Fleifchman is arrived here, but without any Sort of Overture from the Turks. On the 2d Inftant M. Bentenrieder fet out from hence for Hanover, with a private Com-miflion from the Emperour to the King of Great-Britain. Since last Post we had the Particulars of the Surrender of Vipalanca, which was done in fo unufual a Manner, that it is worth taking No-tice of. Affoon as General Mercy appeared be-fore the Place, the Turks offered to furrender it to him upon his own Terms, telling him, that they could have retired before he came up, but that they staid on purpose to prevent the Raf-cians from setting Fire to the Town, as they had done to the Suburbs; and that they would deli-ver up to him two of their Chiefs who had formed that Defign, that he might punifi them according to their Deferts; adding, that they defired him only to give them a Receipt in Writing for the Place, in the Emperour's Name: Which he did, and then allowed the Garrifon to go fafe to Belgrade. The News of the Seraskier of Belgrade's having been put to Death by the Janifaries, is confirmed. By Letters from Buda of the rft In-ftant we learn, that after the taking Polleffion of Vipalanca, General Mercy having advanced to Orfova, it was immediately furrendered to him; and by the next Advices we expect to hear that

and by the next Advices we expect to hear that our Troops are possed of the adjacent Island, which will be of very great Advantage to us. *Copenhagen, Dec.* 5. The Squadron command-ed by M. Tordenschild, with the Transports, de-figned for Norway, failed from hence on the 1st back and the post Day for inter the North Instant, and the next Day got into the North Sea; but afterwards the Wind changing, they were obliged to come back into the Sound, where

they fill continue, as does alfo the Dutch Fleet, waiting for a fair Wind. Berlin, Dec. 12. On the 8th in the Evening the Marriage between the Prince of Wirtemberg and the young Princels of Schwedt was celebrated at Court. All the Ministers and Persons of Quality of both Sexes were invited to affift at the Cere mony : The King and Royal Family Supped that Night alone, and the Ladies and Gentlemen had feparate Tables provided for them; after which they danced till Midnight. The next Evening there was a great Table in the Fashion of the Prince and Princes's Cypher, for 50 Couple, and the King himself with the other Gentleman drew

Lots for their Places and Partners, as they likewife did the third Evening, the Balls continuing both times till near One a-Clock. On the 14th the Margravin Philipe gives a great Entertainment to the King and the new married Pair ; and on the 16th the Prince with his Lady fet out for Stutgard. M. Schlippenbach waits on them first to the Frontiers, and then in a few Days will fol-low to the Court of Wirtemberg. The King has given the Princess 6000 Dollars to buy her Wedding-Cloaths, a very fine Coach of the late Queen's with fix Horfes, and 40000 Dollars for her Fortune. The Prince has received a Prefent of two Saddle-Horfes with all their Furniture, is to have the first Regiment vacant, and, as 'tis faid, will be made Stadt-holder of Cleves, as the Here-. ditary Prince of Heffe Caffel was on his Marriage with the Daughter of the late King. On the 10th Instant Count Golofkin arrived here from Schwe-rin. Letters from Warfaw of the 4th Instant fay, that tho' most of the Senators and Deputies who are to form the Dyet, were arrived there, the Confederates, before they proceeded, had made fome new Demands to the King, by the Cardinal Pri-mate, the Chief whereof are, That the Saxon Troops fhould be immediately ordered to march to the Frontiers, and that the King fhould ufe his best Offices with the Czar for having the Mufcovites withdrawn, or in cafe they failed, fhould join with the Republick to oblige them to it by all poffible Means. Sir Richard Vernon, His Britannick Majefly's Envoy, fets out to Morrow for Drefden, either to wait there, or proceed to Po-land, according to the Advices he shall receive of the King of Poland's Journey. Bruffels, Dec. 16. The Marquis de Prié having

thought fit to take the Administration upon him, on Sunday the 29th of November his Excel-lency heard the first publick Mass at St. Gudule's Church, as the Governors of these Provinces usually do on the like Occasions. On the 30th he dispatched Circular Letters to the respective Provinces and Councils, to notify his Entrance on the Government, and fent Copies of his Patent to be registred by the Council of Finances, the Chamber of Accompts, and by the States and Council of Brabant; and on the ift In-ftant he was complimented by them respectively. Some time before Count Kinigfegg gave up the Administration, he defired the States of Flanders to advance 300000 Florins to fubfift the Imperial Troops, on Account of the Subfidy for the enfuing Year: But they declined complying with his Demand,

Demand, in hopes to make a Merit of granting it to the Marquis de Prie, who has already raifed 400000 Florins on his own Credit; which Sum 4:0000 Florins on his own Gredit; which Sum he defigns to diffribute amongft the faid Troops. This Supply comes very feafonably to them, they having been ill paid, ever fince their Arrival in the Netherlands: And it will give the Marquis time to confider of proper Means for their future Subliftance. His Excellency has not yet formed any Plan for the Administration of the Govern-ment. But continues the Provisional Direction ment : But continues the Provisional Direction, in the fame Manner, as Count Kinigfegg did. The States of Flanders, and the President with a Deputation of the Council of that Province, are come hither from Ghent, and on the 5th they made their Compliments of Congratulation to His Excellency on his Entrance on the Government; as did the States and Councils of the other Provinces the 7th, on the fame Occasion. On the 5th Inftant at feven of the Clock at Night, the Marchionels de Prié arrived in this Town. Count Vehlen, Commander in Chief of the Im-perial Troops in these Countries, having lately received Orders from Vienna to pay the same Honours to the Marquis de Prié as are due to the Governor General; the Count ordered Wef-terlo's Regiment of Horle to receive the Mar-chionels without the Gate, and an Officer with chionefs without the Gate, and an Othcer with 40 Horfe to conduct her from thence to her Houfe: The Street from the Porte de Louvain to St. Gudule's Church, was lined by Maldeg-hem's and Hartop's Regiments of Foot, and the was faluted with a triple Difcharge of the Can-non of the Town. The Marquis de Prié has appointed M. Vanderhaghen, who was for-merly one of the Council of State, M de Groef, a Counfellor of the Grand Council of Mechlin and M. Wevnants, a Counfellor of the Mechlin, and M. Weynants, a Counfellor of the Council of Brabant, in Form of a Privy-Council, ad Interim, to affift him with their Advice in the Affairs of Juffice; and they entered on that Funfion the roth Inflant.
