Vienna, Nov. 7. The Imperial Army is separated, and Prince Eugene is expected here on the 9th or 10th Instant. General Mercy is to march with 12 Regiments of Horse and 12 Battallions, to possess himself of Panzova, Vipalanca, and Orfava: And General Steinville, who is ordered with another Body towards Transylvania, is to support him if Occasion require. The rest of the Troops are all to have their Winter-Quarters in Hungary, that they may be the nearer at hand for the ensuing Campaign; and 'tis reckoned Siege will be laid to Belgrade before May. The Turks proposed a Suspension of Arms, by an Imperial Courier whom they had detained some Time and sent back hither a few Days ago; to which Answer was returned, that this Court would

not hearken to any Offer of Peace or Truce with the Turks, before they had set at Liberty the Resident M. Fleischman: But before this Answer reached them, they had actually dismissed him, and he arrived at Peterwaradin on the 31st past; but we do not yet hear that the Turks have sent any Proposition by him. On the 4th Instant died here the Archduke Leopold, 6 Months and 22 Days old, to the great Grief of the Imperial Family and of all good Subjects.

Hambourg, Nov. 13. On the 10th Instant in the Afternoon, the Czar arrived at Lubeck; and at his Entrance was received with a triple Discharge of the Artillery on the Ramparts. His Czarish Majesty was accompanied by Prince Dolhorouki, Felt-Marshal Czeremetoff, and General Ween; the two latter arrived here Yesterday, but will return to their Master to Morrow. The same Evening the Czar's Consort likewise came to Lubeck.

Berlin, Nov. 14. On the 8th Instant Sir Richard Vernon, His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the King of Poland, arrived here from Gohr. Yesterday M. Spearchen, Minister of the King of Great Britain as Elector of Hanover, had Audience of the King of Prussia at Wusterhausen, and will return to his Majesty at Gohr to Morrow Morning. The Czar having staid a Day or two at Lubeck, designed to be this Evening at Schwerin, to rest there till the 17th, and to come on the 18th to Havelberg, a little Town on the Elbe, where he has agreed to have the Interview with the King of Prussia, who has ordered 200 Horses to be ready at every Stage for him and his Retinue. His Prussian Majesty will go directly thither from Wusterhausen on the 18th, and will take with him his three chief Ministers for foreign Affairs, Count Denhof, M. Printz, and M. Ilgen: Count Golofkin, the Russian Minister, and M. Manteuffel, the Polish, Envoy, are likewise to go thither. If the Hereditary Prince of Wirtemberg should arrive here before that Time, the King of Prussia will pay him a Visit in his Way. His Prussian Majesty has granted

granted free Passage through his Territories for the Saxon Troops from Poland, which M. Manteuffel solicited by a Memorial some Days ago. The last Letters from Warsaw are of the 6th Instant; the general Act of Pacification was not then signed, but as each particular Article had been subscribed by both Parties as soon as agreed, and all of any Consequence were already adjusted, it was looked upon to be as good as finished. General Bauer, with his six Regiments of Muscovite Dragoons, is arrived in Great Poland.

From on board His Majesty's Ship the Cumberland, in the Road at Copenhagen, Nov. 14. On the 28th of last Month Sir John Norris, with the British Squadron under his Command, and the Danish Men of War commanded by Count Guldenlew, arrived at Bornholm; on which Day the two Cruisers which Sir John Norris had sent to Carlscrona, returned to him, with an Account, that they had seen the Swedish Fleet with two Flags and seven broad Pendants in Carlscrona, and all the Ships they could discover lay rigged; as also, that they had three Cruisers under Sail off the Port. That Night Sir John Norris sent those two Cruisers, being the best Sailers of his Squadron, to Dantzick to hasten the Trade down the Baltick, and if they found the six British Men of War and all the Merchant Men had joined there, to order the Commadore not to lose a Moment that could be made use of for sailing, but to proceed. Those Cruisers arrived at Dantzick on the 30th, where they found the British Men of War and the Trade; which on the 31st all sailed from Dantzick with a fair Wind at S. S. E. but it veering to the Westward, they anchored that Day without the Heel, in order to take the first Opportunity of Wind. The Cruisers came on, and on the 3d Instant one of them arrived at Bornholm. On the 9th the British Men of War with the Trade joined Sir John Norris's Squadron at Bornholm, (having sailed from the Heel of Dantzick on the 4th of this Month,) and the next Day came all with him into the Road of Copenhagen. On the 12th arrived the Dutch Trade with their Convoy, which had been obliged to stay after ours at Dantzick for Provisions. All the Merchant-Men will be cleared by to Morrow at Elsenour; and Sir John Norris will take the first Opportunity of Wind to sail for Great Britain.

G. complaining of indirect Practices among some of the Tide-men of this Port, do hereby give Notice, That if the Writer of the said Letter will appear at the Board, at the Custom-House, and make out what he alleges therein, he shall have all fit Encouragement.

Whereas by several Statutes made in the Reigns of the late King William and Queen Anne, to prevent clandestine Marriages, there are the following Penalties, viz. 100 l. on every Clergyman who shall marry without publishing the Banns of Matrimony, or a Licence first obtained, 10 l. on every Man so married, and 4 l. on every Clerk or Sexton assisting at such Marriage; and whereas four Clergymen have, contrary to the said Statutes, married several Persons about the Prison of the Fleet, two of which have absconded from Justice, and the other two are now under Prosecution for their said Offences: These are to caution all Clergymen, Clerks, and Sextons to avoid the said Penalties, the said Statutes being intended to be put into Execution in the strictest Manner for the Time to come.
