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Falmouth, September 4.

THe first instant arrived here the *Margaret* of *Leath* bound for *Burdeaux*, with several other Marchant men in her Company, bound for that and other Ports in *France*. The same day came into Port the *Crown* of *London*, bound for *Virginia*; Yesterday arrived in this Harbor about 40 Sayl of *Hamburgers*, under the Convoy of three men of War belonging to the same place, bound for *Cadix* and other Ports in the *Streights*.

Tangier, July 21. Here are at present in this Road the *Constant Warwick*, *Garland*, and *Rowbucke* Frigats, who, it is said, are to attend his Excellency the Earl of *Middletons* orders here. From *Texas* they write, of about 6000 Mores that were lodged near that place, with a design to attacke it, so soon as the rest of the Forces they expected were come to them.

Naples, August 19. Our Vice-Roy Don *Pedro d'Arragon* hath given orders for the shipping all the *Banditi* that are Prisoners here for *Spain*, to be from thence transported on the Fleet sitting out at *Cadix*, for the *West Indies*. The last week dyed here after some days illness the Count *de Mola*. From *Palermo* they write, that that Vice-Roy was perfectly recovered again, after having not without much danger, relapd into his former distemper, to the general joy of those people.

That all Barks and other Vessels laden with Corne, which touched at any Port in that Kingdom, were by his Excellencies order, obliged to sell their Corne there, by reason their harvest hath been very bad this year.

Genoa, August 19. At *Fosdinovo* is arrived a Commissary with about 60 Men, to take possession of the part of the Emperor of that *Marquise*, which the Great Duke of *Tuscany* upon the unfortunate death of those two Brothers, which happened some Months since, pretended to, and accordingly, sent a party of Men to hold it for him, till the matter should be otherwise determined, though we now hear, that upon the arrival of this Imperial Commissary, the Great Dukes Forces are withdrawn.

The Duke of *Savoie*, it is said, notwithstanding all the means that have been used to perswade him to admit of Signior *Durazzo*, in quality of Nuncio at his Court, continues resolved to the contrary, so that after all, it is thought, the said Nuncio will be forced to return again for *Rome*. We are told, of a promotion that is likely to be very suddenly at *Rome*, to fill up the two vacant places in the Sacred Colledge; but whilst there appear so many pretenders, and they with so much eagerness strive to make good their several pretences, it is thought, his Holiness may defer this promotion for some time.

From *Firenze* they write, of the extraordinary Feastings and other publick rejoynings, which have been there upon the occasion of the Great Dukes Birth day, which for several days together was celebrated with very great Solemnity. From *Milan* they tell us, that the Nobility and Clergy of those Countries continue much dissatisfied, in that they cannot procure of their Governour the disbanding of the new Troops, according to the Queen of *Spaines* directions.

Hamburg, September 8. On the 4 instant the Princess of *Dinemark* parted from *Alsen* by water to *Harburgh* (after having taken her leave there of the Queen her Mother, who returns from thence for *Copenhagen* again) accompanied by the Dukes of *Lunenburgh* and *Brunswick*, and several other persons of quality, where she arrived that Evening, and the next Morning proceeded from thence on her way to *Lunenburgh*; since which, came hither the *Lant Gravinne* Dowager of *Cassell*, with a very Noble Train on her journey to *Copenhagen*, where she goes to visit that Queen her Daughter, who is big with Child.

From *Stockholme* they write, that Monsieur *de Pomponne* the French Ambassador, notwithstanding he hath not yet had his Publick Audience, hath at his desire had Commissioners appointed to Treat with him, which it is thought, may be about the better settling of Trade between the two Nations. That the Velt Heer *Wrangle*, was not yet returned out of the several Counties, where he had been to take a view of the Kings Forces. From *Copenhagen*, that the men of War which had been equipped there this Summer, were in consideration of the approaching Season, ordered to be laid up again, and the rather, seeing the *Swedes* have upon the same score donè the like; so that they seem to have no farther occasion for the keeping them out any longer.

That the King hath directed the Velt Heer *Schaech* to go for *Furand*, *Holstein*, &c. to see that things be in a good condition there.

Cologne, September 8. On Monday last arrived here the Princess of *Lisbonne* from *Nancy*, where she hath hitherto continued, as is said, upon the hopes she had, that somewhat might ere this have been done for the restoring the Duke of *Lorraine*. We hear of some new Proposals which have been lately made to this Magistracy on the part of our Elector, consisting of ten points, about which they have since had several debates, but have not as yet returned any answer to them; though in the interim we are told, that they are not at all acceptable to the Town, the Elector by them demanding, what we have been possessed of for many years together, with other things, which our Magistrates have already declared they can never agree to.

About the beginning of the next week we expect here the Deputies from the Circle of *Westphalia*; in the interim the passages near this place are very unsafe for Travellers, by reason of some parties of *Lorrainers*, which our Elector hath lately taken into his Service, who for the present much infest our Roads. It is said, that our Elector is going to erect several Magazines for all kind of Military Provisions, in these parts, and that he likewise intends to fortify *Nuis*, as also some other places hereabouts.

The *Marschal de Crequi* continues with his Forces in his old Station on the *Sarre*, and we are told, of more Forces which are to be joyned to those already under his Command.

Hague, September 10. The next week the States of *Holland* will be assembled again, the first Subject of their debate will be, the forbidding the importation of French Wines, &c. in which matter, though

though all the Towns of *Holland*, with most of the other Provinces are agreed, yet those of *Zealand* continue to make some difficulty in it, still declaring, that till those of *Holland* yield to the raising the Impositions on imported Corne, they cannot give their consents in this particular.

