His Majesty's Commission, appointing His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales Guardian of the Kingdom of Great Britain, and His Majesty's Lieutenant within the same during His Majesty's Absence, was this Day, by His Royal Highness's Command, opened and read in Council.

This Day the Right Honourable John Aislacie, Esq; was, by Command of His Royal Highness, Sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Warsaw, July 30. By Letters from Lublin of the 26th Instant we have Advice, that the Confederates have agreed to a Cessation of Arms; but that the Publication of it is to be deferred, till Lemberg and Zamosch be evacuated by the Saxons. The Demands of the Confederates are so high, that 'tis likely the Conferences there may continue longer than was at first believ'd. The Persons against whom they express the most violent Resentment are the Crown-Generall and the Palatine of Culm. The first they have in their Custody, and have sent him Prisoner to Caminiec, in order, as they give out, to try him for his Lite; and they insist that the other shall be divested of all the Honours and Dignities he holds in the Republick. The Saxon Troops hold themselves in a Readiness to march, and are to draw together at a Place called Koulm, 12 Miles from this City.

Ratisbon, July 9. Letters from Esleck of the 21st of last Month, say they had no certain Advice from the Frontiers on the Save, but were positively assured from Belgrade, that no new Forces were arrived there before the 14th. The Aga of the Janisaries was expected, as some said, with 30, and others with 50000 Men, Horse and Foot, as soon as the Ovens which were building there for the Army could be ready; and would then be followed by the Grand Vizier, who was still at Nissa. The Imperial Resident was said to be fetched from Constantinople, and to be with the Grand Vizier. On the 20th a very great firing at Belgrade had been heard, but was said to be for some Advantage the Turks had gained over the Venetians at Sea, and not for the Arrival of the Grand Vizier. We have Advice, that the Elector Palatine will stay about 2 Fortnight at Inspruck, to perform the Obsèques of his late Brother, and will then make a Tour to Vienna, and return to Inspruck before he sets out for his Residence of Duffeldorp. Count Gergy, the French Plenipotentiary to the Dyet, having been for some Days with the Elector of Bavaria at Munich, arrived here on the 6th Instant.

Brussels, July 17. On the 11th Instant the Marquis de Croissy, late Ambassador from the Court of France to the King of Sweden, arrived here from the Hague, and on the 15th went hence for Paris: Count Kinnigegg caused the Honours usually paid to Ambassa-

dors in this Country to be given him; accordingly the Guards saluted him, the Drums beating a March, and the Cannon of the Town was fired at his Departure. The Magistrates of this Place have seized the Goods of several Jews who reside and trade here, under Pretext of an old Placart which has lain dormant these 40 Years past: 'Tis believed they will restore the Goods, but banish the Jews from hence, unless the Government interpose their Authority. M. Chanclos, who is Colonel of a Regiment of Dragoons in the Service of the States-General, was this Day declared Major-General in his Imperial and Catholick Majesty's Service, and continued Governor of Oudenarde. Letters from Vienna tell us, that Prince Eugene of Savoy set out the 1st Instant from thence, to take on him the Command of the Imperial Army in Hungary; that the Day of the Marquis de Prié's Departure from the Netherlands was still uncertain, but 'twas supposed he would not stay above 14 Days longer at Vienna, having received all his Dispatches.

Hague, July 17. On the 15th Instant the States of this Province of Holland began their Sessions. They have filled up several vacant Employments in their Troops; particularly, Captain Paterfon is made Major of the Scotch Regiment commanded by Brigadier Douglas, and Captain Brody (who served as Aide de Camp to my Lord Cadogan in Scotland) is made Major of the Scotch Regiment commanded by Sir James Wood. The Courier which the Emperor had sent so long ago to the Port, to know the Sultan's last Resolution for Peace or War, arrived by Sea at Marseilles on the 28th of last Month, having left Constantinople the 22d of May. M. Collier took that Occasion of writing to the States, an Account of Affairs at the Port, and has sent them a sort of Manifesto drawn by the Turks, in the Nature of a Declaration of War against the Emperor. We have Advice from Paris, that the Prince of Portugal having received there a considerable Sum, remitted to him by the King his Brother, was gone incognito towards Germany, in order to go to the Court of Vienna, designing ('twas said) to make the Campaign in Hungary.

From on board the Assistance, in Margate Roads, July 10, at 12 at Night. The Squadron of Men of War commanded by Admiral Aylmer, consisting of the Monk, York, Superbe, Royal Anne Galley, Launceston, and this Ship, were appointed to attend the Yachts, with which His Majesty sailed from Gravesend on the 7th Instant about 3 a Clock in the Afternoon. We all made the Coast of Holland on the 9th in the Morning a little after 5 a Clock, and about 6 brought to, waiting for the Tide. At 10 we made an easie sail for the Maese, and stood in with the Yachts till half an Hour past 1, when being as near the Bar as we durst venture with our Ships, we paid our Salutes to His Majesty, and clapping upon a Wind stood off into deep Water and anchored. We saw the Yachts all Anchor safely in the Maese, and about 4 in the Afternoon saw the Royal Standard on board the Carolina struck, which was the signal of His Majesty's going ashore. Soon after which, Captain Vernon (commanding this Ship the Assistance) was ordered by the Admiral to make the best of his Way to Sheerness, and to send to Court by Express from the first Port he should make, an Account of His Majesty's having landed in Holland. Accordingly weighing anchor yesterday in the Evening we sailed, and came into these Roads at 12 this Night.

Deal, July 11. His Majesty's Ships the Monk, York, Superbe, Royal Anne Galley, and Launceston, as also the Assistance, are come into the Downs.

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Exprefs from Margate, with an Account of His Majesty's safe Arrival in Holland.

Whereas Felix O Connor, an Irishman, and Elizabeth Barber, Widow, were severally convicted at the last Sessions held at the Old Bailey, London, for pulling false Powers, with intent to have received divers Sums of Money due to several Seamen for their Allowance, in His Majesty's Ship the Speedwell, and were respectively sentenced to stand in the Pillory, to suffer 6 Months Imprisonment, and the Man fined 20, and the Woman 10 Marks; It is thought proper to give this publick Notice, to deter others from the like Offences.
