Warfaw, May 9.

Heir Majesties having been to pass fome time abroad in the Country, yesterday returned hither again, to be present at the Marriage of the Under General Demetrius Wisnowitski, with the Princess d' Offrog, Sister to the Prince of that name, which will be kept here the 11th instant, with all the pomp and splendor immaginable.

This morning came to Town the Grand Mareshal Sobiesky, and likewife the Archbishop of Gnesser, Primate of this Kigdom, together with several other of the Senators and Principal Officers of the Army, in order to affist at the Council of war, to be held here the 15th instant; in the mean time our Letters from Caminiec tell us, of the great spoyles done in those parts by the Tartars and Cossers, they having not onely pillaged and destroyed feveral simall Villages, together with such Gentlemens Houses as were thereabouts, but likewife according to their barbarous custome, carried the Inhabitants away Captives.

From *Muscovy* we have a great many uncertain reports, of the prefent posture of those Countries, though they all agree in this, that the Rebels are full very powerful there.

fill very powerful there. Maples, May 2. We are here in great expectation of the arrival of the Troops, which by his Catholick Majefties Commiffion, are raifing in the Emperors Hereditary Countries, for the fervice of this Kingdom, to reinforce our Maritime Garrifons, which are at prefent but thinn. We have been bf late much concerned at the great preparations which the Turks were faid to be making, to put out a very confiderable Fleet to Sea this Summer; but finding those reports to be without ground, our trouble is now pretty well over for this year.

The Corfairs of Barbary give us dayly new difturbances on our Coast, and very much interrupt our Trade; they have lately taken several Vessels, and amongst others, a rich ship bound hither from Venice, on the account of several of our most considetable Inhabitants.

The Marquis *de Bayonne*, General of the Galleys of *Sicily*, having put in at *Nifita*, and flayd there for -fome days, is gone again from thence on his way to *Palermo*.

Vienna, May 16. The Emperor continues fill with the Court at Laxemburgh, and is not expected back here these three weeks or month at sooneft; his Imperial Majefty is sending an Envoy to the Baffa of Buda to return the Complyment, he sent hither upon his coming to that Government, and to affure him of his Imperial Majeftics intentions to maintain inviolably the peace and friendship establisht between the two Empires.

The Nuncio Albrici remains here Incognito lince his arrival, intending on Saturday next to make his publick entry into this place, immediately after which, he will go to the Court at Laxemburgh, to pay his respects to his Imperial Majesty there.

From the Port we have advice, of the great pre-

parations that are making at Conflantinople, for the Circumcifing the Grand Signiors eldeft Son, which will be done with great folemnity, and with extraordinary Magnificence; That the Grand Vizier had intentions of marching very fuddainly, with an Army of 18000 men towards Belgrade, having already ordered all kinds of Provifions and other neceflaries to be in readinels for them; what their defign may be, is not known, but this affords great matter of jealoufie, especially to the Poles, who are not at all fatisfied of the good intentions of the Port towards them.

- From Presburgh they write, that there have been lately brought Prifoners, several of the Hungarian Gentry, in order to their Tryal before the Commissioners there, and amongst others, the Governor of the Castle of St. Andrew, for not having in that command which was of great trust, discharged himself with that fidelity, as became the duty of himsplace.

From Cologne, our laft Letters give us a better account of things then formerly, fo that we hope our fears for those parts may after all blow over. We dayly expect the arrival here of the Count de Winditggrazz, late Envoy from the Emperor in the Court of France.

Paris, May 30. From Dunkirke we have advice of their Majellies removal from thence for Lifle, together with the Camp: fome begin to talk already of the Kings return hither, but the time is yet very uncertain. The Marquis de Saignelay, fon to Mon-J fleur Colbert, is arrived here from Venice and Rome; and now all the difcourfe is of his Martiage with the Daughter of Monfieur d' Aligre heretofore fpoken of.

It is faid, that the Popes Nonce in this Court, hath by an Exprés received orders from Rome, to leave his employment hère, and to país to Avignon, to be Vice-Legat there, but the Court being absent, it is thought he will be forced to flay fome time to expect their Majeflies arrival; in the mean time here is arrived the Abbot Vibo from Rome, with the Character of Internuntlo, till hisHolinefs thall have made choice of fome other to fucceed the Sieur Bargellini the prefent Nonce,

From *Turin* we have advice, that Monfieur *Clo* who was there to raife two Regiments for the fervice of his most Christian Majesty, had not yet begun his Levies, and that it was faid, he would not for fome particular reasons make any there, but would go for *Florence*, to treat with the Great Duke concerning the fame matter.

From Venice they write, that the Marquis de St. "Andre Monbrun, who ferved that Republick, during their late wars with the Turk in Candia, with fo much honour and gallantry; hath declared his intentions of coming to pais fome time in this Court, and that we may accordingly in a short time expect his arrival here.

That the affairs in *Dalmatia* remain in one pofture, but that much was hoped from the prudence and care of the Commiffioners, in the accommodating of those matters.

Milan, May 9. The General Muster which was to have been made here the roth instant of all the Militic livia of these Countries, in order to the disbanding of several Troops, is now put off till the raturn of the Courrier, which our Governor the Duke d' Offuna some time fince fent to the Court at Madrid, to know her Majesties last resolutions in that matter; his Excellency being of opinion, that feeing their Neighbours are on all fides reinforcing their Troops, they ought rather to be continued on foot this Summer, for the fecurity of the publick peace, though in the m. an time, the Inhabitants complain and wish nothing more then to be eased of part of the great charge they are at prefent at.

