears very eaſy at preſent, as to the Iſſue of them. We had News here the 23d, by a Veſſel from Pomerania, That four Swediſh Men of War, and three Frigats, were ſeen near Yſtedt, and that ſeveral more were ſoon to follow them from Carlſcrona: This has increas'd our Application in fitting out the Ships deſigned for the Squadron in theſe Seas; two Men of War, which ſailed lately to get Intelligence, upon this Advice retired into the Bay of Kiog; four Ships of the Line will go to join them there, the 26th or 27th, in order to watch the Motions of the Swedes, whom ſome apprehend to have a Deſign on our Flotilla, or on our Tranſports, though we perſwade ourſelves, that they cannot fit out any conſiderable Force from Carlſcrona, ſo ſoon as it is given out. We expect every Moment the Poſt which is due from Norway.

Dantzick, April 22. The Czar and the King of Poland continue here. The King is lodged in the City, and is attended by his Guards; the Czar has his Quarters in the Suburbs, where a Number of his own Troops mount the Guard: He has in the Territory belonging to this Place 24,000 Men, beſides the 7000 which are marched towards Wiſmar. Theſe two Princes have had ſeveral Interviews, and their Miniſters are often in Conference. On the 15th Inſtant Sir Richard Vernon, Envoy Extraordinary of his Britannick Majesty, arrived here in 8 Days from Dresden. On the 19th the Marriage between the Duke of Mecklenbourg and the Czar's Niece, Siſter to the Princeſs of Courland, was ſolemnized. The King of Poland, and his Miniſters, as alſo all the foreign Miniſters here, were invited to it, and were entertained with all Magnificence at the Czar's Quarters.

Hambourg, April 28. The King of Denmark having been at Rendesbourg, is now gone to Huſum; but where the Interview between his Majesty and the Czar is to be, is yet uncertain. We have Advices from Petersbourg, That the Muſcovites have made themſelves Maſters of Cujanenbourg, after a long Blockade and a Bombardment. 'Tis the only Place that the Swedes remain'd poſſeſſed of in the Duchy of Finland.
