

# The London Gazette.

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Falmouth, November 1.

**T**He 30 past came in here the *Fidelity* of *Topsham*, laden with Wines from the *Cannaries*, the Master tells us, of a very good Vintage they have had here this year. The same day imported the *Mary* of *London* from *Jamaica*, together with the *James* of *London* from *New York*, by whom we have an account, of the good and thriving condition of that Island.

*Truro, Novemb. 2.* We yet continue to hear of the sad effects of the late bad weather on these Coasts, and amongst others, have advice of a Vessel of *Bristol* which came from the *Barbados*, laden with the Commodities of those parts, to have been lately cast away at the *Lands End*, all the Men having been drowned, excepting onely a Boy, who was happily, and in a wonderful manner cast ashore.

*Plymouth, Novemb. 3.* Here are at present in Port the *Mary* and *Sara* of *Dover*, *James Brown* Master, laden with Lead for *Nantes*; the *Dolphin* a French man of War, who some days since put in here, being designed for *Havro de Grave* from the *Streights*, and the *Hope* of *Waterford* homeward bound.

*Lisbon, Octob. 14.* Monsieur *S. Romain*, Ambassador from the Crown of *France*, is at length embarked on one of the Men of War of the Count *d'Estrees* Squadron, in order to his return home. We are told of a Dutch Vessel taken some time since by the said Count *d'Estrees*, being, as is said, bound for *Sally* with Contraband Goods.

It is generally reported, that the Decree against the *Jews* may be published in few days, though with some mitigation, as not to relate, to the time past, but to look forward onely.

The Prince Regent hath been for some days indisposed, but is at present pretty well recovered again.

*Leghorne, Octob. 26.* The 20th instant departed hence the two Dutch Men of War that came from *Smirna*, together with the *Katherine*, an English Marchant-man, bound for *London*; and the next day arrived the *Friendship* from *England* and *Genova*, and may depart again in four or five days for *Smirna*, in company of two Dutch Men of War. Some days since came into this Port four Spanish Gallies, who carried the Duke of *Ferrandina*, from *Naples* to *Barcelona*; from whence they are now returned thus far on their way back for *Naples*.

*Madrid, Octob. 29.* We have certain advice now of the death of the Cardinal *Visconti* in *Sicily*, by which means, besides the Archbishoprick of *Montreal* in that Kingdom, valued at 60000 Crowns per Annum, there will at present be three places voyd at *Rome* in the Sacred Colledge; in the mean time the Queen Regent hath bestowed the Archbishoprick of *Montreal* on Father *Nitard*; formerly her Confessor, and at present at *Rome*; to whom her Majesty hath likewise sent Credential Letters, for the taking upon him the Character of Extraordinary

Ambassador at that Court, to soon as the Marquis *d'Asorgas* shall be removed to his Government of *Naples*, and till such time as the Marquis *de Lithe*, designed thither in that quality, from hence shall arrive there.

On Thursday last their Majesties were very magnificently entertained at *Saragosa* by the said Marquis *de Lithe*, who besides a Comedy and other divertissements had prepared several Bulls and Wild Boares, for the entertainment of their Majesties, some of them to be fought with by young Noble Men who had desired to give on this occasion proof of their Courage and Dexterity in the managing this Combat (which they very gallantly performed) and the rest to be baited by Dogs; with the whole their Majesties were pleased to express themselves very much satisfied, as did the rest of the Nobility that were present.

Here is lately arrived Signior *Salario* in quality of Envoy extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy*. From *Giurecho* in the *West Indies*, we have advice, that the report they had there, of the French having possessed themselves of a small Island in those parts, called *Lampedusa*, proves to have been without any ground.

