A PROCLAMATION,

Declaring the Rates at which Gold shall be Current in Payments.

GEORGE R. GEORGE R. Herces the Value of the Gold, compared with the Value of the Silver in the current Coins of this Realm, as paid and received, is greater in Proportion than the Value of Gold is to the Value of Silver in the neighbouring Nations; and the Over-valuation of Gold in the current Coins of this Realm bath been a great Caufe of carrying out and leffening the Species of the Silver Coins thereof, which is highly prejudicial to the Trade of this Ringdom: And whereas the Commons in Parliaof this Ringdom : And whereas the Commons in Parliament have by their Address humbly befought us, that we ment have by their Addres humbly bejought us, that we would be graciously pleased to issue our Royal Proclama-tion, to forbid all Persons to utter or receive any of the Pieces of Gold called Guineas, at any greater or higher Rate than one and twenty Shillings for each Guinea, and so proportionably for any greater or leffer Pieces of coined Gold; which we have graciously condescended unto. Now for and towards remedying the faid Evil, we have they out to in the Advice of aux Prior Council to is further thought fit, with the Advice of our Privy Council, to iffue this our Royal Proclamation, bereby firitily prohibiting all and every Perfon and Perform whatfoever to utter or receive any of the Pieces of Gold Coin of this Kingdom, commonly called Guineas (which in our Mint were coined only at twenty Shillings each, but have been by our Subonly at twenty Shitting teach, but have seen by our Suo-jefts paid and received at the Rate of one and twenty Shillings and fix Ponce each) at any greater or higher Rate or Value than one and twenty Shillings for each Guinea, and fo proportionably for the Pieces of Gold cal-led half Guineas, double Guineas, and five Pound Pieces; and the color of this view of and the other Pieces of ancient Gold Coin of this King-dom, which by their wearing may be diminished in their Weight, at any greater or higher Rate or Value than as followeth, That is to say, the Piece of Gold now received and paid for three and twenty Shillings and fix Pence, to and paid for three and twenty Shillings and fix Pence, to be hereafter received and paid for three and twen-ty Shillings, and no more; the Piece of Gold now received and paid for five and twenty Shillings and fix Pence, to be hereafter received and paid for five and twenty Shillings, and no more; and fo propor-tionably for smaller Pieces of the like Gold Coin: At which Rates and Values we do hereby declare the faid refpetive Pieces of coined Gold to be current. And we do hereby firitily Charge and Command all our loving Sub-iefts what locuer, that they do not prefume to receive or jests what seever, that they do not presume to receive or pay the Gold Coins of this Realm at any greater Rates or Values than the Rates and Values aforefaid, upon Pain of our higheft Displeasure, and upon Pain of the greatest Punishment that by Law may be inflicted upon them for their Default, Negligence, and Contempt in this Behalf.
