Demand, in hopes to make a Merit of granting it to the Marquis de Prie, who has already raised 400000 Florins on his own Credit; which Sum he designs to distribute amongst the said Troops. This Supply comes very seasonably to them, they having been ill paid, ever since their Arrival in the Netherlands: And it will give the Marquis time to consider of proper Means for their future Subsistance. His Excellency has not yet formed any Plan for the Administration of the Government: But consider the Provisional Direction ment: But continues the Provisional Direction, in the fame Manner, as Count Kiniglegg did. The States of Flanders, and the President with a Deputation of the Council of that Province, are come hither from Ghent, and on the 5th they made their Compliments of Congratulation to His Excellency on his Entrance on the Government; as did the States and Councils of the other Provinces the 7th, on the same Occasion. On the 5th Instant at seven of the Clock at Night, the Marchionels de Prié arrived in this Town. Count Vehlen, Commander in Chief of the Imperial Troops in these Countries, having lately received Orders from Vienna to pay the same Honours to the Marquis de Prié as are due to the Governor General; the Count ordered Westerlo's Regiment of Horse to receive the Marchioness without the Gate, and an Officer with chioness without the Gate, and an Officer with 40 Horse to conduct her from thence to her House: The Street from the Porte de Louvain to St. Gudule's Church, was lined by Maldeghem's and Hartop's Regiments of Foot, and she was faluted with a triple Discharge of the Cannon of the Town. The Marquis de Prié has appointed M. Vanderhaghen, who was formerly one of the Council of State, M. de Groef, a Counsellor of the Grand Council of Mechlin and M. Wevnants, a Counsellor of the Mechlin, and M. Weynants, a Counsellor of the Council of Brabant, in Form of a Privy-Council, ad Interim, to affift him with their Advice in the Affairs of Justice; and they entered on that Function the 10th Instant.
