

*Marseilles, August 4.* The 10 infant came into this Port 10 of our Gallies, after having been abroad two Months; it is said, that the other Squadron under the Command of Monsieur de Vivonne is likewise recalled home. We are told, of another Sally man of War taken by some French Frigats.

We have advice from *Cadix*, that the 14 part thence the Fleet designed for the *New Spaine*, under the conduct of Don *Henrique Henriquez*.

*Cologne, August 7.* The Bishop of *Strasburgh* hath since the late accident of his Pages taking away the Burgemasters Staff, caused all his Movableables to be removed from hence to *Bon*, pretending they are not safe here, from the violence of the common people, who it seems, stomack highly that indignity offered to their chief Magistrate, notwithstanding the Bishop not only alledged his not knowing of the thing, but readily offered to give them what satisfaction he in honor could. In the mean time our affairs continue here as formerly, the work of our Fortifications goes on with the usual vigor and diligence: And though we seem to promise our selves the continuance of our Peace, yet our Preparations are not less then if we expected the contrary.

*Brussels, August 9.* On Thursday last his Excellency the Count de *Monterey* lodged at *Bruges*, and the next Morning parted from thence again for *Iper*, and the other places he intends to visit in *Flanders*. Here is lately arrived Don *Bernardo de Salinas* from *England*, where he had been on the part of our Governour.

We are told, of four Deputies which are coming hither from the States General of the United Provinces, to confer, as is said, with his Excellency, concerning matters relating to the present posture of affairs, and that the Baron d' *Isola* will accompany them on that occasion. Our advices from *Cologne* seem to assure us, that that place will not be besieged this Summer.

*Brussels, August 12.* By an Extraordinary Courier we have Letters from *Spaine*, of the 27 past, which tell us of the arrival of the Marquis de *Villars* at that Court, in quality of Ambassador from the Crown of *France*. On Munday last went hence Don *Emanuel de Lyra*, upon the advice we had of the death of Don *Estevan de Gamarra* for *Flanders*, to receive his Excellencies last orders and instructions, in order to his going to the *Hague*, to reside there as Ambassador from his Catholick Majesty.

From *Munster* we hear, that the Bishop continues to disband his late raised Troops, but that the Soldiers complain extreemly of their Horses being taken from them, which they pretend were promised them, when they entered into that Service.

*Hamburg, Aug. 11.* Our Advices from *Stockholm* say, That they were making ready there, Fourteen stout Men of War, for the transportation of some Forces: That the Senate did not yet meet, by reason of the absence of some of the Principal Members: And that their Majesties were still diverting themselves in the Country.

From *Lunenburg* they write, That those Dukes were going to raise more men, and that they had to that end already given out some Commissions.

This day was mustered here an other new raised Company of Foot.

Our Letters from *Poland*, speak of new fears of the *Tartars* and *Cossacks* being joyned together for the subduing the *Ukraine*: That the King was upon his departure from *Warsaw*, but only deferred his journey for some days, till *Naxotshin*, the *Mosco-*

*vite* Ambassador; had dispatched his affairs he came about, that so he might have his last Audience of him there.

*Hague, August 14.* On Tuesday was held a conference between the Heer *Raedi*, Pensionaris of *Zealand*, together with the other Deputies of that Province, and the Deputies of the States of *Holland*, concerning several matters now in debate in the Assembly of the States General; what succets their meeting then had, we as yet know not; in the interim we hear not of any thing concluded on by the States of *Holland*, concerning the French Wines, &c. who it is said, may seperate again this week, or the beginning of the next.

Monsieur de *Groot* Ambassador from these States in *France*, hath at length obtained leave to return from that employment, so that he may in a short time be expected here; it is not yet certainly said, who shall succeed him there, though some report; that Monsieur *Bevering* late Ambassador in *Spaine*; and now on his way home, is designed for it.

The Body of the deceased Spanish Ambassador, it is said, is to be carried to *Brussels* or *Ghent*, in order to its interment there. To morrow are expected here in Town, the Deputies of the respective Admiralties; it is thought, that whilst all things seem to promise at present, the continuance of a peaceable Summer this year, our Fleet may be called home and laid up again.

Here hath lately been another conference between the Deputies of these States, and those of the Elector of *Cologne*, who is Prince of *Liege*, concerning *la Rochette*, with hopes of a good issue in those affairs; so that we are now told, of an exchange that may be made by this State for the Sovereignty of *Liet*, in lieu of which, they will yield the said place to that Elector.

*Paris, August 15.* On Saturday last were given out 187 Commissions to as many Officers, by the Sieurs de *St. Povange* and *Charpenter* deputed for that purpose by Monsieur de *Louvois*; and it is said, that at the Kings return from *Fonsainbleau*, 200 Commissions more may be given out for the raising of as many Companies of French Foot, which are to consist of 50 Men apiece; The Leavies of Horse, are, not to be gone about till *October*, when those for the Foot are finished.

It is said that the Sieur de *Mondevergues*, now Prisoner at *Port Louis*, is by the Kings order to be removed hither, for the more convenient carrying on of his Process. From *Vitri* in *Britaine* we have Letters telling us, that the Duke de *Chaulnes*, Governour of that Province, had assembled the States there to his great satisfaction, they expressing a ready inclination to concur, in whatever he should propose for the good of his Majesties service.

*Whitehall, August 10.* Yesterday His Majesty, accompanied by his Royal Highness, and his Highness Prince *Rupert*, attended by several of the Nobility, and other persons of Quality of the Court, went hence for *Windsor*, to spend some few days in hunting.
