HE Deputies of this State at the General Diet are returned from Frauenfeld to Baden, with those of Zurich and Glaris, where they are likely to be all the Month of August, to examine into such Accompts, Appeals, and other Affairs, as are determinable by those three Cantons only. Sig. Vincenti, who has resided at Zurich for these three Years past, in the Quality of Re-sident from the Republick of Venice, with the Cantons and the three Leagues of the Grisons, arrived here Yesterday to take his Leave of this Canton. Letters from Turin of the 25th Instant give an Account of the King of Sicily's Return to that Place, his Majesty having left Chamberry the 20th Inftant.

Vienna, July 28. The Letters from the Camp before Belgrade of the 20th Instant relate, that Prince Eugene finding it necessary to ftreighten the Town more on this Side of the Save, where the Garrison incommoded very much the Forragers, Major-General Marcilli was ordered to make a Redoubt on that River over against the lower Town, where the Turks have put the Women and Children with the best of their Effects. He had under his Command 6 Companies of Grenadiers, 3 Battallions, 1200 Pioneers, and 300 Horse; and having taken Post on the 16th, at Nine a Clock in the Evening, they worked all Night without being discovered by the Garrison. But at fix next Morning 3000 Turks passing the River in Saicks, fell in Iuddenly among the Workmen, Part of whom were cut to Pieces and the rest made their Escape. Upon this Alarm Major-General Marcilli, who covered the Workmen, advanced with his Troops, but two of his Battallions being put into Disorder and retiring, drove back with put into Dinorder and retiring, drove back with them the third that was coming on. The Grenadiers defended themselves well for about three Quarters of an Hour; and then having lost several of their Officers gave Way likewise: Hereupon the Lieutenant-Collones of the Hesse-Darmstad Regiment of Horse advanced with 260 Troopers, and having rallied some of the Foot, fell upon the Turks with great survey billing bafell upon the Turks with great Fury, killing be-tween 5 and 600 on the Spot, and driving the rest to their Saicks with such Precipitation that a great Number of them were drowned. On the Side of the Imperialists the Loss was also pretty considerable, Major-General Marcilli who commanded, together with Collonel Heister a Son of the Marshal's, the Collonel of the Regiment of Ahumada, Lieutenant-Collonel Visconti, and a Major of the Regiment of Staremberg, were killed, besides 7 Captains, 11 Lieutenants, 200 Grenadiers, and 445 common Soldiers. However, after the Turks retired, they went on with their Redoubt, the Workmen being covered on the 20th with 12 Battallions and 10 Companies of Grenadiers, and the Batteries were in fuch Forwardness, that they recked to make use of them that Night. They are to consist of 30 Pieces of Cannon, and 40 Mortars, which will batter the lower Town, clear the Save of the Turkish Vessels, and hinder the Garrison from making any Sallies on that Side. The Bridge upon the Danube being not yet repaired, it has occasioned a great Scarcity of Forrage in the Camp by which the Cavalry suffers. Prince Eugene had no politive Account of the Turkish Army, and therefore had not yet opened the Trenches.
