# À PROCLAMATION,

For putting in Execution the Laws made against Unlawful Clubs and Combinations, and for preventing Tumults and Riotous Assemblies, and for the more speedy and effectual Punishing Rioters.

GEORGE R.

W Hereas is has been reprefented, That great Numbers of Wooll-combers and Weavers in Several of the Towns and Parifies in this Kingdom, concerned in the Woollen Manufactures, have lately formed themselves into Several Glubs and Societies, without any lawful Authority for that purpose, and have presumed, contrary to Law, to all as one or more Corporation or Corporations, and to chuse thereof Masters, Stewards, Supervisors, Affiffiants, and other Officers, and have used a Common Seal, and do otherwife prefume unlawfully to alt as Bodies Conporate, and have prefumed to make By-Laws or Orders (all which are illegal and void) by which they pretend to determine who has a Right to the Trade, how many Apprentices and Journeymen each Man Shall keep at one Time, and whom he shall take, and at what Prices all forts of Goods shall be wrought, and in what manner, and of what Materials made, and many other things to the like purpose; and have unlawfully conspired and promiled to put the faid illegal By-Laws or Orders in Exe-cution: And when many of the faid Conspirators, by reafon of their Masters not fubmitting to the faid pretended By-Laws or Orders, have been destitute of Work and Im-, ployment, in order to lay a Necessity on their Imployers to comply with their unreasonable Demands, the said Clubs have supplied them with Money till they could again get Imployment: And the said unlawful Clubs, by reason of their holding Correspondence throughout several of the Trading Towns in this Kingdom, and of their great Num-bers, are become dangerous to the Publick Peace, and thereby, especially in the Counties of Devon and Somerset, many notorious Riots, Tumults and Diforders have been committed, several private Houses broke open, many of committed, jeveral private Houjes broke open, many of our good Subjetts affaulted, wounded, and put in Peril of their Lives, great Quantities of Woollen Goods, in part Wrought, have been cut and spoiled, Prifons broke open, and the Offenders, for the Chimes aforefaid, have by Force been set at Liberty, and some of the faid Offenders, to skreen them from Justice, have been fent away with Tickets and Money from their respective Clubs, to the great Disturbance of the publick Peace, and to the Prejudice and Hindrance of the Woollen Manufa-Eture of this Kingdom : And where such Tumults and Riots have been, the Offenders have prefumed to continue together committing Juch Riots and Tumults, notwithflanding Proclamation hath been made, requiring them to disperse, pursuant to the Statute in that case made and provided. And whereas by an Alt passed in the second Tear of the Reign of the late King Edward the Sixth, Intituled, The Bill of Confpiracies of Victuallers Intituiea, The Bill or Compiracies or victualiers and Craftimen, feveral fevere Penalties and Punifi-ments are enalted and provided for fuch as fhall un-lawfully confederate and combine for feveral of the Pur-pofes herein before mentioned : And by another Statute made in the first Year of our Reign, Intituded, An Act for preventing Tumults and riotous Affemblies, and for the more fpeedy and effectual punishing the Rioters, it is enacted, that if any Perfons, to the Number of twelve or more, being unlawfully, riotoully, and tumultuoully alfembled together, to the Difturbance of the publick Peace, at any Time after the last Day of of the public Peace, at any lime after the last Day of fuly, in the Vear of our Lord one thousand feven hundred and fifteen, and being required or commanded by one or more Justice or Justices of the Peace, or by the Sheriff of the County, or his Under-Sheriff, or by the Mayor, Rai-liff or Bailiffs, or other Head Officer or Fusice of the Peace of any Circu or Torre Contourts where there to be the first Peace of any Gity or Town-Gorporate, where fuch Affemblies shall be, by Proclamation to be made in the King's Name, in the Form therein directed, to disperse them.

