

# The London Gazette.

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Ratisbonne, June 25.

**T**He Drums have beared here for several days together for the Emperour, not without drawing great numbers into Service, all sorts of people expressing a more then ordinary readines to serve his Imperial Majesty; and the more, seeing it is long since any Leavies have been made here before upon this account.

This day the respective Deputies assembled again for the first time, since the last Holy days; the Bishop of *Aichstadt* is dayly expected to return hither out of the Country, which it is thought, may be the sooner, by reason of the conference which is appointed between him and the Duke of *Wirtenbergh* for the accommodating the differences at present depending between the Elector of *Bavaria*, and this Town

*Genova*, June 24. The Prince *Dorid*, as we are told, hath lately by an Expres from *Madtid*, received Letters from the Queen Regent, letting him know, that his Marriage with the Sister of the Prince *Pamphilio* is much to her satisfaction and goodliking; with which, that Prince immediately went to acquaint the Senate, who upon this occasion received him with very extraordinary respect and kindness.

Here is at present not any farther discourse of the difference depending between this State and the See of *Rome*, which makes us hope, that matter to be in a very fair way to be speedily made up again, to the content of both parties. Our Senate is wholly employed about the choice they are to make of a new Doge, the time of the others Government being almost expired.

We expect here the Sieur *Magalotti*, on his return from *Rome*; the Duke of *Parma*, it is said, hath given leave to some Officers sent thither by the said Sieur *Magalotti*, to raise Six Companies of Foot within his Dominions, which with those to be raised in other parts, are to make up the Royal Regiment, intended to consist of 2000 Men.

*Rome*, June 27. On Munday last the Grand Prior of *Bohemia*, who is at present here, with the Character of Ambassador of Obedience from the Great Master and Order of *Malta*, made his solemn Entry into this place, accompanied by most of the Nobility about Town, all on horse back, and followed by the Popes Guards, besides his own Trayn, which was very numerous, and in Apparel extraordinary splendid, every thing else being suitable and very magnificent; the 30 instant, it is said, his Excellency is to be received in a private Consistory, to be then held for that purpose.

On Tuesday last went hence Signior *Magalotti* for *Florence*, not having, as is said, been able to effect any thing here in the business he came about, which was chiefly to desire leave to raise a Regiment in the Ecclesiastical Dominions, for the Service of his most Christian Majesty; The next day arrived here the Bishop of *Laon*, and is at present lodged in the Palace *de Farnese*, but hath not hitherto either received or made any visits, except from

Some of his particular Friends, by reason they have not as yet agreed in what manner he ought to be treated, he pretending to more then what is usually practised to Bishops, as being Duke and Pais of *France*.

The same day was held a Consistory, where his Holiness was likewise pleased to be present, to the great satisfaction of that Assembly, who with much joy observed his Holiness to be very strong and healthy, even beyond expectation, considering his great age; nothing was done there, save the proposing of several new Bishops, to the Sees at present vacant.

Here is lately come hither out of *Germany*, the Heer *Sporke*, General of the Emperours Horse, together with his Lady, with intentions to spend some short time at this Court. It is much discoursed of a Marriage concluding between the Cardinal *Altieri's* second Niece, and the Brother of the Cardinal *Federico Borromeo*, in favor of which, his Eminence, it is said, is to settle upon his Brother, the Dutchy of *Ceri*, of which he is at present possessed.

Great endeavors are used for the adjusting the difference between the Constable *de Colonna*, and the Prince's *Sulmona* and *Palestrina-Borghese*, concerning the Ranke they are to have, at all publick Entries and other Ceremonies of that Nature, in which, we hope the better success, seeing those Princes are all come to Town, with thoughts, as is said, to be present at the great Solemnity to be performed to morrow by the Spanish Ambassador, who according to custom then pays the annual Tribute for the Kingdom of *Naples*.

*Venice* June 30. From the Port we have advice, that the Bailly *de Molino*, Ambassador there from this State, hath had several conferences with the Grand Visier, concerning the affairs of *Dalmatia*, who as well then, as on all other occasions, hath expressed a great readines to forward by all means imaginable, the conclusion of that work, and to that end, hath promised, that the new Bassa of *Bossina* shall have full Power and Authority to determine with the Commissioners of this Republick that affair; they farther write, of a great Eire which hath lately happened at *Constantinople*, by which some hundreds of Houses have been destroyed, and other considerable damage done, to that place; and that the Plague continues still with much violence in those Countries, to the utter ruine and destruction almost of the poor Inhabitants.

*Marseilles*, July 4. By a Vessel arrived here from *Smirna*, we have advice, that the Gallies of *Malta* have lately had a rencounter with Three *Argiers* men of War, on the Coast of *Sicily*, one of which carrying about 35 Guns and 300 Men they took, the other two making their escape, by the favour of the wind.

By a Bark come in here from *Genova*, we are told, that Sir *Edward Spragge* with the Squadron of English Fregats under his command, was passed by that place for *Tunis* and *Tripoli*, to renew and ratify the Articles the King of *England* hath with those people.

*Vienna*:

*Vienna, July 5.* The Emperor having given directions for the terminating the 28th instant, the Commission at *Presburgh*, we expect the Count *de Rothal*, together with the rest of the Commissioners, to return hither with a large and particular account of all that hath passed there during their Session.

