Whitehall, September 10.

AN humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Wicklow, at an Assizes held at Wicklow the 10th Day of July 1722, having been transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Grafton Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has by him been presented to His Majesty.

Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Constantinople, July 15, O. S. The Advices which this Court receives from Persia are so various and uncertain, that they are resolved to send a Minister thither to be informed of the true State of Affairs in that Country. An Aga is accordingly appointed to set out in two Days for that Kingdom with a small Retinue; he carries with him Letters from the Grand Signior and Grand Vizier, both to the King of Persia and to the Chief of the Rebels, and is instructed, as we are informed, to offer his Mediation in case he finds a Disposition in both Parties to accept it; this Court being come to a Resolution, neither to take Advantage of the present Conjunction to make any Conquests upon Persia, nor to favour the Rebels against that King.

Lisbon, Aug. 25, N. S. The Spanish Ambassadour has lately had very frequent Conferences with the Secretary of State: The Subject of which is said to be the Relief of Malta in case the Turks should attack that Island; his Portuguese Majesty seeming to be more particularly engaged to give them his Assistance, since the Knights of Malta have chosen Don Antonio Manoel de Vilhena, a Nobleman of this Country, Great Master of their Order, in the Room of Sig. Antonio Zondodari, lately deceased.

Venice, Aug. 28, N. S. This Week we received Letters from Messina of the 10th Instant, N. S. giving an Account, that the five Turkish Ships of War which appeared off of Malta the End of June, were returned thither again, with 18 other Ships belonging to Algiers, Tripoli, and Tunis; and that their Commodore had sent a Message to the Great Master, demanding an Answer to the Letter he wrote him before, requiring the Restitution of all the Turks he had in Slavery; to which the Great Master had replied, that the Number of Christian Slaves in Turkey belonging to the Maltese, being much greater than that of the Turks now Captives in Malta, he hoped the Grand Signior would be so just as not to insist on the Restitution demanded. Letters from Rome advise, that the Maltese Ambassadour there had the same Account by an Express from Malta; upon the Arrival of which the Pope called an extraordinary Conistory, to deliberate on the Succours he could send to Malta, in case the Turks attempted to land there.

Genoa, Sept. 1, N. S. The 28th past arrived here his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Durdley Galley commanded by Captain George Purvis, in 21 Days from Cadiz. The Captain reports, that he saw the Spanish Squadron going into Alicant; and that in his Way he called at Port Mahon, where he left Commodore Scott, who was refitting his Britannick Majesty's Ship Dragon in order to come hither. Captain Purvis designs to sail for Gibraltar, as soon as the Weather will permit.

Hanover, Sept. 7. This Day died in the Eighty Ninth Year of his Age, M. Gerard Molan, Abbot of Lockumb, Primate of the States of this Dutchy, Director of the Churches and Clergy in the Electorate, Head of His Majesty's Ecclesiastical Court and Council there, and a Member of the English Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts. Notwithstanding his great Age, he enjoyed till his last Sickness, a firm Health, with a Vigour of Body and Mind equal to his laborious Employments. His great Abilities, the Prudence, Integrity, and indefatigable Application he shewed in discharging the Trust reposed in him, gained him the special Favour

of his Sovereign, the Love of those under his Care, and the Esteem of all that knew him. His profound Learning, exemplary Piety, and truly Christian Moderation, rendered him the Ornament of the German Evangelick Clergy; so that his Loss is universally lamented.

This is to signify in His Majesty's Name, that if any Person or Persons shall hereafter apprehend any one or more Highwaymen, who from and after the Date hereof shall have robbed any of the Mails, or shall have been concerned as Accomplices in the robbing of any of them, such Person or Persons shall have a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender, who shall be convicted thereof, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Post-Office, over and above the Reward directed by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person hereafter concerned in robbing any of the Mails shall make a Discovery of the same, so that his Accomplice or Accomplices shall be convicted thereof, such Person shall have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon, and also receive the Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender so convicted, to be paid as aforesaid.
