Westminster, June 24.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Sanderson, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for continuing the Duties on Malt, Mum, Cyder and Perry, to raise Money by way of a Lottery for the Service of the Year one thousand seven hundred twenty one, and for transferring the Deficiency of a late Malt Act to the Land Tax for the said Year; and for disposing certain Overplus Moneys to proper Objects of Charity; and for giving further Time to Clerks and Apprentices to pay Duties omitted to be paid for their Indentures and Contracts; and touching small Quantities of Cyder exported; and for Relief of Captain John Perry concerning Dagenham Breach; and touching lost Bills, Tickets or Orders; and concerning the Duty of small Pieces of Plate; and to enable the Undertakers for raising Thames Water in York Buildings to sell Annuities by way of a Lottery; and for satisfying a Debt which was charged on the late Duty on Hops; and for appropriating the Moneys granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act for the further preventing His Majesty's Subjects from trading to the East Indies under foreign Commissions; and for encouraging and further securing the lawful Trade thereto; and for further regulating the Pilots of Dover, Deal, and the Isle of Thanet.

An Act for enabling Charles Earl of Arran to purchase the forfeited Estate of James Butler late Duke of Ormonde; and for granting Relief to William late Lord Wriardington; and for enlarging the Time for determining Claims upon the forfeited Estates; and for enabling the Commissioners for the said forfeited Estates to certify into the Exchequer all such Estates as they have found to be given to popish or superstitious Uses.

An Act for repairing the several Roads leading from the Town of Ledbury in the County of Hereford to the several Places therein mentioned.

An Act for repairing the Road from Wendover to the Town of Buckingham in the County of Bucks.

An Act for laying a Duty of Two-Pennies Scots, or one sixth part of a Penny Sterling, upon every Scots Pint of Ale or Beer that shall be brewed for Sale, vended or tapped within the Town of Jedburgh, and Privileges thereof, for paying the publick Debts of the said Town, and for supplying the same with fresh Water, and for other Purposes therein mentioned

An Act for repairing the Road from St. Gyles's Pound to Kilburn Bridge in the County of Middlesex.

And to several private Bills.

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare the Right Honourable Henry Lord Carleton, Lord President of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and his Lordship took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Stockholm, June 7. The King is now perfectly recovered from his late Indisposition; and the Weather being at length become pretty warm, his Majesty has been abroad to take the Air for four or five Days past. Prince George of Hesse, the King's Brother, having received an Account that the King of Prussia would be in Prussia by the Middle of this Month, altered his Design of going to Carlscroon, and resolved to embark on a Swedish Frigate called the Black Eagle which lies at the Dahlers, and is ordered to land him at Koningsberg: Accordingly that Prince set out from hence on the 5th Instant about Noon, and was accompanied a League out of Town by the Field Marshals Ducker and Sparre, being attended to the Dahlers by the Younger Marshal Duben, two Gentlemen of the Court, and some other inferior Officers. The End of last Week the Fleets sailed from Ellenab to Suder Arm, where they continue.

Paris, July 2. Yesterday they began to pay at the Hôtel de Ville, the Annuities for the first six Months of the current Year. A great Council is to be held this Evening, wherein it will be resolved whether the India Company shall subsist, or a new one be erected in its Room; the one or the other is to have the Farm of the Tobacco. The Parliament will likewise meet this Morning upon the Duke de la Force's Affair, all the Princes of the Blood, Dukes and Peers, being summoned to assist at that Assembly. The King is going for some Days to la Meutte, whilst some Reparations are making in his Apartments at the Tuilleries. Madame de Subize, to whom the King has given the Abbey of Jaarre, being but 22 Years of Age, a Dispensation is sent for from Rome in order to enable her to take Possession of that Abbey.
