Warfaw, August 28.

Rom Lublyn we have advice, of their Majeflies arrival there, attended by feveral Bishops, Weywodes, and other of the Senators, besides great numbers of the Nobility, who have defired to wait upon their Majesties in

this journey. The Gentry in Great Poland are, as is laid, ron their march towards the faid place, and have written to the King, that he would be pleased not to remove from thence, till they should be likewise come thither.

In the interim the King hath been often in Councel with those of the Senate that are now with him, about their proceeding in the present conjuncture. We are told, that some persons of great Authority with his Majefly seem to perswade him not to go towards *Leopol*, as his first intentions were, but rather for *Lokal*, where they will be nearer to *Lithuania*, and so upon any suddain occasion, be the abler to ferve themselves of the Forces of those Countries.

By the way of Lemburgh we are told, that the Forces of the Tartars and Coffacks grow dayly more and more formidable in the Ukraine; that they had belieged Billo Cierkem, which it was feared, in regard of the weaknels of the Garrilon, and the great want they were in of all kind of Provisions, would be forced to furrender, unlefs timely relieves ed with fresh supplies of Men and Viguals, which feems hardly to be effected, except our whole Army move that way. Our Letters likewife gonfirm the private Treaties and Correspondencies that are between Hanenko, and the other Coffacks under the Command of Dorofonsko; though we hear not as yet, that they are come to any fettled agreement. It is faid, that the Grand Signior upon iome fulpition that the Hospodar of Moldavia held intelligence with this Crown, hat caused him to be put out of that Government,

Vienna, August 29. The Emperor it is said, intends to return again for Newsfadt 3. to pass fome farther time there a flere is some days fince arrived by the way of granter the Venetian Ambassador, and is at present incognito. Several perfons which have been condensind upon the account of the late Rehellion in Hungary, continue fill Prisoners heres fome of the most notorious of which will fuffer, as is faid, whilf the Court is abroad; it being hoped that the rest may obtain the Emperors pardon.

that the reft may obtain the Emperors pardon. We are told, of new Inftructions which have been fent to Monfieur *Periss*, the Imperial Envoy at the Port, upon the late demands of the Turks, concerning the giving fatisfaction by this Courts for fonte violences, committed as they pretend, by the Heydukes on feveral parties of Turks; the taking away the Bridge on the River Waage, 1970.

The Turkish Envoyes which were here from the Biffa of Buda, having been dispatcht as to what they came about by the Councel of War, are departed again on their way home, the Emporor having resolved that for the future, all fuch Envoyes as have not their Commillion from the Grand Signior himself, shall be received and dispatched at Raab.

It is faid, that Monfieur Gremonville the French Refident, hath orders to continue here for three years longer. The Count *de Souches* is gone to his Government of *Waradine*; and the Count Spork, (who by a miltake was fome time fince reported dead) is in the interim to Command the Forces which are at prefent quartered between Egger and *Pilfen*.

Venice, August 29. By a Vessel arrived from Smirna we are told, that the Discontents and Factions in the Ottoman Empire are very great, info-much, that the common people, and even those of the chiefest Quality, do not forbear to complain publickly of the Grand Signiors Government, which they now the more contemne, fince their having difcovered the late Artifice he made use of, in putting to death in the view of his Army several condemned Criminals, whom he pretended to have been fent from Constantinople, to keep his Soldiers in that awe and refpect to his Authority, which they begin every where very openly to loofe, this makes the Sultanefs party at Constantinople grow every day ftronger, and to rake new Courage, so far, as to have the confidence to threaten the Grand Signiors death, in case he comes within their power; in the mean' time it is thought, these Domestick troubles may in fome manner contribute to the peace of his Neighbours, and divert the thoughts of any Forreign War, till these differences be fairly reconci-Ied.

From Dalmatia we heat nothing farther, fave that Procurator Nani continues his conferences with the Baffa of Boffina, concerning the matter of the Limits, not without fome likelyhood of fuccefs, It feems that in a late Proceflion here, at which the Duke affifted in perform, the Jefuits, contrary to the order of the Senate, omitted, upon pretence they are by the Popes Bulls exempted from all fuch attendances, to appear there; upon which the Senate furmoned the whole Colledge of them, to come the mext morning in Body before them, to anfwer that their Entempt, but at that time, onely checking them feverely, definift them again; what may be farther done in the matter we know not.

We hear nothing farther of what was lately raported, concerning a difcovery of fome treafonable practices for the betraying of *Cafat*, though it is very certain, that fome of the principal Officers of that Garrison, were thereupon fent under cuftody to *Pavia*, in order to their examination.

Leghorne; August 31. The 26 instant arrived here the Falcan Frigat from Zanz, with the Turky Ships under his Convoy from Smirna aig, the London Marchant, the Mary and Martha, the Levant Marchant, the Speedwell and the Pearle, which may depart in a day or two for England, under tha Convoy of the faid Frigat; they left Sir Williams Fennings at Mellina, who it is thought, may expect the Scanderoone Shipsthere.

; The 25 imported the Anne and Judeth from England and Spaine... From Port Mahen of the 18 infignt we have adviced that Sir Edward Spragge was with the Fleet under his Command then there Carcening, intending to foon as that was done, which which might be in eight or ten days, for Algiers again.

