Y Letters from the Levant of the 8th of last Month we have Advice, that the Captain General Pilani having joined the Fleet of this Republick in the Sea of Sapienza with the auxiliary Ships and Gallies, was failed into the Archepelago. A new Convoy of Ammunition and Provifions, with Stores of Cordage and other Rigging, is getting ready with all Diligence to be fent to the Fleet. We have an Account from Dalmatia, that the Army there under the Command of Sig. Sebastian Mocenigo, is divided into three Bodies, one of which is to invest the Town of Imuschi, another to observe the Motions of the few Troops the Turks have in those Parts, and the third to penetrate into the Enemy's Country. This Week arrived here from Parma 2500 Men, which with other Troops, Ammunition, and Money, are to be fent with all Expedition to Dalmatia. In the Arienal here they are hard at Work to finish 8 Men of War of the second Rate, two of which are already launched. They write from Padua, that this Week the Electoral Prince of Saxony left that Place, in Order to proceed by easy Journeys to Inspruck, where he is to go into Mourning for the Death of his Grandmother the late Electress Dowager.

Berne, Aug. 14. This Canton having re-

ceived Advice that the Emperor had resolved to dismis at the end of this Month, the two Regiments of theirs which are in his Imperial Majesty's Service, and in Garrison at Fribourg and in the Forrest Towns, has caused a Letter to be written to Baron Greuth his Imperial Majesty's Commissioner at Fribourg, to desire him to use his good Offices with his Master, to the end that the said Regiments may continue a Month longer in his Service, or till fuch Time as their Arrears way to paid them, which amount to a confiderable Sum. M. do Lubiere, who was formerly Commandant at Neufchatel for the King of Prussia, having been lately at the Court of Berlin, is newly arrived from thence, and has notified to this State, that his Prussian Majesty has constituted him Governour of the Counties of Neufchatel and Valangin, and has order'd him to live in a perfect good Understanding with this Canton. At the Instance of the Magistrates of Geneva, this Canton has given Leave to one of their Officers of Artillery to repair to Geneva, and put the Arlenal of that Place into good Order. He is accompanyed

by several Workmen, who have hitherto been employed in casting Guns for the Arsenal of

this City.

Dublin, Aug. 10. On the 7th Instant in the Evening the Duke of Bolton landed at Ringsend, was faluted by the firing of Cannon placed there, and on Lazie-hill, and was complimented by the Lord Mayor, Recorder, Court of Aldermen, and Common Council; his Grace proceeded to the Castle, attended by the Troops of Horse on Duty, State-Tempete, Kettle Drums, and a great Number of Coaches with Nobility and Gentry; the Streets being lined with the Army, and Militia, Horse and Foot. His Grace arriving at the Castle went directly to the Council-Chamber, where he was sworn Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom, and then the great Guns at the Barracks were fired three Rounds, and were answered by the like Vollies from the Regiments on Duty there. The Evening concluded with ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and all other Demonstrations of Joy. This Day the Provost, Fellows, and the rest of the College of the Holy Trinity, went in a Body to compliment his Grace upon his safe Arrival.
