# BY THE QUEEN A PROCLAMATION DETERMINING THE SPECIFICATIONS AND DESIGN FOR A NEW SERIES OF ONE HUNDRED POUND AND TWENTY-FIVE POUND GOLD COINS; AND A FIVE POUND SILVER COIN ELIZABETH R.

Whereas under section 3(1)(a), (b), (c), (cc), (cd) and (d) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to determine the denomination, the design and dimensions of coins to be made at Our Mint, to determine the weight and fineness of certain gold coins, the remedy to be allowed in the making of such coins and the least current weight, and to determine the weight and composition of coins other than gold coins or coins of silver of Our Maundy money and the remedy to be allowed in the making of such coins, and to provide for the manner of measurement of the variation from the standard weight of coins:

And Whereas under section 3(1)(ff) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to direct that any coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount:

And Whereas it appears to Us desirable to order that there should be made at Our Mint a new series of coins of the denominations of one hundred pounds and twenty-five pounds in gold and five pounds in silver:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said section 3(1)(a), (b), (c), (cc), (cd), (d) and (ff), and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:

#### ONE HUNDRED POUND COIN

- 1. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of one hundred pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 31.210 grammes, a standard diameter of 32.690 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999.9, and being circular in shape.
- (2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter, specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
- (a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.105 grammes; and
- (b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.
- (3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
- (4) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 31.010 grammes.
- (5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:

For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "- ELIZABETH II  $\cdot$  D  $\cdot$  G  $\cdot$  REG  $\cdot$  F  $\cdot$  D  $\cdot$  100 POUNDS", and for the reverse a lion accompanied by a shield depicting Our Royal Arms with the inscription "FINE GOLD  $\cdot$  999.9  $\cdot$  2016 LION OF ENGLAND  $\cdot$  10Z" . The coin will have a grained edge.'

## TWENTY-FIVE POUND COIN

- 2. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of twenty-five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 7.800 grammes, a standard diameter of 22 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not more than 999.9, and being circular in shape.
- (2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
- (a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.025 grammes; and
- (b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.
- (3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
- (4) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 7.750 grammes.
- (5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:
- 'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "-ELIZABETH II  $\cdot$  D  $\cdot$  G  $\cdot$  REG  $\cdot$  F  $\cdot$  D  $\cdot$  25 POUNDS", and for the reverse a lion accompanied by a shield depicting Our Royal Arms with the inscription "FINE GOLD  $\cdot$  999.9  $\cdot$  2016 LION OF ENGLAND  $\cdot$  1/40Z" . The coin will have a grained edge.'

## **FIVE POUND COIN**

3. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 62.420 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of not less than 999.9 parts per thousand fine silver, and being circular in shape.

- (2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
- (a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.195 grammes; and
- (b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.
- (3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of coins.
- (4) The design of the said silver coin shall be as follows: 'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "- ELIZABETH II  $\cdot$  D  $\cdot$  G  $\cdot$  REG  $\cdot$  F  $\cdot$  D  $\cdot$  5 POUNDS", and for the reverse a lion accompanied by a shield depicting Our Royal Arms with the inscription "FINE SILVER  $\cdot$  999.9  $\cdot$  2016 LION OF ENGLAND  $\cdot$  20Z" .
- (5) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.
- 4. This Proclamation shall come into force on the eleventh day of February Two thousand and sixteen.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this tenth day of February in the year of our Lord Two thousand and sixteen and in the sixty-fifth year of Our Reign.
