and for the reverse the figure of Britannia, as guardian, with a shield in her left hand and a trident in her right hand, accompanied by a lion and, against the background of a wave motif, the words "ONE OUNCE FINE SILVER" to the left and "BRITANNIA" and the date of the year to the right. The coin shall have a graining upon the edge.

9. The said silver coins shall be legal tender for payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

THE ONE POUND COINS

- 10. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of one pound shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 16.227 grammes, a standard diameter of 27 millimetres, and a standard composition of millesimal fineness of 958.4, and being circular in shape.
- (2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say-
- (a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin (measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogramme of the coin) of 0.095 grammes;
- (b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.1 millimetres per coin; and
- (c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of five per mille.
- 11. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of one pound shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 15.568 grammes, a standard diameter of 27 millimetres, and a standard composition of millesimal fineness 999, and being circular in shape.
- (2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say-
- (a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin (measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogramme of the coin) of 0.095 grammes;
- (b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.1 millimetres per coin; and
- (c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of one per mille.
- 12. The design for the said silver coins shall be as follows:

For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "ELIZABETH·II·D·G REG·FID·DEF", and the value "1·POUND" and for the reverse the figure of Britannia, as guardian, with a shield in her left hand and a trident in her right hand, accompanied by a lion and, against the background of a wave motif, the words "HALF OUNCE FINE SILVER" to the left and "BRITANNIA" and the date of the year to the right. The coin shall have a graining upon the edge.

THE FIFTY PENCE COINS

- 13. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of fifty pence shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 8.114 grammes, a standard diameter of 22 millimetres, and a standard composition of millesimal fineness of 958.4, and being circular in shape.
- (2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say-
- (a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin (measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogramme of the coin) of 0.055 grammes;
- (b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
- (c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of five per mille.
- 14. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of fifty pence shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 7.784 grammes, a standard diameter of 22 millimetres, and a standard composition of millesimal fineness 999, and being circular in shape.
- (2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say-
- (a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin (measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogramme of the coin) of 0.055 grammes;
- (b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
- (c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of one per mille.
- 15. The design for the said silver coins shall be as follows:-

For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "ELIZABETH·II·D·G REG·FID·DEF", and the value "50·PENCE" and for the reverse the figure of Britannia, as guardian, with a shield in her left hand and a trident in her right hand, accompanied by a lion and, against the background of a wave motif, the words "QUARTER OUNCE FINE SILVER" to the left and "BRITANNIA" and the date of the year to the right. The coin shall have a graining upon the edge.

THE TWENTY PENCE COINS

- 16. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of twenty pence shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 3.246 grammes, a standard diameter of 16.5 millimetres, and a standard composition of millesimal fineness of 958.4, and being circular in shape.
- (2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say-
- (a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin (measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogramme of the coin) of 0.04 grammes;
- (b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
- (c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of five per mille.
- 17. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of twenty pence shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 3.114 grammes, a standard diameter of 16.5 millimetres, and a standard composition of millesimal fineness 999, and being circular in shape.
- (2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say-
- (a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin (measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogramme of the coin) of 0.04 grammes;
- (b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
- (c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of one per mille.
- 18. The design for the said silver coins shall be as follows:-

For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "ELIZABETH·II·D·G REG·FID·DEF", and the value "20·PENCE" and for the reverse the figure of Britannia, as guardian, with a shield in her left hand and a trident in her right hand, accompanied by a lion and, against the background of a wave motif, the words "TENTH OUNCE FINE SILVER" to the left and "BRITANNIA" and the date of the year to the right. The coin shall have a graining upon the edge.

19. This Proclamation shall come into force on the nineteenth day of July Two thousand and one.