From Legborn they write, 'hat the Great Duke had given directions for the fitting out all his Galleys immediately, ro clear thole Coalts of Pyrates, which have of late begun again to interrupt our Trade, and that his Highnel's had appointed the Count de Novellara Gentleman of his Bedchamber, to go and Complement on his part the Duke of Mansous upon his late Marriage with the Princels of Guaffalls.

Venice, May 13. Some days fince Signior Varefe the Popes Nuncio made his publick entry here, accompanied by the Chevalier Moccenigo, and feveral of the Senators, with the Ceremonies accuflomed on fuch occasions, and the next day had his first Audience of the Duke and Senate.

A veffel of this Port arriving here fome days fince, tels us, that the Corfairs of Tripoli are very bufie about Cape Spartavento, having of late taken feveral Genoua Veffels, and one belonging to this place.

We have heard nothing from Procurator Nani fince his departure from hence, but expect with much impatience an account of his meeting with the Commiffioners appointed by the Grand Signior to adjuft with him the matters of the Limits, From the Port they write, that Monfieur de Nointel, Ambassi and Audience of the Grand Signior at Adrianople, but that his Excellency seems not too well satisfied at the little success he hath hitherto had, in some part of his Negotiation with those Ministers.

From Ragufa we have advice, that the Captain Baffa was at length put to Sea, with a Fleet of 60 Galleys, though not faid on what defign. From Rome our Letters tell us, that Don Pedro d'Arragon Vice-Roy of Naples, hath lately written to his Holinefs, in the name of her Catholick Majefty, reprefenting unto him the preparations which the Turks are making, for the putting to Sea a very confiderable Fleet; that therefore his Holinefs would in regard to the peace of Chriftendom, give order for the fitting out a fquadron of Galleys to joyn with thofe of Sicily, Naples, and Maltha, to keep the Sea this Summer, in order to the preventing any defign, the Turks may have upon them.

Leghorn, May 18. This Morning arrived here Sir fohn Finch from Florence, where he hath been feveral years Refident from the King of England, on his way home. In fome days may depart from hence the Centurion Frigat, with about 20 fayl of Merchant men under his Convoy for Engl:nd. Signior Magalotti is arrived at Florence, to raife a Regiment in thefe parts, for the fervice of his most Christian Majefly.

Bruffels, May 29. His Excellency the Count de Monterey hath been for feveral days at Ghent, and to morrow is expected here again. In the interim, his Excellency hath given directions for a fifth Months pay to the Army, who are kept now under fo ftrict difcipline, that it is death to take the fmalleft thing from any of the Inhabitants, or to ftir out of their Garrifon without leave, infinitely to the content and eafe of the People.

Several Ladies of the greatest quality, and amongst others, the Princess de Mamines, the Durchess de Villa Hermosa, and the Countess de Cattanagetta, are preparing to go and visit her most Christian Majesty at Acth.

Don Pedro de Zavalles hath fome days fince by an Express from Spain, received his Commission to be Governor of Cambray, but he being at present extreamly ill, will not be able, for some time at least, to enter upon the execution of that charge: here is a report, as if Don Francisco de Velasco were appointed by the Queen Regent to succeed him in his Government of Ostend, but this is much doubted.

His Excellency hath given directions for the making of four thousand grey Coats, lined with Red, for the Clothing of the Spanish Regiments. The Duke of Saxen Lawenburgh, having passed feveral days in viewing the Curiositi's of this place, fome days fince passed hence, together with his Dutchels, on their way for Holland.

Dutchels, on their way for Holland. His most Christian Majesty is gone from Life for Tournay, and is faid to have with him, onely 4000 Horse, which are to attend him as the guard of his Body.

Liste, May 30. The 27th inftant in the afternoon, their most Christian Majesties arrived here from Dunkirke, having been that day entertained at dinner at Armentiens, by the Marcshal d'Humieres our Governor; that evening the King was pleased to spend in visiting the Cittadel, and the Fortifications of the place: The next day their Majesties affisted at the folenun Procession, according to the Devotion of the day, and the 29th went hence again for Oudenarde, intending the next day for Tournay, and after fome days stay there for Aeth.

Dublin, May, 20. This Morning about two of the Clock happened here a very unfortunate accident of Fire in the great Store House, which is in the middle of the Castle Tard, which burnt with that violence, that notwithstanding all the endeavors of my Lord Lievtenant, who appeared there in person upon the first Allarme, in few hours it had quite consumed the faid Store house; in the mean time his Excellency having caufed feveral of the small Houses thereabouts to be blown up, at three several times, it had so good effect, that the Fire began to abate, and be less violent; and at length, by the blef-fing of God, and the great care and diligence of his Excellency, together with feveral perfons of quality, and amongst others, more particularly of my Lord Fohn Butler, who was extraordinary active and affifting on this occasion, the Fire was happily quenched without any farther mischief: It fortunately happened, that his Excellency had fome time before, cauled most of the Powder to be removed from thence, excepting only two Barrels, which were recovered our of the Store house, and made use of, for the blowing up of the other Buildings ; by what accident this Fire began is not yet known.

Whitehal, May 27. This Morning His Majefty parted hence for Windfor, whither Her Majefty likewife went yesterday, and was followed this afternoon by his Royal Highness, in order to the folemnising of St Georges Feast, which will be done on Monday next, with much Splendor and Magnificences Their Majesties farther intending to remain there for some time with the whole Court.