Madrid, September 2. We dayly expect here from Naples the Marquis de Villa Franca, D. de Ferandina, General of the Galleys of that Kingdom, being adviled of his having been fome time on his way hither. The 30 past was Celebrated here the Certamen Poeticum, in honor of St. Francisco de Borja with great applause, the several Poets receiving from the hands of the Judges for that purpole appointed, their respective rewards, each according to the degree of his merit, with a general appro-dearneftly press to have put into their own hands, to bation

From Cadiz they write, that about the 10 pail departed from thence the Spanish Frigats towards the West Indies, having about 700 Men on board, to be employed for the lervice of those parts; that on the 23 their New Spaine Fleet, valued at about nine Millions, in pieces of Eight and Plate onely, arrived at St. Lucar, which hath occasioned a more extraordintry joy amongst those people, by reason of the fears they were in, upon the accompt of the men of War which have lately been upon our Coasts. That Monsseur d'Estrees, Vice-Admiral of France, was come into that Port, having with him five men of War more, as was faid, to careen there.

Our Letters from Lisbonne of the 11 past, tellus, that their Armada was then at Sea, having before their going outreceived ample Instructions from the Prince Regent, relating to their deportmont in cale of a Rencounter with any of the men of War of other Princes. That Monsheur St. Romain the French Ambassador there, was expecting the arrival of fome French Frigat in order to his Embarcation on her for France.

Hague, September 13. Yesterday came hither again the Velt Marshal Wurtz from Utrecht, to be here during the Seffion of the States of Holland, who will be affembled here the 15 inftant. On Friday last went hence the Spanish Envoye Extraordinary Don Emanuel de Lyra, for Bruffels, to fetch his Lady hither.

Some days fince arrived here the Princefs of Naffam of Frieflind, together with the Princefs her eldeft Daughter from the Bath at Swalbach in Germany, and is at prefent lodged at the Princels Dowager of Orange her Mother's Houfe in the Bofch. We hear that Prince Maurits of Naffaw, hath fince his return to Cleve been somewhat indisposed.

His Highnels the Prince of Orange is expected here again in nine or ten days from Dieren, where his Highnels is at prefent diverting himself with hunting.

- From Cologne they write, as if there feemed to be lefs hopes then formerly of an accommodation with their Elector. This day have been Councels held in all the Towns of Holland, for the forming the Instructions for their Deputies, relating to the Matters they are to affemble upon.

Hag ue, Ditto 17. The respective parties in Over-Tffell have at length submitted their differences to the determination of the States General, fo that it is not doubted but those matters may in a short time be made up again. Yesterday the States of Holland Were allembled for the first time of this Selfion; it is thought, they may be employed this week in redeiving the report of what hath been done finde their last meeting in the Assembly of the State's General, as likewife in disposing of several vacant places, as well Civil as Military.

Here is arrived the Heer van Beverning from his Embally in Spaine ; it has been reported that the States General had made choice of him togo their

Ambaffador to the Court of Sweden, though we are fince told, that he hath excused himself, in regard of some indisposition, as well as other confideratrons relating to his private affairs, from that employment. Certain it is, the States will very fuddainly nominate one for that Embaffy, as likewife,

another to go their Envoy to Spaine. They of Horne seem to be much diffatissied with the proceedings of those of Amsterdam, in the cafe of their Burgemaster in custody there, upon the account of the East India Company, whom they be profecuted according to Law. It is thought, the whole affair may be deferted to the States of Holland, which they of Horne feem eafily inclinable to.

Paris, September 16. The Mareshal de Grammont is at prefent fomewhat better, giving great hopes of his total recovery. It is faid that Monfieur Courtin is to go Ambaffador to Sweien, in the room of Monfieur de Pompone, who is to return to take his new Employment of Secretary of State, Ge. What was faid in our last concerning the promotion of the Bishop of Laon and of Father Nitard to be Cardinals, we still doubt of, seeing we have not fince had any farther confirmation, at least, that it is but in Petto (as they call it) and will not be declared yet

Weare told of orders that are given by the King for the recruiting the Troops under the Command of the Mareshal de Crequi in Lorraine, his Majefty intending to keep there 14000 Foot and 7000 Horse to be ready upon all occasions. The King, hath given to the Marquis de Berny, Son to Monfieur de Lionne lately deceased, the place of great Master of the Wardrobe, formerly possessed by the Marquis de Saissac, which is valued at about four hundred thousand Livers.

Cologne, September 17. Yesterday and this day are arrived here feveral new railed Men, and in a day or two we expect about 400 more, which will final ly compleat the Marquis de Gtana's Regiment. Out Magistrates having some days fince sent several Carts to fetch Barth without the Town', to be employed for the raifing our Fortifications, they were it feems met by a party of Horfe belonging to our Elector, fent out to that purpole, and by them, together with the Horles and Labourers carried away to Breuil, which hath fomewhat allarmed us here, whilft from thence we feem to discover, what the intentions of our Elector are towards us. We are told of the arrival of some Forces at Nuis, which that Elector hath lately taken into his fervice, fuppoled to be Lorrainers, who are to be quartered in that place,

which is firongly Fortifying on all fides. Falmouth, September 6. This day arrived here the Goldenhind of London in fix weeks from famaica, the Master tells us, that before his departure from thence, Sir Thomas Linch His Majesties Governor of that Island, was arrived there, and had caused the Artitles of Peace with the Crown of Spaine, to be proclaimed with the usual Solempity.

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
