Venice, October 3.

BY a Ship which is come in 20 Days from Corfu we have Advice, that the Captain-General Pisani was arrived there with the Gallies of this Republick: That Rear-Admiral Cammock with two Spanish Men of War had been in that Port, and had attempted to sieze an English Merchant Ship there, but was hindred by the Vigilance of the Governour Sig. Loredano, who ordered six Gallies, to lye by that Ship for her Defence, all the Time the Spaniards staid. On the 26th past the Procurator Sagredo made his publick Entry into the College, being accompanied by a great Number of the Senators in their Scarlet Robes. Last Night there was a long Debate in the Senate, about the Disbanding of several Regiments, but without coming to any Resolution. Letters from Verona say the Imperial Regiment of Gronsfelt had passed through the Veronese, and is to rest some Time at Mantua, there to be new clothed.

Berne, Oct. 5. The two Bailiffs, who on the Part of the two Cantons of Zurich and Bern sequestred the Abbot of St. Gall's Dominions during the late Disputes with that Prelate, are returned to their respective Homes, the new Abbot being now enter'd into full Possession of his Abbey, and all the Countries belonging to it. The Bailiff of this Canton was presented at his Departure by the said Prelate with a Purse of 100 Ducats, as a Mark of his Satisfaction, and desir'd to thank his Masters for the Justice and Impartiality they had shewn in the late Pacification, and his Re-establishment. There being an Article in the Treaty concluded at Baden the 15th of June last between the Abbot of St. Gall and the two Cantons, which stipulates an Am-

nesty in favour of all those who were banish'd on Account of the late Differences, most of those who had been out-law'd, are return'd home, except one Schnorpf, Secretary to the deceased Abbot, who had been excepted out of that Act of Oblivion. They write from Milan the 27th past, that the Republick of Genoa having granted Passage to three Imperial Regiments, that of Konigseck, Bareith and Zumjungen, were to march forthwith towards Genoa, in order to be imbark'd there for Naples.

Paris, Oct. 8. The Cardinal de Noailles has published a new Appeal, dated the 3d Instant, on Occasion of the Pope's Letter addressed to all the Faithful, and published at Rome the 8th of last Month, beginning with the Words *Pastoralis Officii*; to which new Appeal the Dean and Chapter of the Metropolitan Church of this City have unanimously adhered; in it his Eminency asserts, that his former Appeal from the Pope's Constitution *Unigenitus* to the next Council, suspends all the Acts and Proceedings from which he appealed, and has removed the Points which make the Subject of that Appeal to the Tribunal of the Universal Church, which has now the sole Cognizance and Determination of them; As therefore they are intirely taken out of the Pope's Hands, if he should pretend to make use of Censures or any Act of Jurisdiction to the Prejudice of the said Appeal, the Whole would be void, and ought to be looked upon as an Attempt against the Authority of the Universal Church. Yesterday the Faculty of Theology of the Sorbonne assembled, in order to appeal in their own Name against the above-named Letter or Brief of Separation, but they had only Time to hear three several Letters read, which have lately been

one dated October 18, 1716, which pretends to revoke all the Privileges, Immunities and Prerogatives formerly granted by the Popes to the Faculty of Theology of Paris: Another of the 16th of January, 1718, which condemns as Schismatical and Heretical the Appeals of the four Bishops, of the three Faculties of Paris, Rheims and Nantes, and of the Cardinal de Noailles: The third Letter was that of Separation or Excommunication above-mentioned of the 8th of September. They have appointed to meet again in an Extraordinary Assembly, when they will proceed to a final Resolution in this Matter. The Archbishop of Rouen, who has been all along a violent Zealor for the Pope's Constitution, caused an Ordinance to be publickly affixed there some Days ago, by which he exhorts the Faithful of his Diocess to separate themselves from, and have no Communion with the Appellants: But the Parliament of Rouen made an Arrêt the same Day, ordering the same to be taken down, and forbidding all further Publication of it, as being contrary to the Liberties of the Gallican Church.

Hague, Oct. 7. Sir Richard Vernon, His Britannick Majesty's late Envoy at the Court of the King of Poland, arrived here Yesterday from Dresden, and will shortly proceed on his Return to England. M. Hop, who was appointed some Time since to go Ambassadour from this State to the Court of France, set out Yesterday in one of the States Yachts for Brussels, thence to continue his Journey to Paris. We have Advice from Berlin, that the King of Prussia has written a Letter to the King of Denmark, dated the 22d of August last, in which his Majesty complains, that contrary to his Expectation, after what he had written about it to the King of Denmark in a Letter of the 19th of July, the Danish Privateers had insulted and seized some Prussian Merchant-Ships in Sight of his Fortresses situate on the Baltick, and had carried them to Copenhagen, where they had been declared lawful Prizes. Whereupon his Prussian Majesty demands, that his Subjects Ships so seized, should be restored in the same Condition they were when taken; and that his Danish Majesty should forbid his Privateers to insult any Ship in Sight

was this Summer at going out from Pillau. The Tumults in Groninghen have hindered the States of that Province from meeting at the Time appointed, to deliberate on their Accession to the Quadruple Alliance. These Troubles are occasioned by a Tax laid on the whole Country, for the Repairing their Dikes and Sea-Banks, which were for the most part broke down and carried away in the violent Storm last Winter. The West-Quarter of that Province, being at some Distance from the Sea, had refused to contribute with the rest towards the said Réparations; upon which it was agreed to refer their Differences to the Decision of a Deputation from the States General, which was accordingly sent thither, and the Repartition of the Taxes to be levied on every District for this Service, settled by them. But the Peasants of the West-Quarter, instead of submitting to this Decision, have taken Arms to the Number of 3600, and pillaged the Country-House of their principal Deputy, for having given his Consent to the said Repartition. A Detachment from the Town of Groninghen is sent against them.

Hague, Oct. 11. 'Tis expected the Affair of the Quadruple Alliance will soon be settled, four of the Provinces, besides Holland, having already consented to enter into that Treaty; and the Consent of the other two Provinces is daily expected. The Marquess de Prié has written hither, that he will set out from Brussels to Môtrow on his Way to this Place.

Whitehall, Oct. 6. Yesterday came Advice, that the Citadel of Messina held out on the 26th of September, N. S. and that 3000 Germans were put into the said Citadel.
