Genoa, July 1.

TWO Days ago arrived here the Cornwallis Packet Boat, Captain Harvey Crulpe, in 106 Days from Port Mahon. Commodore Scott, with His Britannick Majesty's Ships Dragon and Loo, is cruising off this Port.

Stockholm, June 14. On the 12th Instant the King and Queen removed from the Palace here in Town to that of Carlberg, where their Majesties design to pass the Summer. Yesterday Morning the King went to take the Diversion or Hunting in the Neighbourhood of South-Telgia, and is not expected back till the 16th or 17th. The Court has received two Expresses within a few Days from Neustadt, and both were dispatched back with all Diligence. The Fleets continue at Cappel-Shore within the Suder-Arm. Lieutenant General Trautfetter arrived here the End of the last Week from the Court of Poland. Two Days ago a Danish Major-General named Welfeldt, arrived here from Norway. He is come to solicit the Restitution of some Lands belonging to him in the Province of Bleking, which have been under Sequestration ever since the breaking out of the late War.

Stockholm, June 21. The Night after the King of Sweden went into the Country he lay at a Seat called Wyksberg, near South-Telgia, a Place pretty much frequented for its Mineral Waters; of which his Majesty having the Curiosity next Morning to drink two or three Glasses, he got a Relapse of his Ague soon after; however he returned to Carlberg on the 17th in the Evening, the Queen having met him about three Leagues on the Way. His Majesty has since had two Fits more, but as they were not very violent, it is hoped he will soon be well again. The Letters come in this Day from Gasse bring an Account, that the Muscovites are still on the Swedish Coast; and last Week they burned all the Houses at Uma which the Inhabitants had rebuilt there, that Town having been before quite destroyed by the same Enemy. Two Days ago arrived another Express from Neustadt, which is to be sent back To-Day. The Fleets continue in the same Station.

Paris, July 12. The Count de Charolois being made Governour of Touraine, took the Oaths to the King for that Employment on the 6th Instant; and on the 9th M. du Bois was sworn Secretary of the King's Cabinet in the Room of the Archbishop of Cambray his Brother, who has resigned that Employment in his Favour. The Parliament has been assembled every Day since the 7th Instant, upon the Affair of the Duke de la Force, who was summoned to appear Yesterday before that Company, in order to be examined for the last Time; but he having excused himself by reason of an Indisposition, the same was put off to this Day, and it is expected that Sentence will be given on the 14th or 15th Instant. M. Bernard, Steward to the said Duke, and M. du Part, had caused some Observations to be printed upon the Memorial the Grocers of this City presented lately to the Parliament, to which the latter have made immediately a very sharp Reply. The Arrêt issued some time ago for cutting off a third Part of the Value of such Paper Effects as had not been examined before the End of last Month, remains in its Force; and in order to hasten the Examination of the said Effects, the Number of Clerks has been considerably augmented. The Turkish Ambassadour is to take this Afternoon his Audience of Leave of the King, and will set out shortly for Constantinople, whither the Chevalier de Nangys, Captain of a Man of War, is appointed to reconduct him. That Ambassadour was some Days

ago to see the Sorbonne, and was received by its Doctors in their Robes, having their Dean at the Head of them. Three Carmelites of the Convent of the Place Maubert are banished by Lettres de Cachet, for having renewed their Appeal from the Pope's Constitution. At the Instances of Sir Robert Sutton His Britannick Majesty's Ambassadour here, 20 Protestants who were imprisoned a Twelve-Month ago at Nîmes, for having assembled to sing Psalms, and condemned to be transported to Mississipi, in order to which they have been hitherto detained in the Royal Prison at Rochelle, are set at Liberty.
