Venice, June 6.

A Fleet of Transport Ships sailed from hence lately under Convoy of two Men of War, having on board 1000 Recruits, a Regiment of Foot newly raised by the Inhabitants of Treviso at their own Expence, a great Quantity of Stores of all kinds, and a considerable Sum of Money for the Service of our Army. Our last Accounts from Corfu say, the Venetian Fleet was to sail the 19th to Climino, and to proceed from thence to Zant, where they would expect Intelligence of the Motions of the Turkish Fleet, which according to their freshest Advices was ready to put to Sea, but would be much weaker than it was last Year. By a Ship lately come in from Spalatro we have an Account, that our Army was preparing to take the Field, and that the Body of Turks that was lately come into the Neighbourhood of Prevesa and Vonizza, was considerably weakened by the sending of Detachments to Hungary, so that there was no Apprehension of any Attempts the Enemy could make on that Side.

Vienna, June 15. The Emperour is expected here to Morrow from Luxembourg, but will return thither in two or three Days, intending to reside in that Place the greatest Part of the Summer. Our Letters from the Imperial Camp near Semlin give an Account of Prince Eugene's Arrival there the 9th Instant, and that the greatest Part of the Troops being assembled, and the Remainder coming in daily from their Quarters, the Army would very soon be in a Condition to take the Field, unless it were prevented, as there is great Reason to hope, by the good Success of the Negotiation for a Peace at Passarowitz. A Turkish Aga had attended his Highness with a Letter from the new Grand Vizier, who therein expresses a great Desire to

Peace and Amity restored between the two Empires. The Count de Schwerin, Envoy from the King of Prussia, being recalled, is set out for Berlin. He is to be succeeded by the Sieur Buchardi, who for some Time past has

been employed by his Prussian Majesty in the Quality of his Resident at Hambourg.

Bern, June 22. The Treaty for accomodating the Differences between the Cantons of Zurich and Berne on one Side, and the Abbot and Chapter of St. Gall on the other, is happily concluded, to the mutual Satisfaction of all the Parties concerned, the Deputies of this State who were employed in that Negotiation returned hither from Baden two Days ago, and are this Day to make their Report of that Transaction to the Sovereign Council. Two Deputies are appointed by this State to assist on their Part at the General Diet of the Cantons of Switzerland, which according to Custom is to meet at Midsummer at Frauenfeld. Our last Letters from Milan say, that the Sieur Otsetti de Luques being appointed General of the Imperial Horse in that Dutchy, was arrived there from Vienna to take that Command upon him.

Hambourg, June 24. The King of Denmark is now at Coldingen in Jutland, where it is thought his Majesty intends to make some Stay, he having sent for some of his Ministers from Copenhagen. They write from Koningsberg, that the King of Prussia who went thither lately from Berlin, is reviewing his Forces quartered in those Parts, and intends towards the end of this Month to proceed to Mitaw in Courland, to have an Interview with the Czar. We hear that his Czarish Majesty having received Advice that Baron Gortz, the Swedish Minister, was arrived in the Island of Aland, had ordered Baron Schaffroff, his Vice-Chancellour, who is recovered of his Indisposition, to repair thither to confer with him. Letters from Copenhagen of the 21st say, the English and Danish Fleet was still in the Bay of Kiog, and that the Swedish Fleet continued in the Port of Carelskroon.

Hague, June 28. The States of Holland and West Friseland met this Morning, and received the Consent of Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and the other principal Cities of this Province to this Republick's entering into the Measures proposed for preserving the Quiet of Europe, but the Resolutions of two of their Towns

not being yet come in; it occasioned a further Adjournment to the first of next Month. The Earl of Cadogan, His Majesty of Great Britain's Ambassadour, has lately had several Conferences with the Deputies of the Council of State, to adjust some Points between the Emperor and the States General, relating to the Execution of the Barrier Treaty, and that Negotiation is in so fair a way, that it will in all probability be soon brought to good Issue.

Paris, June 29. The Right Honourable the Earl Stanhope, one of the Principal Secretaries of State to His Majesty of Great Britain, arrived here this Day from England. An Order of the Council of State having lately been issued for regulating the Value of the several Species of our Coin, the Parliament of Paris have remonstrated against the issuing of such an Order without their Approbation, as being a Matter under their Cognizance: But it appearing that for 56 Years past the Course has been otherwise, Orders of this Nature being issued by the Council without the Participation of any other Court; the Regent has caused a second Order of Council to be issued to enforce the former. Letters from Barcelona of the 20th Instant give an Account, that the Troops which were to embark there for Sardinia, not being yet all arrived from their Quarters, it was uncertain when the Convoy would sail that is to carry the last Supplies of Men and Stores to the Spanish Fleet; which would not put to Sea till it had received that Reinforcement. Our Advices from Lisbon say, the homeward bound Brasil Fleet was come in Sight of the Coasts of Portugal.

Paris, June 30. The Earl Stanhope and the Earl of Stair had Audience this Day of the Regent, who gave them such positive Assurances of his firm Resolution to act in concert with the King of Great Britain for the Preservation of the general Peace and Tranquility of Europe, that there is no room to doubt of a speedy and happy Conclusion of the important Negotiation upon which His Majesty thought it proper to dispatch the Earl Stanhope to this Court. The Regent has issued an Order for banishing out of the French Dominions, all his British Majesty's Subjects who were engaged in the late Rebellion against him and have taken Refuge in these Parts, or who are otherwise known to adhere to the Pretender's Interest; Copies of which Order are sent to M. Machault the Lieutenant de Police of this City, and to all Governours, Intendants, and other Magistrates of Provinces and Towns, with a strict Injunction to see the same duly complied with.

Whitehall, June 21. Francis Brace, Esq; is appointed one of the Commissioners for the Receipt and Management of the several Duties upon Hides, Skins, Velum and Parchment, Housels, &c. and for Affairs of Taxes, &c. in the room of Sir Harcourt Maffer, Kt. who has resigned that Employment.
