Rome, March 28.

**T**His last week hath been wholly taken up with the Devotions and Solemnities of the season, his Holiness assisting at them with greater vigor then could be expected by his great age and indisposition of his being lately been much troubled with a Biliousness.

Here is arrived the Marquis de Saligny, Son to Monsieur Colbert, Premier Minister, he is at present lodged in the Palace of Cardinal Antonio, by whom he is Treated with all the respect and kindness imaginable; this day he had Audience of the Pope, who very kindly received him adding great expressions of the esteem he had for him and his Family.

The Marriage formerly spoken of between the Duke of Gravina Orsino, and the Lady Ludovica, Niece to the Cardinal Altieri, is now finally agreed on, with this condition, that presently after the consummation of the Marriage, he shall return with his Lady to live upon his Estate in Naples, for the avoiding the great expences which they would necessarily be obliged to bear, in case they remained in this Court. Here is much likelihood that the Cardinals Cap, which is at present void, may be disposed of to Baily Rospigliosi, Nephew to the late Pope, Clement the 10th, and the more, because his most Christian Majesty, who as is said, pretends to it for the Bishop of Lyon; hath declared that in that case, he is willing that Bishop shall expect another vacancy.

We have advice here of the death of the Prince della Rocella, Brother to the Cardinal Caraffa, a person of great esteem and authority in the kingdom of Naples, where his Estate lies: he hath left behind him one Son, Heir of his Title and Fortunes, and a Daughter, wife to the Marquis del Vasto, First Prince of the Kingdom of Naples. It is here said, that Signior Renuccio, at present residing at Turin in quality of Nuncio from the Pope, is to be recalled from thence, and to go for Poland, to succeed Signior Nerli in his employments there, whom his Holiness hath sent as Extraordinary Nuncio to the Emperor to endeavour the concluding a Treaty of Alliance between the Princes of Christendom against the Turkish power.

Madrid, April 1. The Bishop of Ciudad-Rodrigo, being lately dead, her Majesty hath been pleased to make choice of Father Estanuela, formerly nominated to the Bishoprick of Porto-Rico in the West Indies, for the See. It is said that the Cardinal Porto-Carrero, at present in Rome, is named to succeed to the Bishoprick of Segovia, now void, and on which depends a vast Revenue. From the West Indies by a ship lately imported at Cadix, we have advice, that the last years New Spain Fleet was safely arrived at Vera Cruz, without having received any further damage, then what was formerly said of the foundering of one ship near Porto-Rico, which hath been the more welcome, by reason of a report spread abroad here, that almost all part of that Fleet had been lost.

From Cadix they write of the 22 past, that two days before arrived there from Tangier, the Roebuck Fre-

Captain Lidal Commander, together with the Lord Ketch, bound as was said to Mamora, a Spanish Garrison in Africa; on their way thither they met it seems with much foul weather and high winds and were forced to put in there for shelter.

From Lisbon our Letters tell us, that the two ships which are there equipping for the East Indies, are almost ready, and may as is thought, sail about the latter end of this month; that the Ambassador who is at present there from the Great Master and Order of Maltha, hath not yet had publick Audience of the Prince Regent, because of some difficulties which did arise concerning the manner of his reception, but that that matter is finally determined; his Highness amongst other things being willing, that according to the practice of other Ambassadors, he should be covered at his Audience, a thing which the Ministers of that Court, following the example of former times, would not hitherto allow of, and that the Count de Ponte, Son to the Marquis de Sande, is lately married to the Daughter of the Marquis de Niza.

Madrid, April 1. From Alicant of the 23 past, We have advise that Sir Edward Spragg arrived there some days before, with Three Fregats and a Fireship, and was returned again to Sea; with a Resolution to go and lye before Argiers, expecting a fit opportunity to attempt landing upon that place.

That the Warwick Fregat had by fowl weather lost her Masts, and that the Advice and Newcastle Fregats were likewise somewhat damnified in their Masts and Rigging in the same Storm, which would oblige them to go for Beggorn or Genoua to refit again.

From Tangier our last Letters tell us, that all things there were in a very good condition, that the Mole advances daily, not having received the least damage all this last Winter; or by the high winds they have since had in those parts.

Venice, April 4. Here is lately returned Monsieur de St. Andre Monbrun to his charge of General of the Armies of this Republick, he hath been received by the Duke and Senate with great respect and affection, in consideration of the good Service he did this State in Candia during the late Wars with the Turks.

Few days since went hence Signior Trotti, who hath resided here some time in quality of Nuncio from the Pope, leaving that employment to Signior Vare who is daily expected here. From Mantova we are told, that the Marriage between that Duke and the Princess Guastalla, eldest Daughter to the Duke of that name, who is the next of Blood to the House of Mantova and his Heir, is at length wholly concluded, to the mutual satisfaction of their Friends and Relations; notwithstanding all the endeavors that have been made to the contrary; and that the next week that Duke intends to go with his Court to Guastalla to Consummate his Marriage in a private manner without any great Solemnity.

From Tarragona we have advice that the Dutchess is almost quite recovered of her late indisposition, to the great joy of that Court. Our last Letters from Adrianople inform us, that the Grand Signi-
