They were received very graciously, and were all admitted to the Honour of kissing his Majesty's Hand.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

**T**HE General Court of the South Sea Company do, in the most humble and dutiful Manner, return their unfeigned Thanks to your Majesty for your most gracious Answer to their late Address, and for your great Condescension in permitting them, at their late Election, to use your Royal Name for their Governour; the just Sense whereof they have endeavoured to express by their intire Unanimity in the said Election: And do most humbly beseech your Majesty will be graciously pleased to accept of being their Governour; and they do most sincerely assure your Majesty, that they will constantly exert themselves in demonstrating their Duty and Affection to your Majesty; and never cease their fervent Prayers that your Majesty's Reign may be long, easy, and prosperous.

His Majesty's most Graciour Answer.

Gentlemen,

**I** Thank you for this repeated Instance of your Duty and Affection to me, and accept of this Mark of it as you desire. I am glad of this Occasion of assuring you again of my Favour and Protection.

*Vienna, Feb. 2.* The Grand Vizier's Answer to Prince Eugene's Letter, was considered of three Days ago in a Conference among the Ministers here, and the Result of their Deliberations is laid before the Emperour for his Determination. So that it will soon be known in what Manner this Court will think fit to proceed in the Treaty with the Turks. In the mean Time Sir Robert Sutton and Mr. Stanyan, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassadors for the Mediation, hold themselves in Readiness to set out for the Place which shall be chosen for the Congress. There is no Likelihood of a speedy Accommodation between this Court and that of Rome: All the Advances the Pope has yet made towards it, are, an Offer to grant to the Emperour a Tax on the Clergy of the Tenths of their Revenues, in the same Manner as was granted to King Philip; as also to ac-

quiesce in his Imperial Majesty's Nomination to Bishopsricks and other Ecclesiastical Dignities in the Kingdom of Naples; and to prolong the foresaid Grant of the Tenths for some Years after the War against the Turks is ended, in Consideration of the extraordinary Charge which the Emperour has been obliged to be at for carrying on that War. But as to the Emperour's other Demands, the Pope refuses to comply with them. The three Imperial Regiments continue their March with all Diligence towards the Coast of the Adriatick, there to imbarke for Naples: But the Emperour has not yet nominated a General to command in Italy.

*Hague, Feb. 15.* The States of the Province of Holland are to assemble here to Morrow, and in all Likelihood they will forthwith settle finally every thing relating to the Squadron designed for the Baltick: The Province of Zealand, which is to contribute towards the Charge of that Squadron, has transmitted hither its Consent thereto; and the Consent of two other Provinces, which are not to contribute to that Expence, is expected to Morrow. In the mean while the Admiralties use great Diligence in getting the Ships which are to form the said Squadron fitted out; and the Commissions for them will be issued in a few Days. 'Tis believed that the States of Holland will before they separate name an Ambassadour to be sent to the Court of France; besides M. Buys, 'tis said two other Gentlemen will be put in Nomination for that Employment, viz. M. Keppel, Brother of the Earl of Albemarle, and M. Hop, Son of the Treasurer. The great Pensionary, M. Heinsius, has been indisposed of late, occasioned ('tis thought) by his Concern for the Death of a Sister who lived in his Family; but Yesterday he appeared Abroad: 'Tis said he has resolved to ask Leave to retire from all publick Business. The Prince Don Emanuel of Portugal being recovered from an Indisposition, will soon appear in Publick: 'Tis now said that it will be some Time before he returns to Portugal; and that if the War continues in Hungary, he will make the ensuing Campaign there.

### Whitehall, February 10.

The young Prince George William, Son of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, departed this Life on the 6th Instant about eight at Night. He had been taken ill about 10 Days before of a Cough and Straitness of Breathing, from which he seemed to be recovering till the foggy Weather on the 4th and 5th Instant, which occasioning a Relapse into his Straitness of Breathing, he fell into Convulsions and died.

And in Case any of the said Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attorneys for that Purpose, that the said Attorneys may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.

### Navy-Office, Dec. 13, 1717

Whereas it was set forth by a Publication in the Gazette, bearing Date the 17th of July last, and inserted in the succeeding Gazettes to the end of August following; that by Act of Parliament made in the 12th Year of Queen Anne, the Sum of 3000 l. was given to be equally distributed amongst the Chaplains who had served in the Fleet during the late War, &c. And by a Clause in an Act of Parliament made in the 3d Year of His present Majesty King George, entitled, An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax, &c. for settling in what Proportions the said Sum should be paid; it is thereby directed, that the said 3000 l. shall be distributed to such of the said Chaplains who served in the Fleet during the late War, and which were not in Her Majesty's Service in the Fleet, or had not some Ecclesiastical Living or Preferment on the 16th of November 1713, to the Value of 50 l. per Annum or more; and it not being known which (if any) of them had any Ecclesiastical Livings or Preferments on the said 16th of November 1713, which must be ascertained before a full Adjustment can be made of the Proportions of the said 3000 l. to be distributed among those who shall appear to have a Right thereto, according to the said Act: And whereas, since the forecited Publications in the Gazettes, there have been brought to the Office but 81 Affidavits, of 312 Chaplains, who appear by a Collection made at the Navy-Office to have served on board the Fleet within the aforesaid Time; These are further to give Notice, that every Chaplain, or the Executors or Administrators of any such Chaplain, who had not any Preferment as aforementioned, and have not delivered to the Navy-Office their Affidavits, pursuant to the former Publication, do bring or send them thither, by or before the 17th of July next, in order to have their Claims entered; which Affidavits are to be made before a proper Magistrate, attesting that they had no such Living or Preferment at the Time mentioned in the Act, and are also to be signed by the Chaplains or the Executors or Administrators of such; after which Time the List will be adjusted and closed, and no further Claims admitted.