*Cologh, Novemb. 6.* The last week all Moutchs here were full of the discourse of an accommodation, and that to be concluded out of hand, but at present they talk quite otherwise, and seem to say, that nothing can be expected but a rupture; the Deputies however, and especially those from the Circle of *Westphalia*, continue their endeavours with much diligence, in order to the reconciling these differences, which are the occasion of so much noise in these parts, and to that end, have lately framed a new project of Articles, by which they propose, that the Town should give the Elector a certain summe of Money, in lieu of his pretences on some Territories at present in our possession; That the differences now depending, should be determined by the ordinary way of Justice; And that the matter relating to some of the Inhabitants of this place, should be fairly heard and decided before Deputies to be to that end appointed, as well on the part of the Town, as of the Elector; And for farther security of our Peace, after such an agreement they seem to propose the Guaranty of the Emperor, and the whole Empire, which our Magistrates in such a case are most willing to accept of, but withal, would likewise have the States General of the United Provinces, included in the said Guaranty, so that this particular, besides the other Objections that are made to those Articles, may it is feared, discourage the Deputies from proceeding any farther in these new Proposals.

The Bishop of *Munster* continues still in these parts, performing, as is said, all good Offices, in order to the begetting a better understanding between us and our Elector. At *Roerroot* is suddenly, as we are told, to be held a Conference between the Deputies of the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, the Dukes of *Lunenburgh*, the Landgrave of *Hesse*, &c. on what account, is not said. We have had a discourse about Town, as if

our Magistrates had resolved to raise 4000 Men more for the strengthening this Garrison against all accidents.

**Brussels, Novemb. 12.** Our Governor the Count de Monterey, hath, as is said, received directions from the Court of Spain, concerning his procedure in the matter of French Wines, and other French Manufactures, which it was reported were to have been prohibited to be brought into these Countries. His Excellency hath for some time deferred his Journey towards Cambrey, Conden &c.

Yesterday arrived here the Dutchess of Macklesburgh from France, on her return home. From Antwerp they tell us, that Monsieur Courtin had passed that place on his way to Sweden, where he is to reside as Ambassador from the Crown of France.

From Liege they write, that several French Soldiers pass daily through those parts, in small Companies of 20 or 30 Men, Commanded by a Lieutenant or some other inferior Officer, towards Cologne; and there have been several French Companies of Militaries, who have lately bought up Armes for 2000 Men, as well Pikes as Musquets. The affairs of Cologne continue full of doubt and uncertainty.

**Hague, Novemb. 12.** The 17th instant the States of Holland will be assembled, in order to the giving their consents for the extraordinary expences of the next year: In the mean time the Council of State are framing their advice concerning the New Levies which will be certainly resolved on at the meeting of the States of Holland. Here is a report that the Heer Van Beverningh will go on the part of these States in quality of Extraordinary Ambassador to the Crown of England. The Heer Velt Marshall Wurff is gone for Holstejn, to look after some private concerns of his in those parts, in the mean time it is thought the States will consider of the Proposition he lately made to them concerning Precedency.

**Whitchall, Novemb. 7.** By Letters from Captain Holmes, from on-board the Diamond Frigate in Cadiz Road the 7th we have advicet, that having had notice of some Algerines being without the Streights, he arriv'd off of Cape Spart the 9 of September; supposing that to be the likeliest Nation for the intercepting those Corsairs; That the 24 he had Chance of one of them; and the advantage inuch in Sailings, but that he was so far from him when he began the Chace, that he could not possibly come up with him before night, at the appearance of which he lost sight of him: The next day he had sight of another of those Corsairs, with two Prizes, which he likewise gave Chace to, having the African Frigate in company, and came so fast upon the Turk, that he was forced to burn one of his Prizes, being a Flemish Ship, as he was informed, laden with Fruit; the other being a Galliot, the Turk row'd away, when night coming on, they lost sight of him: That that day, which was the date of this Letter, he had met with the Hull of a Vessel of about 70 Tuns English built, which it is thought their so warm Chace had obliged the Turk to quit; she had been laden with Malaga fruit, but the Vessel so disabled, that he was forced to sink her: That the second instant he met with two Brigantines, as they thought, of 50 Tuns, one of which steered Westward, the other Southward; the latter Capt. Holmes followed, and forced ashore about two Leagues to the Southward of Argona; where she was destroyed, the other in the mean time escaping him.
