A humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace and Gentlemen assembled at the Assizes held for the County of Salop, the 28th of March, 1717; has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Bradford, Lord Lieutenant of the said County.

The two following Addresses having been transmitted from Ireland, have been presented to His Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Bolton, Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom.

An humble Address of the Nobility, High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Clergy, Justices of the Peace, and Gentlemen, Freeholders of the County of Antrim, at the Assizes held at arrickfergus the 15th of March, 1716-17.

An humble Address of the Governours, High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Clergy and Gentlemen, Freeholders of the County of Tipperary, at a General Assizes held at Clonmell for the said County the 16th of March, 1716-17.

All which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to give very graciously.

Vienna, April 24. On the 20th the Emperour gave the Investiture of the Electorate of Cologne, with the usual Ceremonies, to Count Blanckenheim, that Elector's Minister, sent hither for this Purpose, wherein it was observed that there was no mention made on either Side of former Quarrels. It's expected that the Investiture of Bavaria will be likewise soon given, but no Day is yet appointed for that Ceremony. The 21st being the Empress Amalia's Birth-day, it was observed at Court with the usual Solemnity, and all the Imperial Family dined publicly with her in her Apartment. The Emperour and Empress set out on the 22d for Laxembourg, where they propose to stay about six Weeks, unless the Empress be obliged to return sooner in order to lie in. Prince Eugene

has declared he will set out from hence on the 4th of next Month for Futack, where the Army is to rendezvous on the 12th, in order to open the Campaign.

Leipsick, April 29. The King of Poland continues still here, but 'tis reported will return in a few Days to Dresden, and soon afterwards go to use the Waters of Carelsbadt. There have been several Conferences at the Court, in relation to the Manner of Disposing of the Bishoprick of Nauenbourg, which the Chapter will in a little Time declare vacant by the Duke of Saxe-Zeitz's changing his Religion: The Choice of a Successor, as is directed by the Treaty of Munster, will fall upon the Electoral Prince. Here are arrived Prince William of Hesse from Cassel, and his Brother Prince George from Berlin.

Copenhagen, May 1. On the 26th past, five British Men of War and two Frigates sailed from hence for the Categat, to-cruise between Gottensbourg and the Point of Schagen, for covering the Trade from the Swedish Privateers: Sir George Byng waits only for a fair Wind, to sail with the rest of the British Squadron under his Command into the Baltick, there to take a proper Station for observing the Motions of the Swedish Fleet. Vice-Admiral Gabel continues in the Bay of King off Stevens-Point, having now with him 11 Danish Men of War. Yesterday we had an Account by the Captain of a Danish Privateer, that he saw nine Swedish Men of War go into the Port of Carlscrona on the 23d past. On the 6th the whole Court will go to Frederiksbourg, there to pass some Days; and 'tis said the King intends to go to Holstejn.

Hambourg, May 4. The Danish Troops in Holstein have received Orders to hold themselves in a Readiness to march, and 'tis reported that a Camp is to be formed at Grande in the District of Trittow. Count la Marck, Minister of France, having received the Passes he desired from the King of Denmark, is gone from hence for Lubeck, in order to embark there for Sweden. The Tartar, a British Ship of War, commanded by

The Russian Troops continue in Mecklenbourg; the Body of them under Prince Replin, took Quarters on the 22d of last Month in the Territories of Dantzick; and 'tis thought that commanded by the Field-Marshal Czeremetoff not finding Subsistence in Poland, will come back into Mecklenbourg.
