Signior Nerli hath likewife directions to return hither, his moft Christian Majelty, continuing his unwillingness to have him as Nuncio at his Court, whithes he was defigned. The Cardinal Ludovifio hath been very ill, as we likewife hear the Cardinal de Medicis Unkle to the great Duke of Tuscany is at Florence.