felves, and peaceably to depart to their Habitations, or to their lawful Business, shall, to the Number of twelve or more (notwithstanding such Proclamation made) un-lawfully, riotously, and tumultuously remain or continue together, by the Space of one Hour after such Command together, by the Space of one Hour after juch Command or Regult made by Proclamation, shat then juck conti-nuing together, to the Number of twelve or more, after juch Command or Request made by Proclamation, shall be adjudged Felony, without Benefit of Clergy, and the Of-fender's therein shall be adjudged Felons, and shall fuffer Death as in Case of Felony, without Benefit of Clergy-And the demolishing or pulling down, or beginning to de-welch as the demolishing or pulling down, or beginning to demolish or pull down any Building, by Persons unlawfully; riotousis and tumultuousis affembled together; to the Disturbance of the publick Peace, is thereby declared to be Felony, without the Benefit of Clergy, and feveral other Directions are therein given for preventing Riots, and the more spredy and effectual punishing Rioters. And whereas the Commons in Parliament affembled, have, by their Address, humbly befought us, that we would be graciously pleased to iffue our Royal Pruslamation for putting in Execution the Laws made against unlawful Glubs and Combinations, and for preventing Tumults and riotons Alfemblics, and for the more speedy and effectual punishing Rioters, to which we have gracioufly condescended; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to iffue this our Royal Proclamation, and we do hereby firitly prohibit all our loving Subjects from holding Clubs or Affemblies for any of the Purpofes beforementioned, or for any other unlawful Purpofe what-Sever, and from afting under the fame in any Manner, under Pain of our higheft Displeasure, and being profe-cuted for the same with the utmost Rigour of Law: And we do hereby firitly charge and command all our Judges, Juffices of the Peace, and other Magistrates, that they do use their utmost Endravours to prevent and sup-prefs all such unlawful Clubs, Conspiracies and Combinations, and to put in Execution the faid Laws, and all other Laws against fuch unlawful Clubs and Combinations, and for preventing Tumults and riotous Allemblies, and for the more speedy and effectual punishing Rioters, and that all our loving Subjects be aiding and affifting therein.

Copenhagen, Feb. 1. We have Advice; that the General Officers whom the King had ordered to repair to Norway, are arrived at Flaftrand and are imbarking there for that Kingdom. The last Letters from Schwinefund relate, that the Weather was still open there, and that there had not yet been any Action between the Danish and Swedish Ar-We have no Account yet that the mics. Transports which failed from hence with Meal for Norway, are arrived there : But 'tis known that one of those Transports was driven by Stress of Weather on the Coast of the Island of Letsoe in the Cattegat, and lost with all her Lading. The young Princefs Charlotte who lately fell ill of the Small Pox, is in a fair Way of Recovery. On Sunday last M. Lodberg, Dean of the Cathedral of this City, was confectated Bishop of the Iste of Fuhnen, the Ceremony being perform-ed in the faid Cathedral. Some Swedisch Privateers having been cruifing of late in the Paffage between this Place and Lubeck, about 50 Merchant Ships coming from that Port and from the little Danish Islands, were obli-

ged for avoiding them to enter the Green-Sund, where being frozen up they full continue. It was intended to fend out some Frigates from hence in Chace of those Swedish Privateers ; and the Delmenhorst a Man of War, was ap. pointed for that Service; but those Privateers having disappeared, that Defign is changed, and the faid Man of War which had lain in the Road four pr five Weeks, is ordered into Port again.

Berne, Feb. 9. On the 3d Inftant arrived here two Deputies from Zurich, and the Day following had their Audience of the Sove-reign Council of Two Hundred, to whom they delivered what they had in Commiffion from their Superiors, which confifted in a Reprefentation of the Justice of feveral Demands their Canton infilted upon in the new Treaty of Baden, defiring this State to go hand in hand with them, and to give their Deputies at that Congress the fame Instructions their own had, and exhorting them to make a good Use of the pre-cent famourable Opportunity of coming to fent favourable Opportunity of coming to an advantageous Agreement with the Abbot and Chapter of St. Gall. Whereupon the Sovereign Council appointed a Committee to examine into this Affair, and to con. fer with those Deputies of Zurich, who ac-cordingly have fince been several Titnes in Conference with the Committee, and 'tis faid are come very nigh an Agreement, which 'tis hoped will bring Matters to an Accom-modation. They write from Milan the 1ft Instant, that Count Staremberg was arrived there with his Family; but that it was not known yet what Character he would take upon him.