We are told, that there is on his way hither from the Port, an Aga, with a Trayn of above threecore persons, and that he is come within some Miles of this place; his errand, as is said, being only to assure this Court, of the Grand Signiors constant Resolution, punctually to observe the Peace, at present establisht between the two Empires. Yesterday arriv'd here an Express from the Governor of *Transchein*, with advice, that the Turks had lately with a great party, fallen into the Quarters of the Heydukes, within three German miles of that place, and that having set Fire to two Villages, they were retired again, carrying away with them, most of the people they found there.

The Empress is certainly, as we are told, with Child again; which together, with the advice we have from *Poland* of that Queens being likewise with Child, hath filled this Court with great joy.

*Hambrough, July 10.* Our Magistrates continue still to raise Men, and to make all possible provision for the defence and security of this place, in case of an attacke from any of our Neighbours. From *Copenhagen* they write, that there lies ready before that place Ten Danish men of War, several of which, are of considerable force, and only expect orders to sayl; which, together with the Leavies that are making, as well in *Danemarch*, in *Holsteyn* and other places for the Service of that King, occasions much discourse of a design upon this place.

From *Brunswick* we have advice, that all hands are there at work in the raising of a Cittadel, which the Duke of *Wolfenbuttel* proposes to have finished in two Months or three at farthest; that the Inhabitants are not suffered to come upon the Walls of the Town, or to meet together in any number above four or five.

From *Warsaw*, that the Tartars have lately made an other incursion, into some of the Frontier parts of the Kingdom, and had carryed many people away with them, the Under-General *Demetrius Wisnowitski* very hardly, and with much difficulty escaping the same fortune, who it seems was there a hunting with some few Gentlemen only.

That the King continued his resolution of parting from thence the 6th instant towards *Lublyn*, and after some short stay there, to *Leopol*, where the general Rendezvouz is appointed.

*Hague, July 14.* From *Overyssell* they write, that those States are about choosing Officers, for the Regiments they are to raise; and that at present there seems to be more likelihood then ever, of adjusting the differences which have been so long on foot in that Province.

From *Bylevelt* we are told, that the Deputies that lately went thence on the part of these States for *Brunswick*, finding that Town surrendered before their arrival, immediately returned again to be present at the Treaty, which ought to be concluded there, though as yet they have not, as we can hear, made any progress in it, by reason of the many difficulties which daily arise.

*Brussels, July 12.* Some days since arriv'd here an Extraordinary Courier from *Vienna*, upon what errand we yet know not. The Princess *de Maminis* is returned hither from *Aeth*, where she hath been to visit her most Christian Majesty,

upon the kinde Invitation she received from her Majesty to that purpose.

All the Cavalry that were quartered about this place, are now ordered to return again to their former Garrisons, and the Six Companies of Spanish Infantry lately sent to *Moor*, are as we are told, on their March hither again; the Fortifications of this place advance dayly, as likewise do those at *Ghent*, *Bruges* and other places; a work upon which our Governor is wholly intent, and in the forwarding of which his Excellency employs a very extraordinary care and diligence.

The States of *Brabant* are at present assembled by his Excellencies order, for the raising a farther supply of Money; his Excellency we are told hath demanded of them a Million of Florins, and it is thought, they will without much difficulty be brought to agree to that Summe.

From *Aeth* they write, that the Army is now separated, and ordered to march to several quarters, excepting only 5000 Men, who continue to work on the Fortifications of that place. Here is arriv'd on his way for *Holland* Don *Emmanuel de Lyra*, Ambassador to those States from the Crown of *Spain*. His Excellency, it is said, has intention of going into *Gelderland*, to visit that Province.

*Hague, July 17.* The States of *Holland* are at present assembled, and as is said, are about raising the impositions on Wines, but that being a matter of great moment, it is thought, it may take up some time before it be brought to a determination. The Dukes of *Lunenburg* have by Letters acquainted the States General of the Surrender of *Branswick*, to the Duke of *Wolfenbuttel*, and his having received the homage of those Magistrates there upon: it is thought, the States will return an answer by way of Congratulation.

From *Berlin* they write, that Prince *Mauritz* parted thence the 7th instant on his way hither; and that the same evening his Electoral Highness of *Braudenburgh*, together with his Highness the Prince of *Orange* returned thither from *Custryn*. The Town of *Hambrough* continues still very apprehensive of some approaching storm; and some say, that by their Resident here, they have made their applications to these States, to desire their assistance, in case they should stand in need thereof.

We speak here very variously of the affairs of *Collogn*; certain it is, those Magistrates have advice from good hands to look to themselves.

*Paris, July 18.* Their Majesties having with the whole Court left *Aviz* the 7th instant, and lodg'd that night at *Quersnoy*; the next day they arriv'd at *St. Quentin*; the 9th they came from thence to *Compiene*; the 10th to *Luzarche*; the 11th to *Maisons*; the 12th they arriv'd at *Persailles*, and the next day at *St. Germain*, where their Majesties have since received the Condoleances of all the Forreign Ministers residing at this Court, upon the death of the Duke of *Anjou*.

*Deale, July 11.* Yesterday and this day arriv'd in the Downet several Merchant men from the *Sueights*, *Barbados*, *Virginia*, and other places abroad.
