St. James's, Dec. 10. An humble Address
of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Bailiffs,
Capital Burgessees, Common Council, Inhabi-
tants and Burgessees of the Corporation of Lan-
caster, has been presented to His Majesty by
Sir Thomas Lowther, Bart. one of their Re-
presentatives in Parliament, introduced by
the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount
Townshend one of His Majesty's Principal Se-
cretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Bailiffs, Burgessees
and Commonalty of Ipswich in the County of
Suffolk, has been presented to His Majesty by
Sir William Thompson, and the Honourable
Francis Negus, Esq; their Representatives in

Parliament, introduced by his Grace Charles
Duke of Grafton Lord Lieutenant of the said

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to re-
ceive very graciously.

Hambourg, Dec. 1. We have received from
Moscow, an Extract of a Letter written by
the Czar from Astracan the 27th of October,
to his Senate at Moscow, in which he gives
them an Account, That after he had possessed
himself of Derbent, he designed to have made
a further Progress, and therefore advanced to
the River Melukenty; but then a Disappoint-
ment happened, for in a Storm upon the Cas-
pian, 13 Ships laden with Provisions from
Astracan, were lost: It was hoped that Loss
would have been repaired by the Arrival of
a second Convoy under Captain Villebois, but
they had the same Fate as the other. Here-
upon the Store of Provisions he had with him
being examined, it was found, that there was
no more than would subsist his Army for one
Month, and that it was impossible to be time-
ly supplied from Astracan. Wherefore a Coun-
cil of War being held, in which it was con-
sidered that there was then no Enemy in that
Part of the Country, and that the Season was
far advanced, his Czarish Majesty resolved to
finish the Campaign for this Year. That he
had secured Derbent and Tarku by putting in-
to them strong Garrisons: That in his Return
coming to the River Zulach, he chose a pro-
per Situation for erecting a Fort on the
Side of it; and while the Work was in hand,
he detached a Leader of the Cossacks with
1000 Cossacks and 4000 Calmucks, to enter the
Territories of Prince Usmeis of Daguestan,
and of Sultan Mamuth of Ussemiche, who
had attacked his Troops in their March to
Derbent; which Detachment having laid
waste those Countries, joynd the Czar again
at Agracan. After which he ordered his Ca-
valry to march to Astracan, and having im-
barked with his Infantry in the Gulph of Agrac-
can, he arrived with the Czarina his Consort
at Astracan the 15th of October. His Czarish
Majesty concludes his Letter by saying that
he was satisfied with what he had done this
Campaign, having made himself Master of a
Town, and of a good Port on the Caspian Sea;
and that his Affairs requiring his speedy Re-
turn to Moscow, he expected the Senate would
take Care that Change of Horses and Carriages
might be in Readiness on the Road from As-
tracan thither.

Hague, Dec. 18. By Letters from Ratisbon
we have an Account, that the Emperour's Com-
missioners had proposed to the Dyet the gran-
ting eventually the Investitures of the Duke-
doms of Tuscany, Parma, and Placentia, pur-
suant

suant to the Quadruple Alliance; and that it was believed, the Consent of the Empire to his Imperial Majesty's granting those Investitures would soon be obtained.
