Ratisbon, April 23. The Emperor's Demand of an Aid for the approaching War with the Turks, which had been communicated on the 19th, was then proposed in the Dyet, and the Dispatch of it recommended by the Austrian Minister that the Resolutions to be taken might be of Use and Effect for the present Campaign. Several of the Roman-Cutholick Ministers had already received Instructions to second this Request, as to the Succours in general; and the Palatine Minifler declared in particular, that he had Orders to propose the furnishing a compleat Body of 30000 Men, with all Necessities; but finding the Imperial Court would rather have this Affistance in Money, or at least in Infantry alone, he would wait for further Directions. On the 20th in the Morning Prince Lowen-On the 20th in the Morning Prince Lowen-stein received a Courier, with the Emperor's Orders to notify to the Dyet in Form, as he immediately did, That the Empress was brought to Bed of a Son on the 13th in the Evening, who had the Title given him of Archduke of Austria and Prince of Assurias. Up n which the Dyet resolved to congratulate His Imperial Majesty, and to return him Thanks for the Notification, by a general Conclusion. On the 26th Prince Lowenstein will give a publick Entertainment on this Occasion.

Corenhagen, April 25. The, 20th Instant we had Letters from Norway, which brought Advices from that Country as far as the 13th, of which the most material are, That at the coming away of the last Letters, Vice-Admiral Gabel was arrived with his Squadron in the Road of Flagge near Frederickstadt, and that he intended to land his Troops in those Parts; the Swedish Army lay divided in three Bodies, the great and chief Corps being still at Christiania, and the two other small ones, (of about 6 or 800 Men each) lying the one between Moss

and Frederickstadt, and the other between Swinfund and Frederick-Hall: It was presumed that these two little Bodies would be in danger of a Defeat, unless they quitted their Potts; but, as we are still inform'd, the Swedes feem to be providing for a Retreat, and particularly, they are making a Passage over the Swinfund, and have lately fent General Afchemberg with a Detachment of 600 Horse towards Sweden, as it is believed, to secure some Passes, which are of Importance to favour sheir return home. We expect more circumstantial Accounts of Affairs in those Countries by our next Letters; in the mean time our Court appears very easy at present, as to the Issue of them. We had News here the 23d, by a Vessel from Pomerania, That four Swedish Men of War, and three Frigats, were seen near Ystedt, and that several more were soon to follow them from Carlscrona: This has increas'd our Application in fitting out the Ships defigned for the Squadron in these Seas; two Men of War, which failed lately to get Intelligence, upon this Advice retired into the Bay of Kiog; four Ships of the Line will go to join them. there, the 26th or 27th, in order to watch the Motions of the Swedes, whom some apprehend to have a Design on our Flotilla, or on our Trinsports, though we perswade ourselves, that they cannot fit out any confiderable Force from Cirlscrona, so soon as it is given out. We expect every Moment the Post which is due from Norway.

Dantzick, April 22. The Czar and the King of Poland continue here. The King is lodged in the City, and is attended by his Guards; the Czar has his Quarters in the Suburbs, where a Number of his own Troops mount the Guard: He has in the Territory belonging to this Place 24000 Men, besid's the 7000 which are marched towards Wismar. These two Princes have had several Interviews, and their Ministere are often in Conference. On the 15th Instant Sir Richard Vernon, Envoy Extraordinary of his Britannick Majesty, arrived here in 8 Days from Dresden. On the 19th the Marriage between the Duke of Mecklenbourg and the Czar's Niece, Sifter to the Princess of Courland, was solemnized. The King of Poland, and his Ministers, as also all the foreign Ministers here, were invited to it, and were entertained with all Magnificence at

the Czar's Quarters. Hambourg, April 28. The King of Denmark having been at Rendesbourg, is now gone to Husum; but where the Interview between his Majesty and the Czar is to be, is yet uncertain. We have Advices from Petersbourg, That the Muscovites have made themselves Masters of Cujanenbourg, after a long Blockade and a Bombardment. Tie the only Place that the Swedes remain'd possessed of in the Dutchy of

Finland.
