Venice, July 19.

ON the 11th Instant Mr. Burges, His Britannick Majesty's Resident with this Republick, had his first Audience of the Doge and Senate, and was received with all the Marks of Honour paid to the Residents of Crowned Heads.

Madrid, July 22. Sig. Pozobueno, who is appointed his Catholick Majesty's Minister to the Court of Great Britain, having received his Instructions, is preparing to begin his Journey in three or four Days. Mr. Schaub set out from hence last Night for Paris.

Copenhagen, Aug. 3. The King of Denmark had resolved to make a Turn in Jutland and to return to Colding, where his Ministers had Orders to meet him: But his Majesty has put off his Journey, and is gone only to review some Troops on this Island and Falster and Laland, and returns the end of next Week. The Lord Carteret is gone with his Majesty. Letters from Stockholm of the 13th past, say the King of Sweden was gone to Gaffe to review the Troops there: The Embargo that was laid upon all Merchant Ships in that Port, was taken off; and the Government had ordered a Sum of Money to be paid to the Masters of those Ships for the time they had been detained.

Hanover, Aug. 6, N. S. His Majesty continues in perfect Health. The Duke of York arrived here the 3d Instant. The King of Prussia is expected by the 16th.

Hague, Aug. 6. On Saturday last the 3d Instant, N. S. about six in the Evening, died the Grand Pensionary M. Heinsius, in the 80th Year of his Age. He had discharged this Employment near thirty Years, in very difficult Times, and with great Applause; and has left behind him the Character of an able and honest Minister. The States of Holland, have been already convened for the

10th Instant; but it is believed they will hardly be able to chuse a new Pensionary in that Assembly.

Hague, Aug. 9. Yesterday the Corpse of the late Grand Pensionary, M. Heinsius, was carried to Delft, to be buried in that Town, where his Family is settled, and where he was formerly Pensionary: It was only accompanied by three Coaches, and some few Servants of the States, as he had desired, in a Manner intirely suitable to the modest Plainness with which he had always lived and acted.
