*Warsaw, July 28*

**O**ur last advices from the *Ukraine*, have not a little startled us here, which tell us, that the *Tartars* and *Cossacks* are joyned together, with intention to attacque some part of this kingdom; and that to that end, they were divided into three considerable Bodies, the one under the Command of *Dorosensko*, being to continue in the *Ukraine*; the other being led by the Cham of *Tartary's* Son, was marching towards *Walachia*; and the last by the Cham himself, and was to move towards *Podolia*.

All things are now ready for his Majesties journey, who it is said, expects onely till the *Moscovite* Ambassador hath his dispatches, in order to his return, after which, he will immediately take his way towards *Lublin*. The Leavies which are making by the respective Palatinats, go on, it is said, but very slowly, insomuch that his Majesty is sending to prels them to a more eager pursuit of that affair.

*Rome, July 25.* The Queen Regent of *Spain*, having by Letters to the Prince *Doria*, at length declared her approbation of his intended Marriage with the Sister of the Prince *Pamphilio*, they have been here solemnly contracted in the presence of several of their relations, and many other persons of quality; it is said, the Marriage will not be consummated till about *October*, and then it is intended to be at *Genova*, with great splendor and magnificence.

We are told, that *Father Nitard*, heretofore Confessor to the Queen Regent of *Spain*, is nominated by that Queen for a Cardinals Cap. The Bishop of *Laon* having since his arrival at this Court, taken upon him the care of the affairs of his most Christian Majesty here he hath likewise caused the Arms of *France* to be placed over the Gate of his Palace, and pretends to the same immunities and privileges as other Foreign Ministers enjoy.

Some difference having lately happened between the Servants of the Ambassador of *Portugal*, and some of the Inhabitants of this place, not without occasioning some mischief and disturbance, the Ambassador to prevent the like for the future, hath straightly charged his Servants that they shall not wear their Swords after it is dark.

The Prince *Pamphilio* hath now accomplished his Marriage with the Niece of the Cardinal *Facchiotti* at *Spolcro*; though it is said, that his Mother the Princess *Rossano* seems not yet very well satisfied with it.

*Genova, July 29.* Here are at present in Port, three French Gallies, under the command of *Hippolito Centurione*, and intend to part hence again to-morrow or next day, to joyn, as is said, with their General the Conde *de Vivone*, or as others think for *Malta*.

Some days since came hither a French Officer, with Commission to raise 500 Men for his most Christian Majesties Service, which was immediately agreed to by this Senate.

*Venice, July 30.* Here is going hence two Con-

voys for *Alexandria* and *Toria*, to reside there on the part of this Republick; in their Company goes the *Katherine* bound for *Zant*, and on her Sir *Clement Harby*, the English Consul of that place.

The Corsairs of *Burbery*, notwithstanding their late great and frequent losses continue very much to infest these Seas, to the great disturbance of our Navigation; we hear of three Dutch Merchant men of a considerable value lately taken by them.

From *Constantinople* we have not any thing of news, save that the Sultaneſs continues her private practices to strengthen her party, and render the Government of the Grand Signior odious. Procurator *Nani* is returned to *Zara*, with intentions to confer on some matters, with General *Morofini*; before he hath his first interview with the Bassa of *Bossina*, which was to have been the 12 instant, but upon some considerations was put off till the 25.

General *Barbaro* is still at *Istria*, endeavoring to adjust matters there, in the dividing of Lands between the Heydukes and those Families, which upon the Surrender of *Candia* repaired thither, several difficulties arising, which can hardly be determined upon the place, those Heydukes have with the leave of the said General, sent Deputies hither to sollicite their concerns.

We have not of late heard any thing of the Turkish Fleet, though it is said, they are still roving to and fro at Sea. Here is a report of another rencounter the *Malta* Gallies have lately had with the Corsairs, but without any certainty.

*Vienna, August 1.* The Turks have been of late in great numbers upon our Frontiers, keeping us still in fear, of what their intentions may be to draw so near us; upon which several Regiments were ordered to march that way to watch their motions, and to be ready at hand to prevent them, in any design they might have upon some of the Frontier places; but since we hear, that they are all retired again, as is said, towards *Dalmatia*; certain it is, we are at present much eased of our fears, insomuch, that our Troops are reported to have orders to march again to their several Garrisons.

The Emperor hath lately bestowed the Government of *Waradin* on the General *Soufa*. Yesterday the Turkish Aga, having the day before taken his leave of General *Montecuculi* President of the Council of War, and been presented by the Emperors order with several Gifts, went hence by water on his return to *Buda*. We daily expect here the *Sieur Pers*, who lately went hence Envoy Extraordinary to the Grand Signior, to confirm on the part of his Imperial Majesty, the peace and good correspondence established between the two Empires.

The Recruits for the old Regiments are at present compleat; it is said, here hath been lately sent from hence for *Tyrol*; a considerable summe of Money for the raising of Men there. The Imperial Regiment are ordered to be ready for a march; whither, is not yet said.
