Copenhagen, October 11.

THE 8th Instant, Sir John Norris with the British Fleet under his Command arrived off Dragoe, and the Wind not being fair he came to an Anchor at that Place the same Night. Yesterday in the Morning he sailed from thence, but the Wind changing he was obliged to anchor in this Road, and will take the Opportunity of the first fair Wind to proceed on his Voyage to Great Britain.

Paris, Oct. 18. The Duke of St. Simon's Departure for Spain is put off till the 20th Instant. Besides his two Sons, the Abbot of St. Simon his Cousin and the Marquess de Lorge, are to accompany him; and 'tis reckoned his Retinue will consist of 120 Persons. The King makes a Present to Mademoiselle de Montpensier of Jewels to the Value of 800000 Livres, and the Duke Regent a Present to the Value of 500000 Livres. The Marquess de Torcy is to have 200000 Livres for the General Superintendancy of the Posts of this Kingdom, which he has resigned to the Cardinal du Bois, besides a Pension of 20000 Livres yearly for Life, and after his Death 9000 Livres for his Lady during her Life, and 6000 for his Son. Cartouche the notorious Robber, who was taken some Days ago, has already discovered several of his Accomplices, who have also been taken up: The Gang of which he was Chief is found to be very numerous; and many of them being in the Provinces, Orders are sent thither to seize them. The following Extract of the Advices relating to the Plague received by the Court to the 13th of October, has been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

Provence. M. Le Bret writes the 28th of Sept. That Toulon keeps in a good State of Health, and that there are only Fevers there. Besse is in a bad Condition; 15 Persons and one Consul are dead there. Roquebroussane has the Infection; but it is believed it will not be violent, the Force of the Distemper appearing to abate every where. St. Remy is growing well, Cucurron does not yet. At Arles a Man is dead, with Marks of the Plague upon him; This is dismal after a general Quarantine, but it is hoped it will have no further Consequences.

The Comtat of Avignon. M. de Launay Commanding Officer in the County of Sault, in his Letter of the 2d of October writes, that a Peasant of the Comtat had been shot for attempting in the Night to break through the Line on the Side of Suze; and that the Centinels had fired at two Men on Horseback who had advanced to make the like Attempt towards Moland. M. de Chevalerie, the King's Lieutenant at St. Esprit, writes, That besides Avignon Bedarides, and Orange the Plague is at Chasteauneuf, Sorgues and Montau, which are in the Neighbourhood of Orange. M. de Nogaret advises Oct. 3. That the Distemper increased at Avignon, and that in all Likelihood that Town will suffer much, because the Magistrates had been forced to allow the People to get in their Vintage, to prevent a

general Revolt. M. de Belricu writes the 1st of Oct. That he had received a Letter dated the 26th of September, advising that 30 Persons had died in Avignon within three Days, in different Parts of the Town. The Infection had got into the Vice Legate's Palace, which had obliged him to retire into a Convent of Recollets. Bedarides remained in the same Condition: Several other Places of the Comtat were also infected.

The General M. de Frisse who commands at Mende, writes the 26th of Sept. That the Contagion is not so violent there as at Marvejols: That but 82 Persons had died there from the 4th of Sept. to the 26th, and ten was the greatest Number that had died any one Day: There were then 43 sick in the Infirmary, and 41 suspected in a Convent chosen for that purpose. He took Care that all suspected Persons were removed thither from their Houses, and had on that Account cleared one intire Quarter of the Place. M. de Rambion Brigadier of Foot writes the 27th of Sept. That M. de Rothe had invested St. Geniez in the Vivarais, where seven or eight Persons had died since the 15th of Sept. They seemed to have died of ordinary Distempers; but it was feared they might have caught the Infection from a Muletter who had given it to the Village of Rousse. There are no sick in the Abbey of Chambon. Commissary Richard in his Letter of the 1st of October says, that from the 25th to the 27th of September 28 Persons died at Marvejols, and that of 150 who were sick there, two thirds were in a way of Recovery. Moulins and St. Andrioux are in a very bad State; Vergogneux has had 60 dead in all, none since the 23d of September. Couzes has lost 20. At the Village of Chabalais in the Parish of Chassellade towards the Vivarez, six died in one House, being all the Persons in it. At Rousse, a young Woman is dead, and her Sister is Sick. At Genouillac the 29th, three were sick, and one had died. At St. Genaix from the 26th to the 30th, six died, and eight were sick.

All the Troops are in good Health.

Auvergne, Velay, and Rouergue, continue in perfect Health.

Richmond, Oct. 13. This Day Baron Sparre, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Sweden, had Private Audiences of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, to notify the Peace lately concluded between his Master and the Czar of Muscovy; to which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.
