Whitehall, July 20.

AN humble Address of the Custos Rotulorum Justices of the Peace and Grand Jury for the County of Westmorland, at the General Quarter Sessions held for the said County, having been transmitted by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Lonsdale to the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has by him been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, Clergy, and freeholders of the County of Northampton, assembled at the Assizes held for the said County on Tuesday the 3d Day of July 1722, has been presented to His Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Montagu.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Deputy-Lieutenants, and Gentlemen of the Grand Jury assembled at the Assizes held at Oxford on the 11th of July, has been presented to His Majesty by Sir John D'Oyley, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Lisbon, July 5, N. S. On the 25th past, his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Dursley Galley entered this River, after having cruized for some Days off the Burlings; where on the 21st she met the Dutch Squadron, under the Command of Commodore Grave, consisting of six Men of War of 40 Guns each. They were proceeding for the Mediterranean, in order to cruize against the Algerines, who (as we are informed by Letters from Faro of the 26th past) in Conjunction with the Rovers of Salles, have fitted out 18 Ships of above 20 Guns each.

Stockholm, June 27, O. S. The King and Queen of Sweden arrived at Médway on the 19th Instant, and by the last Letters from thence her Majesty had already begun to drink the Waters of that Place; but upon some Experiments made of those Waters by one of the King's Physicians, his Majesty has been dissuaded from drinking them. And they write, that his Majesty would in all Probability stay only 10 or 12 Days longer there, and go from thence to take a View of the Fleet at Carlscroon. The Dutchess Dowager of Mecklenbourg, his Swedish Majesty's Sister, having desired Leave to pay her Respects to the Queen, it is said the King has permitted that Princess to come, and that his Majesty will himself meet her at Elsburng; and as his Majesty has appointed the Beginning of August for the reviewing of the several Regiments in Schonen, and the adjacent Provinces, it is presumed her Highness will come over about the same Time. The Weather has all the last Month and this been so extreme wet and cold all over this Kingdom, that if a sudden Change do not happen, the whole Crop of Corn now on the Ground must be inevitably spoiled, the Wheat and Rye particularly being already every where laid almost flat on the Ground.

Copenhagen, July 18, N. S. The King of Denmark came Yesterday from Fredericksberg to Copenhagen, to see a new Ship of 94 Guns launched, which is called by the Queen's Name Anna Sophia. His Majesty dined aboard the Pomerania a Frigate which is fitted out as a Yacht for his Majesty's Use. The Weather being fine, his Majesty gave Orders to sail to Elsinore, where he designed to land, and to go from thence to Fredericksbourg, but the Wind changing he was obliged to return to Copenhagen, from whence his Majesty is this Day gone to Fredericksbourg. The King of Sweden is expected shortly in Schonen. The King of Denmark has given Orders to his Grand Marechal to go thither as soon as he arrives, and to invite his Majesty to come to this Court.

Whitehall, July 20. The Right Honourable the Lord Whitworth, His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at the Congress at Cambray, set out to Day for Dover, in order to embark

for Calais. His Lordship is to make a short Stay at Paris, and from thence to proceed to Cambray.

Baron Sparre the King of Sweden's Envoy Extraordinary, will set out from hence next Tuesday for Stockholm, from whence he is to return in a few Weeks to this Court.