We are told of 12 Companies of Foot which are ordered to march towards the *Rhyn*, for the reinforcing of some Places in those parts, as *Rynbeck*, *Orsoy*, *Wesel*, and *Mours*. It seems that the Heer *d' Amerongen*, had orders to pass by *Munster* on his way to *Cologne*, to confer with that Bishop upon some matters relating to his Negotiation there, where he is not to be as Mediator, (seeing that Town hath not been able to accept of the Spaniards) but to perform all good Offices between the respective parties, in order to the reconciling the present differences, and the bringing matters to a fair agreement.

Prince *Mauris* of *Nassau* is returned to *Cleue* from *Amsterdam*, where it is said, he may stay some short time. The Deputies of the States General are still in *Overyssell*, endeavoring by all means possible to accommodate those differences, of which there seems at present to be some likelihood; in the mean time here are likewise Deputies from that Province, on the part of the parties differing, to inform the States how matters stand, each side endeavoring to make good their Right.

According to our Advices from *Paris*, the Heer *van Beverning* parted from thence the second Instant, where he arrived some days before from his Embassy in *Spain*, he intending to take his way through *Flanders* towards these Countries. It is said, that the Heer *de Groot* Ambassador in *France* may suddenly return from thence, his year being now almost expired.

Paris, September 10. On Thursday last arrived here a Courier Extraordinary from *Vienna*, by whom we are told, that Monsieur *de Gramonville* the French Resident at that Court, hath received all imaginable satisfaction, upon what had some time since happened there, and in the manner it was desired.

We shortly expect the Conde *de Molina* out of *England*, being appointed by his Catholick Majesty to reside here in quality of his Ambassador, the Marquis *de Villars* hath received his last orders and dispatches, in order to his setting forward on his Embassy to *Spain*. From *Berne* they write, that the Sieur *de Moulrier* the Kings Resident there, had made a new Treaty with that Canton, as likewise with some of the others, by which he hath liberty to make the Levies for his most Christian Majesties service.

The Sieur *de Mondevergue*, who was said to have been accused of several matters, upon the account of our *East India* Company, and thereupon taken into custody at his arrival at *Port Louis* from the *East Indies*, where he had been Director for that Company, hath so fairly cleared himself of all he hath been charged with, as to obtain his liberty, at least so far, as to have that Town for his Prison, being to remain there, though with all manner of freedom till farther order.

We are told of a second attempt that hath been made by certain Jewd persons, for the Burning the Protestant Church at *Charenton*, in which, as in the former, they were happily prevented by the Inhabitants, who timely discovered their design, and so warmly pursued them, that they hardly escaped by the favor of the night, very much wounded, the next morning it was discovered by the tract of Blood, that they had retired to a certain Convent near that place, of which the Lieutenant *de la Po-*

lice here having been informed, hath given orders that all endeavors possible be used for their discovery, in order to the bringing them to an exemplary punishment.

It is reported about Town, that the Duke *d' Estrees* formerly designed Ambassador Extraordinary to the Court of *Rome*, hath since the death of Monsieur *de Lionne* desired to be excused from that Embassy. Monsieur *Colbert* Premier Minister of State, hath been somewhat ill of an Ague. It is said, that the Sieur *Martinez*, Colonel of the Kings Regiment, and Comniiliary General of the Infantry, is going by the Kings order towards the Frontiers, to make a review of all the Forces the King hath at present on foot.

The Marshal *de Gramont* is Extream ill, so as to have received the Extreme Sacrament. It is said, a Courier is arrived from *Rome*, with advice of the promotion of the Bishop of *Lyon* and Father *Nisard*, formerly the Queen of *Spain*s Concessor to be Cardinals; but of this we expect a farther confirmation.

Brussels, September 11. On Tuesday last in the Evening went hence for *Flanders* the Prince *de Roebek*, in quality of the Kings Comniiliary; that night he was to lodge at *Alost*, and to be the next morning at *Ghent*, to be present there in the Assembly of the States of that Province, to whom he is to make several Propositions, concerning the raising the Extraordinary Subsidies for the ensuing year. His Excellency the Count *de Starkey* continues his resolution of going very shortly to visit *Limburgh* and *Gelderland*, whether his Excellency will be accompanied by great numbers of Nobility, and other persons of principal quality here.

His Excellency hath frequent conferences with the Council of State, together with the Principal Officers of the Army concerning the new Levies, which it is said, may be now suddenly gone about. Monsieur *Beverning* is arrived at *Antwerp* on his way hither, intending after he hath been with his Excellency to pass for *Holland*. Count *Starkey* it is said, is going by his Excellencies order to *Aix*, though upon what affair we know not. The Baron *de Roc*, and the Marquis *de Warnicks*, are some days since returned hither out of *Germany*, whether it is said, they went with Commission to raise some men for the service of these Countries, what they have done in it, is not yet discoursed of.

Newcastle, September 4. At the last Assizes held for this Town, were indicted eight Seamen, for the late great Riot, which had occasioned some disturbance here, who having upon their Arraignment, confessed themselves severally guilty of the said Riot, were by the Court fined in 100 l. apiece, but being found very poor, upon their submission, they being brought into the middle of the Court, and there upon their knees, begging His Majesties gracious pardon, as likewise pardon of the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town, promising to deport themselves peaceably for the future, and with all due obedience to the Kings Authority; the Judges reduced the fine to Markes apiece, withal, declaring to them, that their offence was Treason, and deleried to have been prosecuted in another manner, and that therefore they should humbly acknowledge His Majesties Extraordinary Goodness and Mercy to them.
