A PROCLAMATION,

For the Apprehending Thomas Cart,

GEORGE R.

*W*Hereas a Warrant hath been issued by one of our Principal Secretaries of State, for Apprehending Thomas Cart, upon an Information given against him for High Treason; but the said Thomas Cart is absconded, and fled from Justice: We have therefore thought fit, by the Advice of our Privy Council, to issue this our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and commanding all our loving Subjects whatsoever, to discover and apprehend, and cause the said Thomas Cart (who is a Non-juring Clergyman, about Thirty Two Years of Age, of a middle Stature, a raw boned Man, goes a little stooping, a fallow Complexion, with full grey or blue Eyes, his Eye-lids fair inclining to red and commonly wears a light-coloured Peruke) to be discovered and apprehended, and to carry him before some of our Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrates of the County, Town, or Place, where he shall be apprehended; who are respectively required to secure him, and thereof to give speedy Notice unto our Privy-Council, or one of our Principal Secretaries of State, to the End he may be forth-coming, and be dealt withal, and proceeded against, according to Law. And whosoever shall Apprehend or Discover the said Thomas Cart, and bring him before such Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate, shall receive for Reward the Sum of One Thousand Pounds; which said Sum of One Thousand Pounds the Commissioners of our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly.

Given at our Court at Kensington, the Thirteenth Day of August 1722, in the Ninth Year of our Reign.

Venice, Aug 7. N. S. Last Week we had an Account from Leghorne, that the end of June there came before the Port of Malta five Sultanas, whose Commodore sent in a Letter by a French Tartan, demanding the Restitution of all the Turks there in Slavery, and signifying that he would expect the Answer at Tunis. This Account is confirmed by Letters come hither this Week from Malta of the 7th, and from Palermo of the 23d of last Month. It is believed here that the Turkish Fleet has left those Seas; for the Master of an English Ship which arrived here the Beginning of last Week reports, that in his Voyage he was several Days in the Channel between Sicily and Malta, turning from one side to the other, and did not see any Turkish Vessels there, nor any where else in his Passage hither. The freshest Letters here from Constantinople are of the 28th of June: They give an Account of the amicable Disposition the Grand Signior still continued in towards this Republick, and of the great Agitation that Court was in on Account of the Rebellion in Persia. These Letters add, that the Fleet which went from Constantinople on this Summer's Service, were only five Sultanas (which are their first Rate Men of War,) so that what Ships have joynd them since are from Tunis, Algiers, and Tripoli.

Cadix, Aug. 4. N. S. His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Winchester bound for Lisbon and England, and the Dursley Galley bound for the Streights, are both in this Bay.

Genoa. Aug. 11. N. S. His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Lime commanded by the Lord Vere, came hither from Leghorne on the 9th Instant, and the same Day sailed for Port Mahon.

Paris, Aug. 23. Yesterday the Cardinal Du Bois was declared Prime Minister, the Patent for that high Trust having been delivered to him by the Duke Regent in the King's Name; and this Morning he is to take the usual Oaths. It is said the Duke Regent, the Duke of Bourbon, and the Cardinal, will be constituted a Council, for the Instruction of the young King. Among the several things mentioned in the Cardinal's Patent, setting forth his great Abilities and Services, the first is his Negotiations for Settling and Securing the Tranquillity of Europe.

Kensington, Aug. 10. This Day his Excellency Count Staremberg, the Emperour's Ambassador and Minister Plenipotentiary had a private Audience of the young Princesses, to which he was introduced by Sir Clement Correll, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.
