Plymouth, Fuly 18, Is Majefty having at his arrival here yesterday in the Evening been received in the Road, by the Earl of Bith in his Shalop, and attended at his coming ashoar by the Mayor and Aldermen in their For

The Prince of Monaço is lately come hither, together with his Lady, intending to pass some thort time here, as being nearly allyed to this prefent Doge.

Mudrid, fuly 8. Wienna, July 12. The toth inftant the Turkish by arrived here with a Trays of near 60 performs he was received with the usual Ceremonios, and corducted to the Lodgings prepared for him by the Hupptors order ; and yetterday he had Audienceps Gonthel of War, to whom he prefented feverat Extters from the Visier of Buda, with farther afforances of a most entire friendship. After which he defired he might be admitted to pay his re-fpects to the Emperor, which was excuted by the faid Prefident, by reason he had not any Letters from the Grand Signior for his Imperial Majefty, bat was onely lent on the part of the faid Vifier of Buda.

, The States of *Upper Hungary* have, as is faid, refuled to receive the Emperors late Edict, for the granting a general Pardon for all crimes and mildemeanors committed by any of the Nobility during the late rebellion, alleadging themfelves to be altogether innocent of any luch thing, and fo not to need any pardon. The Commiffion at *Presburgh* is continued till the 16th inftant.

Marfeilles, fuly 14. By Letters from Spain we are informed, that the Corfairs of Sally, have of late been very busic about the Straights-mouth; that they have Nine Sayl abioad in courie, and Fiy more at home in Port, two whereof carrying 18 and S Guns apiece, and the reft from 8 to 12 Guns apiece.

It is faid, that two French Friggts have lately deftroyed two of their beft Ships, but of this we expect a farther confirmation. Some days fluce fayled out of this Port four French Galleys, and three Galliots; three Galleys more will follow in a day or two; we are told, they are to joyn with the other Galleys at prefent abroad, under the command of Monfieur de Vivogne, upon what defign we know not, though fome fpeak, as if they were to be employed againft Tunis or Tripoli; which is the rather believed here, feeing we are informed by a Bark lardy arrived from the Coaft of Barbary, that in their way hither, they met 13 French men of War, bound from Thoulon for Tripoli.

We have advice that Sir Edward Spragge is paffed by with the Fleet under his command for *Tripoli*, to confirm and ratify the Articles of Peace, His Majefty of England hath with those people.

Copenhagen, July 16. This day the young Electoral Prince Palatine went hence on his way home, having been treated the time of his being here, with all extraordinary kindness and respect.

The 24th of August the Princesse of Danemark, contracted to this Prince, is to part hence for Harburgh, where she will be received by the Dutchess of Ofnaburgh, and by her conducted to Heidelbergh, in order to the solution of Marriage there. The men of War which it was reported were designed for the River Elbe, are shall here, and onely expect orders to layl; it is said, that the King has intentions of going very suddainly to Norway, and that these men of War, are to attend him in his passage thither.

Hamborougb, July 21. We begin to be at present eased of some of our sears, and to be better fatissied in the intentions of our Neighbours then formerly, however we continue to work on our Fortifications, with all the vigour and diligence immaginable, to raise Men, and to lay up a Provision of Corn, and other necessaries for two years; our new Leavies amount at present to 800 Men, who have all received Arms, and are divided into several Companies, under the command of good experienced Officers.

Our Letters from Mosko certainly affure us, that Stephan Radqin having been furprifed by a party of Coffacks, who inhabit on the River Dona, was by them brought Prifoner to Moskom, and there, as hath been faid, executed; which they tell with all the circumstances of his death, fo that there seems to be little room left for any doubt.

Paris, fuly 23. Some days fince returned hither Monfieur de Louvoy from Lorrain, where he had been to confer, asis faid, concerning feveral matters with the Mareshal de Crequi. The 20th instant was celebrated in the usual manner at Val de Grace, the Anniversary of the late Queen Mother, where the Duke of Orleans, with feveral persons of the chinfest quality were present.

We are told of Commiffions that are giving out for the railing in this Kingdom, feveral Regiments

both of Horfe and Fost. From Cologne our Letters tell us, that the Mediators having had feveral conferences for the adjusting the differences depending between that Town and their Elector, and obferving the little fuccels their endeavors in that matter had hitherto met with, by reason of the obstinacy they found in both parties to adhere to their first pretentions, had refolved to refer the whole affair to the determination of the States Affembled for the Circle of Weftphalia.

From Vienna they write, that the Emperor being much diffatisfied with the flow proceeding of he Dyet at Ratisbonne, in the publick concerns of the Empire, and especially in that of the Publick fecurity, had thoughts of Summoning a general Alfembly of the Princes of the Empire to be held at Ratisbonne, the 25 of August next, and with them in Person finally to conclude those affairs, which so particularly regard the good of the whole Empire.

Bruffells, July 24. On Monday laft his Excellency the Count de Monterey, attended by his ordinary Guards, went hence for Mons in Haynault, where his Excellency arrived that day in the Evening; being received by the Duke d' Actifchot Governour of that Province, at the Gates of that place: from thence his Excellency went to vifit Conid, Valensiennes, & c. and to morrow is expected here again. At the fame time parted hence the Count Marcyn for Namur, to vifit the Fortifications of that place; and the Duke de Villa Hermoja for Leeuwe, to fee every thing be in a good condition there.

From Cologne they write, That the Deputies of the respective Mediators, finding how unfuccesfully they have hitherto laboured for the composing those differences, have of late forbore from all farther Conferences concerning those matters; in the mean time all the difcourfe is of a rupture, and therefore they omit not to make there a timely provision, in cafe things should come fo far.

Cologne, July 24. It has been lately reported here, That the Lunenbourg's Iroops were passing over into the fervice of our Elector, which hath much alarmed us; though we fince find it to have been wholly a mistake.

(ur Treaty is now quite at a ftand, the many difficulties which daily arife in those Affairs, having quite difficanted the Mediators from further proceeding in it; all out confultations here are now how best to provide for our fecurity and defence t two Companies of Train Bands work conftantly, befides the other Soldiery, on the Fortifications, and continue on the Watch two days together, when they are relieved by two other Companies.

Hague, July 28. The 20th inftant Don Emanuel de Lyra arrived here from Bruffells, and having been fome days in Town incognito, is returned thither again, to confer with his Excellency concerning fome matters relating to his Embaffy here; it is thought he will be here again very fuddenly from thence, to take upon him his Publick Character.

Collonel Bampfield continues fiill in Town; here is a report as if fome Forces were going hence for Cologne, but of this we very fhortly expect to hear the further certainty.

Prince *Maurits* is at prefent at *Cleve*, and is in few dayes expected here from thence.

It is faid that Monsieur Meerman is to go Ambasfador to the Crown of Sweden.

London, $\frac{1}{2}$ Rly 23. Yesterday in the Evening, Her Majesty, attended by several of the principal Ladies of her Court, arrived at Somerset house from Himpton-Court, whither Her Majesty returned again this evening.

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
