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*Venice, July 30.*

**T**HE Senate, to testify their great Regard to the Memory of the late Captain-Extraordinary Flangini, have conferred the Honour of Knighthood on his Brother Constantine. 'Tis advised from Dalmatia, that the Proveditore-General Sig. Mocenigo, having lately sent a Body of 6000 Men into the Enemy's Country, they burnt the Town of Montar, delivered 200 Families from Slavery, and were returned with very considerable Booty: Another Body was preparing to go farther into the Country, there being certain Advice that the Turks have hardly any Forces there to oppose them: And the Senate, for improving all Advantages that may be obtained in those Parts, have given Orders for another Convoy with Men and Money to be dispatched to Dalmatia with all Expedition. On the 24th Instant the Electoral Prince of Saxony left this Place, in order to return to Germany: His Highness designs to stay some Time at In-spruck, and then to go to Vienna. We have had no Advices from the Fleet since the Captain-General Pisani failed from Zant with the Gallies and auxiliary Squadrons to reinforce it.

*Vienna, July 31.* On the 29th an Express arrived here with Letters from Prince Eugene of Savoy of the 26th Instant; which say the Imperialists had quite repaired the Bridge over the Danube, and finished a second Bridge over the Save: That on the 23d they began to fire upon the lower Town with 26 Pieces of heavy Cannon and 20 Mortars, and had battered down the Fortifications and great Part of the Walls, as well as burnt most of the Houses; and that from another Battery they were cannonading an Island which the Turks had fortified. This Express adds, that the Grand Army of the Turks was on the 21st at Hassan-Bassa Palanka, within three Days March of Belgrade; and that the Trenches were not yet opened.

*Vienna, Aug. 4.* We have no Letters from the Army fresher than those which were transmitted from hence by the last Post; and as they told us that the Turks were within three Days March of Belgrade, and had positive Orders to fight, we are every Day in Expectation of a Courier with the News of a Battle, the Success of which will decide the Fate of the Siege, for there is no Appearance that the Trenches will be opened till the Action be over.

*Madrid, Aug. 2.* On the 28th past arrived an Express, with an Account that on the 24th the Fleet sailed from Barcelona, having on board 4 Battalions of Spanish Guards, and 5 other Battalions, with 500 Horse. Three Men of War were left, to convoy some other Transports on which are imbarking 4 Battalions of Walloon Guards and a good Number of Dragoons. The Marquess of Castel-Rodrigo was offered the Command in chief of the Forces employed in this Expedition, but he excused himself from accepting it, and there-

upon it was conferred on the Marquess de Lede. Orders are sent for Troops to march from Estremadura and Castile into Catalonia, to supply the Room of those which are gone with the Fleet; and new Levies are making, for adding 10 Men to every Company of Foot. The Court is gone back to the Pardo.

*Hague, Aug. 17.* Mr. Whitworth, the British Minister, returned hither from Amsterdam on the 12th; M. Chateaucneuf, the French Ambassador, went thither on the 13th, and continues there. M. Preis, the Swedish Secretary, came back from Amsterdam on the 10th. Baron Gortz has demanded a Frigate to transport him to Sweden; there is one kept ready, but the States do not seem inclined to take any Resolution on this Request, till they first know His Britannick Majesty's Pleasure. To Morrow the States of the Province of Holland will be assembled, and most of the Deputies are come hither already for that Purpose. 'Tis said the Czar designs to leave Amsterd on the 23d Instant.

*Madrid Aug. 2.* O. S. Two Dams having been made across the Canal, the one above the other below the Sluyces, and 7 Mills having been set up for pumping out the Water between the said two Laine those Mills (being each of them worked by 5 Horses) began to pump on the 27th of last Month: The Water was then 13 Foot and an half deep in the Sluyces, and is now reduced to 2 Foot and an half depth. All the 16 Floodgates of both Sluyces are taken down, and 8 of them are already taken to Pieces. The great Pile of Masonry on the West Side of the large Sluyce (which Sluyce is 44 Foot wide, and is to be intirely destroyed) is already lowered 9 Foot: And Part of the Masonry of the Pile between the Sluyces, viz. 10 Foot in breadth on the West Side, and 4 Foot in breadth on the East Side, is lowered 12 Foot. On this Work 800 Men are employed daily, from 5 in the Morning to 7 at Night. The Commissioners on the Part of the King of Great Britain are here every Day, inspecting the Manner and Progress of this Demolition: M. Grovestein, Governour of Furnes, the Commissioner on the Part of the States General, came hither on the 28th past. New Gates are making for the lesser Sluyce, which according to the Treaty is all that is to remain, and is to be reduced to 16 Foot in breadth. The Demolition of the Jettees on the Strand will be begun very speedily.

*Holyhead, Aug. 6.* His Grace the Duke of Bolton, Lord Lieutenant of the Kingdom of Ireland, arrived here to Day at Noon; and intends to imbark for Dublin this Evening, the Wind being fair.

Hampton-Court, August 8.
