WO Dutch Veffels having taken in at Stockholm for Holland a Lading of Iron, Copper, and fome Brass Cannon; and being provided with necessary Passports by M. Burmania the States Ambassadour at the Court of Sweden, proceeded on their Voyage; but meeting with bad Weather and contrary Winds at Sea, were obliged to take Shelter a few Days ago in this Road, and afterwards came up the River with De-fign to remain here till Winter is over. M. Wilbois, Commadore of the three Muscovite Frigates that are here, being informed what the Lading of the faid Dutch Ships was, and that they came from Sweden, went on the 14th Inftant, without the leaft Notice given to our Magistrates, on board them, with about 100 of his Men, and after he had fearched the faid Ships, and placed Guards of his Men in them, took away with him their Rudders, and most of their Sails, under Pretext that the Cannon were his Mafter's, and had been taken by the Swedes at the Battle of Nerva. The Magistrates have made their Reprefentations against this Proceeding, but he has not yet given them any Anfwer.

Lisbon, Jan. 27, N. S. This Court has been for these four or five Days last past at Salvaterra, a Country Seat belonging to the Crown, about 10 Leagues distant from this City, to take the Diversion of Hunting. The 21st Instant the Bahia Fleet arrived here, of which three Ships were lost upon the Bar, by endeavouring to come in in the Night; besides one Ship richly laden, which was taken out of their Fleet by a Pyrate upon the Coast of Pernambuco.

On the other hand, those of Lausane alledge in their Defence, that the forementioned Abridgment had been made with no other Intention, but that of relieving the Memory of their Scholars. It is faid M. Conftance, Chief Professor of Divinity at Lausane, will refign his Chair. Meffieurs D'Avarey, two of the French Ambaffadour's Sons, were expected here fome Days ago from Soleurre; but it feems they have put off their Journey hither to another time. The two Cantons of Zurich and Bafil have very charitably contributed towards the Relief of the poor Sufferers by the last dreadful Fire at Franckfort. It is computed that in the former City, and in that of Wintherthur, fituated in the Canton of Zurich, there has been collected 4278 Crowns, and what has been gathered at Bafil amounts to 6000 Florins.
