**H**IS Majesty has been pleased to confer the Dignity of a Baron of the Kingdom of Ireland on Charles Whitworth, Esq; whom His Majesty has appointed one of His Ambassadors Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary for the Congress at Brunswick.

**Hanover, Oct. 11, O. S.** The Earl of Sunderland arrived here last Night, and this Evening proceeded on his Journey for England. His Majesty is expected here from the Gohre on Monday next the 17th Instant.

**Stockholm, Oct. 1, O. S.** Since the King's Return to Town, several Conferences have been held with the Misdovite Adjutant-General Romantoff. The Season beginning to be very cold, the Squadron under Baron Wachtmeester's Command, which had the North-East Station on this Coast, is now come into a better Road within six or seven Leagues of this Place; and the British Ships which made Part of that Squadron, have joined the rest under Sir John Norris at the Dahlers. The present rainy Weather incoming also the Troops about Gasse, they are ordered to separate and march to their respective Winter Quarters.

**Genoa, Oct. 15.** By our Accounts from Marfeilles it appears, that the Number of the Inhabitants of that Place is so much lessened, that fewer People die there of the Plague than before, though it be as violent as ever; and they reckon the following Towns and Villages in that Neighbourhood to be infected, viz. Aubagne, Vitralles, Alaufh, Marignan, Lescabin, Gaillon, Calican, Mariagna, Aunada, Lespones, Apr, Aquilles, Cassis, Mensaque, Beaucaire, and Aix. We have Advice from Florence, that the Great Duke of Tuscany is fallen so very ill, that there is little Hopes of his Recovery. The Spanish Envoy here has received fresh Instructions to insist with this State upon their giving ample Satisfaction to the Pope on account of their proceeding with Cardinal Albront.

**Paris, Oct. 26.** The Plague having spread it self on this Side the Durance, the Duke Regent to prevent its further Progress, has given timely Orders for guarding the River Here, which being rapid and scarce fordable in any Place, it is hoped the Troops will be able to hinder any one's passing it by stealth. Yesterday an Arrêt was published containing Regulations for preventing the Communication of the Infection, and providing at the same time for the Necessities of the Country afflicted by it, as also allowing some Trade with Provence under certain Precautions and Restrictions. It has been rumoured here that an Ambassadour from the Ottoman Porté was arrived at Foulon, but it proves a Mistake: Orders are given for his landing at the Port of Cete, where he is to perform his Quarantain, and to be conducted thence to Bourdeaux, where the King's Coaches and Equipages are to receive him. The daily Allowance appointed for this Ambassadour during his Stay in this Kingdom is 1000 Livres.

**Hague, Oct. 25, N. S.** Three Dutch Ships being lately arrived at the Texel, two of them from Marfeilles, and the other from the Levant (but last from the Coast of Provence,) the States General came this Day to a Resolution that the said Ships shall be immediately burnt with their Cargo; and that all the Persons on board them shall be obliged to come on Shore quite naked, to perform Quarantain upon one of the Islands of the Texel appointed for that Purpose; and accordingly their High Mightinesses have dispatched an Express to the Texel, with the proper Orders for putting in Execution this their Resolution.
