Vienna, June 14.

WE have an Account from Servia, that the Bashaw of Nissa having lately caused two Janisaries who had committed Disorders in the Town to be put under Confinement, the other Janisaries took them out of Prison by Force, and afterwards entred into a Conspiracy to kill the Bashaw when he should be going to the Mosque: He having Intelligence of it forbore going thither, and keeping within the Castle, secretly got together a good Number of Arnauts for his Defence. The Janisaries attempting to force their Way into the Castle, met with such Opposition, that 150 of them were killed on the Spot, and the rest repulsed. The Bashaw having afterwards reinforced his Body of Arnauts to six or seven thousand, the Janisaries finding themselves outnumbered, quitted Nissa, and sent an Officer to the Bashaw to make their Submission: The Bashaw refused to pardon them, unless they would deliver up the first-mentioned two Offenders, and 20 of the chief Mutineers. The Janisaries not yielding to this, have sent to their Comrades at Widin, Nicopolis, and other Places to join and assist them; and the Arnauts have sent like Invitations to those of their Order of the Militia throughout Servia, Bulgaria, Albania, and Macedonia.

Stockholm, May 31. The King has not since this Day Seven-Night had any Symptoms of his Ague; and his Majesty is now very well again, though he still keeps his Chamber for Fear of another Relapse, the Weather having been all this Month and still continues so very raw, that they have not hitherto thought fit to let any of the Regiments which are here incamp. Prince George of Hesse, the King's Brother, sets out either To-Morrow or on Friday next for Carlscroon, in order to pass from thence by a Swedish Frigate to Stetin or Wolgast. The Southerly and Westerly Winds keep the Fleets still at Ellsenab.

Paris, June 28. The Memorial which the Duke de la Force presented lately to the King, and wherein he desired that the Cognizance of his Affair might be taken from the Parliament and brought before the Council, being rejected, the Parliament has summoned him to appear before their Commissioners in order to be con-

fronted with several Witnesses that are produced against him. It is not yet known whether there will be a Prolongation of the Term for examining the Paper-Effects, which expires the End of this Month, and after which such Effects as have not been carried to the Offices established for that Purpose, are to lose a third Part of their Value. On the 26th Instant the Turkish Ambassadour, with all his Retinue, began their Ramazan or Lent, with lasts 30 Days, during which they neither eat, drink nor smook till Sunset. This Ambassadour was the same Day at the Meutte, and is preparing to return home the End of next Month. The Cardinal de Rohan is expected back from Rome in September next, the Air of that Country not agreeing well with him. The Cardinal de Mailly is upon his Departure for his Diocess. M. de Gravelle, who killed some time ago the Chevalier de Breteuil, is fled into Lorraine: His Case is now before the Parliament, which will shortly pronounce Sentence against him. It is advised from Lions, that an Officer of that City had been shot for facilitating the Entry of a Bale of Silk without Quarantain. The Silk was burnt, and the Proprietor of it condemned to a Fine of 10000 Livres, and to Banishment for five Years,
