Vienna, May 30.

THe 25th instant the Popes Nuncio Signior *Albrici*, made his publick entry at *Laxenburgh*, and the next day had Audience of their Imperial Majesties. Yesterday went hence the Count *de Rothal*, together with the Archbishop of *Grana* for *Presburgh*, in Order to the finishing the Procefs of several of the *Hungarian* Nobility, who are Prisoners there, about the late Rebellion.

The Count *de Windisgratz*, late Envoy from his Imperial Majesty in *France*, is returned hither, and yesterday went to the Court at *Laxenburgh* to attend the Emperor there. The Envoy sent lately by the Emperor to the Port, is as we are told on his way home again, having been received there with great kindness and respect.

Lis'pn, May 12. The 5th instant arrived here the Popes Nuncio, after having been long expected, in a French man of War from *Rochelle*; he was received from on ship board in the Princes own Barges, and at his landing was saluted with all the great Guns round the Castle; he is at present incognito, preparing for his publick Entry and Audience. Here is lately dead the Conde d' *Avintes*, a person of great esteem in this Court.

Some days since unluckily happened a quarrel between the Marquess *de Fontes*, and the Conde *de Prado*, in which the former received several wounds; though it is hoped, none of them will prove mortal. There is lately arrived a Fleet of 40 Sayl of Dutch Merchant ships at *Sevuball*, to lade Salt on the account of the States General of the United Provinces; that Resident hath likewise dispatcht as many more from hence, so that, as it is said, these, together with 30 Sayl more that are almost laden here, will be able to carry away the Residue of the value of a Million of Cruzados; the Summe which this Crown is obliged by Treaty to pay that State at present in Salt.

We very suddenly expect the arrival of the Dutches of *Cadix* out of *France*, being told, that his most Christian Majesty hath ordered the Count d' *Espeur* Squadron, consisting of 15 men of War, to attend her in her passage hither.

The 20th instant went hence the Ambassador, on his way to *Rome*, with intentions to go first for *Genoa*, and there expect the arrival of the Bishop of *Lion*; to proceed with him on his journey thither. Here is lately arrived Signior *Michele*, Ambassador from the Republick of *Venice* to the Court of *France*, who after some few days stay here to refresh himself, will proceed on his way to *Paris*. The Popes Nuncio residing here, being appointed by his Holiness to go, in the same quality to *Poland*. The Duke of *Thurs* is last in order to it.

It is said, our King hath ordered to be raised up Companies of the youth of *London*, which shall in all consist of near three thousand, to be ready upon any suddain accident.

Milan, May 27. Munday last being the Birth day of our Governour, was celebrated here with Feasting and oth M^r ceremonies, usual upon the like occasions. All the Nobility about the Town having been first to

wait upon his Excellency, with the Compliment of *ad multos Annos*.

We impatiently expect here the return of our Courier from the Court of *Spain*, by which we hope, to receive her Majesties positive directions, for the disbanding of the new raised Troops, though his Excellency in the mean time continues of opinion, that considering the present posture of our Neighbors, they ought by all means to be kept on foot, at least for this Summer.

In few days his Excellency intends to go hence for *Cremona*, to visit the Fortifications of that place.

Hambrough, June 2. From *Copenhagen* they write, of the splendid preparations which they continue to make there, for the Coronation of their Majesties at *Frederixburgh*, but that the day for the performance of the Solemnity was not as yet declared, to avoid as is said, the great concourse of people that may flock thither from the Neighbouring parts; and that Mr. *Bartue* Envoy from His Majesty of Great Britain, was dayly expected to arrive there.

Rarisbonne, June 4. The Emperor having by several Letters pressed this Dyet to a final conclusion of the matters of the Publick Security and Perpetual Capitulation, they have at length concluded on a Project, to be sent to their several Principals, to have their opinions in it, before they enter upon the thing it self.

The Bishop d' *Aichstadt* Commissioner for his Imperial Majesty at this Dyet, continues still at his house in the Country, and will not be here till about the beginning of the next Month.

Marseilles, June 9. Yesterday morning arrived a Bark of this place, who in her voyage for *Terruan* on the coast of *Barbary*, met at *Majorca* one of the English Fregats (the Commander wee know not) who having examined the Patron, and finding it seems some suspicion of his having Jews goods on board, carried him with him to Sir *Edward Spragg* the English Admiral on the Coast of *Barbary*, who finding the poor Patron innocent, did not onely restore his Bark and Goods, but made him what other satisfaction he could demand, not without some re- vention to the Captain for his severity.

Brussels, June 10. The 6th instant the Prince *de Machines* arrived at the French Court at *Tournay*, with a very fair Trayn of his own attendants, besides several persons of the greatest quality, that accompanied him on this occasion; the next day he had Audience of their Majesties, by whom he was very kindly received; he hath been since his arrival defrayed at the Kings cost, and will be during his farther stay, which will not be long, he intending within few days to be back again here.

To morrow the Count *de Monterey* intends to make a step to *Antwerp*, with intentions, to return in a day or two at farthest. The Government send is not yet disposed of, nor is it yet certain who may have it.

Ghent, June 11. The French Court is still at *Tournay*, where the Fortifications are almost finished, so that it is thought, the King will in few days remove to *Aeth*, his Majesty expressing a great desire to see the new Works there likewise perfected,

sected, before he leaves these Countries, and to that end, will be present himself there, to see all hands set on work.

The Prince of *Mechelenburgh* some days since passed through this place for *Aeth*.

