**H**IS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint Richard Curtis, Esq; Sheriff for the County of Berks, in the Room of Richard Lyfford, Esq; deceased.

*St. James's, April 30.* The following Association has been presented to His Majesty.

An Association of the Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Custos Rotulorum, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, and others of the County of Anglesey. Presented to His Majesty by Owen Meyrick, Esq; Member of Parliament for the said County, being introduced by the Right Honourable Hugh Earl of Cholmondeley, Lord-Lieutenant of North-Wales.

*Which Association His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.*

*Ratibon, April 27.* Monsieur Eyben, the Minister of Holstein Gottorp, has quitted that Service, and set out on the 24th for Osnabrug, where he is to be Chancellor to his Britannick Majesty's Brother, Duke Ernestus Augustus, the new elected Bishop. Yesterday Prince Lowenstein gave a Ball, a Firework, and other Marks of Rejoycing, on the Birth of the Archduke. Advices from Hungary say, that all the Imperial Regiments there were to be in Motion between the 15th and 27th Instant, and to be in their several Camps by the middle of next Month at farthest. The Places design'd for their Rendezvous are Wersch, Baya, Batfch, Futak, Segedin, Zongrad, Onoth, Great Waradin and Esbeck, from whence they can be drawn together into one Army in four Days time. Notwithstanding these Preparations, all the Letters from Vienna still speak doubtfully of the Rupture.

*Copenhagen, April 28.* Part of the Flotilla which was on the Coast of Pomerania, arrived here this Morning, in Number 116 small Transports, with two Gallies which served for their Convoy: The rest of the Flotilla, with the Prames, are expected in a few Days, four Men of War being ordered from hence to go and bring them under their Convoy. The Wind being contrary, we cannot yet receive any News from Norway. 'Tis said, a good Number of Russians will be brought hither from Dantzick, in some of the Czar's Transports; and that another Body of Russians is to pass over hither from Holstein.

*Hambourg, May 1.* Letters from Dantzick of the 25th past advise, that the Czar had been indisposed some Days; upon which Account the Entertainment that the King of Poland intended to give the new-married Duke and Dutches of Mecklenbourg, was delayed. The Ministers of the two Courts had frequent Conferences at the Field-Marshal Flemming's Quarters. To Day the King of Denmark dined at the Duke of Wirtemberg's in Itzehoe; and his Majesty is expected this Evening at Gluckstadt. 'Tis advised from Lubbeck, that the Russians have left the Camp at Wismar, and taken their March towards Holstein. 'Tis reported, that the Fortifications of Wismar and of the Fort of Walvis are to be demolished. A very great Quantity of Provisions and Forrage is got together in Seeland, where a Camp is marked out for a considerable Number of Men; which gives Ground to believe, that a Descent will certainly be made in Schonen. There are no Letters from Norway; but those of the freshest Date from Copenhagen tell us, that a Frigate was come from Norway with Major-General Wilster, who being Brother to Admiral Wilster that commands the Swedish Fleet, the King of Denmark has thought it convenient to remove this General from his Post: That 'twas reported General Lutzau had been reinforced with two Battallions; and that 40 Swedish Transport Ships, laden with Provisions and Ammunition for the Swedish Army, were arrived at a small Port between Bahus and Malstrand; whereupon the Danish Vice-Admiral Gabel had sent out some Men of War of his Squadron to attack them.

*Hague, May 5.* The States of Holland before they separated last Week, ratified the separate Article of the Treaty for renewing the Alliances between Great Britain and Holland; and the Ratification of some of the other Provinces is likewise arrived. The six Ships which are to be the States Proportion for the Baltick Squadron, will be ready to sail, as it is thought, about the Middle of this Month. The Instructions to their commanding Officers will, we hear, be the same as they were last Year. A Gentleman is arrived here Express from Vienna, with a Letter from his Imperial and Catholick Majesty, to notify to the States-General the Birth of the Archduke Leopold. The Emperour gives them their usual Titles of High and

and Mighty, and the Letter is in general drawn up in very obliging Terms, much to the Satisfaction of this Republick: The States have ordered a Present of 600 Florins to the Person who brought it.

*Inverness, April 18.* Yesterday Lieutenant-General Cadogan received an Account from Col. Brooke, who commands the Detachment sent into the Earl of Seaforth's Country, that the greatest Part of that Earl's People had surrendered at Mercy and brought in their Arms, and that he believed the rest would do the like before the End of the Week: So that all the Clans, except those of the Western Isles, being now reduced, and Col. Cholmeley being gone to those Isles with a Detachment from Fort-William, the rest of His Majesty's Troops are ordered to return to their respective Quarters. The Lieutenant-General will stay here himself some Days, in order to go to the Isles, if by the Accounts which he shall receive from thence he find that His Majesty's Service requires it.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the Eighth and Ninth Years of the Reign of his late Majesty King William, it is enacted, That after the 25th of March 1697, no Silver Vessel, Plate, or Manufacture of Silver, shall be wrought or made less in Fineness than 11 Ounces 10 Penny-Weights of fine Silver in every Pound Troy: Nor Sold or Exchang'd, it made after that Time, (unless it be silver Wire, or small Things not capable of receiving a Mark) until the same hath been mark'd with the two first Letters of the Surname of the Worker, and with the Marks of the Company of Goldsmiths, London, (being a Lion's Head crested, the Figure of a Woman, commonly call'd Britannia, and a Mark denoting the Year) under the Penalty of Forfeiture thereof. And whereas several Workmen, notwithstanding the said Act, do frequently work up and vend divers Wares and Manufactures of Silver, being one third Part worse than the said Act directs, to the great Detriment of His Majesty's Subject, and Discredit of the said Trade; (t e new sterling silver looking much cleaner and whiter, and wearing better than Silver of a courser Alloy:) There are therefore to give Notice to all Persons that Work, Buy, or Sell any Wares or Manufacture of Gold or Silver, That the Wardens of the said Company of Goldsmiths, London, are resolv'd to Prosecute all such as shall Work or expose to Sale any Vessel or Manufacture of base Silver contrary to the said Act, with the utmost Rigour of Law.
