Gibraltar, January 10.

Captain Norbury, who went over lately with full Powers from His Britannick Majesty to renew a Treaty of Peace with the Emperour of Morocco, was received with great Marks of Honour at Tetuan by the Bashaw whom that Emperour has constituted his Plenipotentiary for the same Purpose. They have already agreed upon a Truce for three Months; which there is good Reason to believe will prove a Means to hasten the Peace, by preventing any Accident that might obstruct or retard it. The Articles of the Truce are as follows;

1. It is consented and agreed upon, that there be a firm and inviolable Truce between the most serene and potent Prince George King of Great Britain, &c. and the most powerful and noble Prince Muley Ismael, &c. for three Months from the Date hereof; and between the Dominions and Subjects, Ships and Imbarkations of both Nations; and during the said Term no Injury shall be offered from one to the other by Word or Deed; but on the contrary they shall treat one the other with all possible Respect and Friendship.

2. That all the Ships, or any Imbarkations whatsoever, as well those which belong to His Britannick Majesty and His Subjects, as those which belong to the Emperour of Morocco and his Vassals, shall pass the Seas freely, and without the least Molestation, shewing their Colours to each other. And if either one or the other shall order their Boat aboard, there shall not go in her above two Persons besides those that row, and those two only shall be permitted to go on board the other Ship: And when they are satisfied that the major Part of the Ship's Company are Subjects either of one or the other Prince, they shall permit them to pass without any Molestation; as also all Passengers, Money or Merchandize, that shall belong to any Nation whatsoever, and shall be found on board the said Ships or Imbarkations, shall be intirely free, neither shall they be subject to be taken, detained, or plundered, nor shall one or the other receive any Damage or Injury.

3. It is further agreed upon, that during the Term of the said Truce, no Ship or Imbarkation either of the one or the other Part, or any of their Subjects that shall be Shipwrecked on the Coast of the Dominions of either the one or the other Prince, shall be made Prize, neither shall their Goods be taken, or Persons made Slaves. But this Truce does not take off the Prohibition of Commerce, but the same is to remain in full Force to the Conclusion of the general Peace. Concluded at Tetuan, on the 2d of January 1717-18, O. S. which answers to the 10th of the Moon of Safar in the Year 1130.

Madrid, Feb. 7. The Four Companies of Spanish Foot-Guards, and the like Number of Walloon Foot-Guards; which were quartered in Arragon, have had Orders sent them to march to Agreda, on the Frontier of the Kingdom of Navarre; to facilitate by their Presence in those Parts, the collecting of the Customs newly established in that Kingdom, in Biscay, and in Guipuscoa. The Marquis de Lede having taken a Review of all the Infantry in Arragon and Murcia, is gone to do the like in Valentia. The Duke de San Pedro, who is made Governor General of Valentia, in the Room of the Marquis de Valdecannas, is ordered to repair forthwith to his Government. Some Days ago Father Joseph Garcia, General of the Order of St. Francis, being admitted into the King's Presence, stood covered by His Majesty's Command, as a Grandee of Spain of the first Rank, which is an Honour usually granted to the Head of that Order, and constitutes him Protector of it.

Paris, Feb. 26. On the 19th, the Duke of Orleans introduced the Duke of Lorraine, who to be incognito, styles himself the Count de Blamont, to the King, in the Palace of the Tuilleries: The next Day, Madame the Dutchess of Orleans Dowager, introduced to His Majesty the Dutchess of Lorraine her Daughter. The King returned the Visit to her Royal Highness the 24th, at the Palais Royal. All the Princes and Princesses of the Blood, have also been visited by their Royal Highnesses, and have returned the Visits: And during their Stay at Court, there will be continual Entertainments and Diversions. The Parliament having had Notice to come to an Audience of the King on the 21st, their Deputies attended, with M. de Mesmes, first President, at their Head; and being introduced by the Marquis de la Vrilliere, Secretary of State, the King gave them his Answer to their late Remonstrance. The Deputies of the Parliament of Britany continue here, without having yet been admitted to an Audience of the King: M. d'Argenson, Keeper of the Seals, having desired them to communicate to him a Copy of the Letter which that Parliament has sent by them to be presented to the King, he has changed several Passages in it, and intimated to them, that if the said Parliament would draw up a Letter agreeable to those Alterations, it might be a Means to forward an Accommodation between the Court and them; whereupon they have sent that altered Copy to Rennes: In the mean time, the Troops continue in Britany.

Whereas a Letter dated Tuesday the 18th Instant, and subscribed W^m H[—], was sent by the Penny-Post to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. The Writer of this Letter is desired to come to Charles Delafaye, Esq; at the Secretary's Office at the Cockpit, Whitehall, and he shall have all fitting Encouragement and Protection.

Whereas in a Paper Entitled, A Letter from a Livy-man of the City of London to a Member of the Honourable House of Commons, relating to the Coinage of Copper Farthings and Half-pence, it is set forth, That it may be made out to Demonstration, that the Nation is grossly imposed upon on Account of the said Coinage; and that although other Persons capable, proposed to deliver in the Blanks equal in Goodness to those coined in King Charles the Second's Time, yet the Person under Contract is suffer'd to deliver in Copper of less Value by Two Pence in each Pound weight than the said Farthings and Half-pence coined in the Time of the said King Charles; The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury do hereby give Notice, that if the Persons who published the said Letter, or any other Persons, will attend the Treasury, and bring with them Blanks of fine British Copper, equal in Goodness to those coined in King Charles the Second's Time, and will oblige themselves to furnish Quantities of the same Blanks at the same Rates which are now paid, their Lordships will give them Encouragement suitable to their Proposals and Performance thereof, there being no standing Contract yet made with any Persons, and those now employed being only upon Trial.

Whereas it was set forth by a Publication in the Gazette, bearing Date the 17th of July last, and inserted in the succeeding Gazettes to the end of August following; that by Act of Parliament made in the 12th Year of Queen Anne, the Sum of 3000 l. was given to be equally distributed amongst the Chaplains who had served in the Fleet during the late War, &c. And by a Clause in an Act of Parliament made in the 3d Year of His present Majesty King George, entitled, An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax, &c. for settling in what Proportions the said Sum should be paid; it is thereby directed, that the said 3000 l. shall be distributed to such of the said Chaplains who served in the Fleet during the late War, and which were not in Her Majesty's Service in the Fleet, or had not some Ecclesiastical Living or Preferment on the 16th of November 1711, to the Value of 50 l. per Annum or more; and it not being known which (if any) of them had any Ecclesiastical Livings or Preferments on the said 16th of November 1711, which must be ascertain'd before a full Adjustment can be made of the Proportions of the said 3000 l. to be distributed among those who shall appear to have a Right thereto, according to the said Act: And whereas, since the forecited Publications in the Gazettes, there have been brought to the Office but 81 Affidavits, of 112 Chaplains, who appear by a Collection made at the Navy-Office to have served on board the Fleet within the aforesaid Time; These are further to give Notice, that every Chaplain, or the Executors or Administrators of any such Chaplain, who had not any Preferment as aforesaid, and have not delivered to the Navy-Office their Affidavits, pursuant to the former Publication, do bring or send them thither, by or before the 17th of July next, in order to have their Claims entered; which Affidavits are to be made before a proper Magistrate, testifying that they had no such Living or Preferment at the Time mentioned in the Act, and are also to be signed by the Chaplain or the Executors or Administrators of the same, after which Time the List will be adjusted and closed, and no further Claims admitted.