Hamborough, June 12. By private letters from *Brunswick* we are told, that the Inhabitants are unanimously resolved to defend the place, so far as that they are ready to accuse those of Treason, that offer but to mention the contrary: That they were in a better condition then was at first thought; and, That they were with great resolution preparing to receive the Attacques of the Enemy, who were approached with their Works within shot of their Fortifications, but had not as yet fired one gun against the Place.

From *Warsaw* we hear of a great Body of Tartars that were come into the *Ukrain*, to joyn as was thought with the Cossacks there, and then to attempt some of the Frontier places of that Kingdom. That the King had given positive directions for the making every thing ready, in order to his going into the Field in person the 20th of the next Month, against which time he hath summoned all the Nobility of the Kingdom to appear in Arms, in the head of whom his Majesty is resolved to face the Stern that seems at present to threaten those Countries.

The Grand Marshal *Sobieski* is going thence for *Lepol*, to secure in the interim those parts against any suddain surprize from the Infidels.

Hague, June 16. Tomorrow as we are told, his Highness the Prince of *Orange* goes hence, accompanied with several persons of Quality, towards the Camp before *Brunswick*; and at the same time it is likewise said, the Ambassador *de Groot* will set forward on his return to the French Court. On Friday last went hence several Deputies from the Council of State towards *Maestricht*, and those other Frontier places, to see that all things be in a good condition there, and that nothing be wanting for their security and defence.

Our Fleet, consisting of 18 men of War, 4 Frigats, 4 Fireships, and other small Advice-Boats, continues plying on the Coast of *Zealand*; we are told, that the Squadron of the Province of *Groningen*, is likewise put to Sea to joyn with them; but of this, we have as yet no certainty.

With much satisfaction we receive the news of the safe arrival of 11. of our *East India* ships; Five of which, are for the Account of the Chamber of *Amsterdam*, and are already come up near to that place. By Letters from the *Lunenburgh* Army before *Brunswick*, of the 9th instant we have advice, that the great discourse they had there of an accommodation with the Town, was quite come to nothing; that now they were endeavoring with all the industry imaginable to approach it, and to bring their great Guns to bear upon the place, so as to do most execution; that in the mean time they had sent in another Trumpeter, to persuade those Inhabitants to submit themselves, before they began their Batteries and made use of their power to force them to it; And that upon his return, unless the answer were to their satisfaction, they would proceed to attacke the place with all the force they could.

From *Bylevelt* we are told, of some difficulties that are risen there, concerning the admitting of the Deputies of the Princes of *Zell* and *Hanouer*, as Mediators at that Treaty, which the Deputies from the Bishop of *Munster*, will by no means be brought to allow of, and those from the Duke of *Wolfembutel* as obstinately insist upon; how they

will conclude the matter is not known, but in the mean time the Treaty advances but little.

From *Cologn* they write of the 12th instant, that the Preliminary Treaty between them and that Elector, goes on but slowly, by reason his Electoral Highness still persists in his demands, of having several of the Inhabitants delivered up to him, and the new Fortifications of the Town demolished, &c. however, that they are not without hopes, that all things will yet do well, through the continual endeavors of the Mediators, who on the 17th instant are to bring in such Proposals, as they shall find most equal for the concluding these differences; in the mean time the Great Council (consisting of 44 Senators) is to meet within few days, to consult about the means for raising of Money towards the support of their present extraordinary expences. The Fortifications at *Engelsteen* are almost finished, which will be of great strength and security to the Town.

Paris, June 16. From the Court at *Tournay*, we have letters which advise us, that the Marquis *de Sillery*, and Monsieur *de Ruigni* were returned thither from *Holland*, where they had been out of curiosity to see those parts: That the King had ordered a hundred pieces of great Cannon to be brought from *Donay*, to be placed in the Citadel there: That there was a report of Commissions to be given out by the King for the making of new Leavies to reinforce his Army: That their Majesties had thoughts to depart the fifteenth instant with the whole Court for *Aeth*, where his Majesty intended to stay about eight days, and then make a step to visit *Binche*, *Charleroy* and *Philipville*, and so to return to *Aeth* again; from whence their Majesties are expected here about the tenth of the next month.

Chester, June 10. On Monday last was sevensnight, his Excellency *John Lord Berkeley*, Lord Lieutenant of *Ireland*, parted from *Dublin* to *Rings-end*, accompanied by all the Nobility and persons of Quality about Town in their Coaches, where his Excellency embarked on one of His Majesties Yachts, in order to his passing over into *England*, but the winds proving contrary, his Excellency was hindered in his passage, and forced to go on shoar again at *Dunlary*, Six miles from *Dublin*, where he continued till the 5th instant, when his Excellency embarked again with a fair wind, and the 6th safely arrived here; the next day his Excellency proceeded on his way for *Windfor*, to attend His Majesty there.

Whitehall, June 13. Yesterday about ten a clock in the morning, His Majesty, accompanied by His Royal Highness, and attended by several of the Nobility and other Principal persons of the Court, arrived here from *Windfor*; and having dined with Her Majesty at *Somerset-house*, about six in the Evening returned again, together with His Royal Highness for *Windfor*; as did also Her Majesty with Her Court.

London, June 14. Yesterday the Right Reverend Father in God *Walter* late Lord Bishop of *Oxon*, was at *St Mary's Savoy*, in the presence of all the Bishops in Town, with the usuall Solemnity, Translated to the See of *Worcester*.
