From Stockholme they write, that Monfieur de Pompone the French Ambassador, notwithstanding he hath not yet had his Publick Audience, haih at his defire had Commissioners appointed to Treat with him, which it is thought, may be about the better fetling of Trade between the two Nations. That the Velt Heer Wrangle, was not yet returned out of the feveral Counties, where he had been to take a view of the Kings Forces. From Copenhagen, that the men of War which had been equipped there this Summer, were in confideration of the approaching Seafon, ordered to be laid up again, and the rather, seeing the Swedes have upon the same score done the like; fo that they feem to have no farther occasion for the keeping them out any longer,

Cologne, September 8.
