Portsmouth, December 7.

**Y**esterday put in here through contrary winds a Dutch man of War, with several Merchant men, as well Dutch as English, under his Convoy from the *Streights*; the day before arrived here the *Greenwich* Pink of London, from *Alicant*, the Master tells us, that he touched at *Cadix*, and came thence the 10 past, in Company of some other Merchant men under the Convoy of the *Diamond* Frigate, on board of which, he reports, to be a considerable quantity of Silver, which they took in at *Cadix*; for the account of several Merchants of London.

*Florence, Novemb. 22.* The Count de Prado, late Ambassador from the Crown of Portugal at Rome, being arrived at Leghorne, on his return home from that Court, hath sent his Son hither to pay his respects to the Great Duke and Dutchess, by whom, he having been very kindly received, is returned again for Leghorne.

By a Vessel arrived at Leghorne from Palermo in Sicily, we have advice of the great scarcity of Corn in that Kingdom, insomuch, that for want of Bread, the people were ready to fall into great disorders. We have advice of one of our Gallies having lately with the assistance of an other of Maltha taken a very rich ship belonging to the Corsairs of Argiers.

*Madrid, Novemb. 25.* The sixth instant being his Majesties Birth day, who then compleated the Tenth year of his age, their Majesties, together with the whole Court, were entertained at the *Priora* with a Bull Feast, as likewise with several other sports and exercises usual on such Solemn occasions. Here is lately arrived at this Court the Marquis de Pescara, eldest Son to the Marquis del Vasto, a principal Family in the Kingdom of Naples, in order to the Consummating his Marriage with the Sister of the Marquis de Camaraça.

The Marquis del Fresno, designed Ambassador to the Crown of England, having received his necessary dispatches for that Embassy, and taken his leave of their Majesties, designs to part hence to morrow on his journey, which he intends to take by the way of France. From Malaga they write, of the third instant, that Captain Holmes continued to cruise about the *Streights* mouth; that they had advice from *Cadix*, of the arrival of Sir John Chicheley in the *Dreadnought* from England, on board of whom was the Countess of Middleton, going to his Excellency the Earl of Middleton at Tangier. From Lisbonne they tell us, that a servant of a certain Jew there, endeavoring to steal Hens out of the Nunnery at *Odivelas*, had been apprehended, and discovered to have been the Author of the late Sacriledg, committed in the stealing the Host out of the Parish Church of that place, by some Relicks he had about him, which were then lost out of that Church.

*Milan, Novemb. 25.* The Cardinal Litta our Archbishop, is at length arrived here from Rome,

having been received with all imaginable respect and kindness, as well by our Governor, as the rest of the Nobility of these Countries. Directions have been given by our Governor, for the Fortifying of several places on the Frontiers, and for the reintercing of several of the Garrisons there.

*Vienna, Novemb. 25.* On Sunday next are appointed Solemn Prayers to be used in all our Churches, on the occasion of the Empreffe's being with Child. We have of late had several Expresses from the Marquis de Grana at Cologne, and as many have been returned from hence with farther instructions, as the change of affairs there seemed from time to time to require. Our last Letters from thence told us, of the great appearance there was of an accommodation, and that it depended upon the Towns accepting of the Project of the Deputies of the Circle of *Westphalia*, which those Magistrates expressed some inclination to; since which, we have not heard farther, of the 8 Regiments, which as we had been before told, were ordered to march for the assistance of that place.

The affairs of Hungary continue much in one posture, there being still those who make it their business to allarme us daily with new designs and contrivances against his Imperial Majesty; in which they tell us, the Rebels are encouraged by the promised assistance of the Port, and more particularly by *Abafiz* Prince of *Transilvania*, who is ready to supply them with Men and Money; but whilst we cannot find that these reports are grounded upon any great appearance of Truth, we are the less concerned at them.

*Hamburg, Decemb. 9.* Some days since arrived here the *Laudtgravine* of Cassel from Copenhagen, where she hath been to visit the Queen her Daughter; and the 30 past went hence again on her return home. The Velt Marshal *Wurtz* is gone hence with several Foreign Officers for Holland, where they expect Service at the raising of the new Troops.

The Count de *Gonningsmark* continues his Leavies here with much vigor, having already compleated some of his Troops in those parts. From Warsaw they write, that their Majesties of Poland were in a day or two expected there; that they had advice from the *Ukraine*, that the Crown Army, which lay before *Kalnitke*, having been informed of the return of the Army of *Lithuania* home again, and that they could not expect any recruits for the reinforcing of their Troops, had quitted the Siege, and retired into their winter quarters, which it is feared, may much encourage *Dorosenko* to take this advantage, to settle his interests in those parts, which besides others, the Tartars seem very much underhand to favor.

*Paris, Decemb. 11.* The 7 instant their Royal Highnesses arrived here from St. Germain, having dined at St. Clou; that evening her Royal Highness was visited by all the Princesses of the Blood, and other Ladies of the chiefest quality, in Town; and the next day was Complimented by the *Prevost des-Merchants*, and the *Echevins* in the name of this City

It is said, that Monsieur de Louvois is to go the 15 of the next Month for Flanders, to visit our places and Fortifications in those Countries; in the mean time we are told, that the Chevaux Legers of the Kings Guard, are ordered to be ready in their respective Quarters the 15 instant; as likewise all the Officers of Foot to be in their several Garrisons, by the first of the next Month, both, on forfeiture of their employments.

The King hath been pleased to bestow the place of Premier Escuyer of the great Stable, on the Sieur de Fornac, voyd by the death of the Sieur de Bonelle his Brother, for which he is notwithstanding to pay 50 Thousand Crowns to the Duke de la Feuillade. From Stockholm they write of the 14 past, that Monsieur de Pomponne, Ambassador there from this Crown, intended to part thence the 20 instant, having had orders, not to expect the arrival of Monsieur Courtin, but to meet him on his way thither, in order to the informing him of several matters relating to that Embassy.

The Duke de Mortemar lyes very ill, insomuch, that there hath been already some discourse, concerning the giving his Government of this City, to the Marechal de la Ferté, on condition he quit his Government of Metz to the Marechal de Crequi. Yesterday their Majesties came to Versailles from St. Germain, where their Royal Highnesses intend likewise to be this Evening. We daily expect to hear from Rome of a promotion of Cardinals, which some seem to perswade his Holyness to defer yet for sometime, till there become more places voyd in the Sacred Colledge, that so the several pretenders may be at once gratified, for the avoyding all farther disputes; though in the interim, the general opinion is, that considering his Holyness great age, it may not be delayed so long, but be yet before Christmas. We are here in much uncertainty as to the affairs of Cologne, which we were one while told, to be pretty well advanced towards an accommodation, but now, our last Letters from thence speak quite contrary.

Brussels, Decemb. 11. On Tuesday last arrived an Extraordinary Courier from the Court at Madrid; and yesterday by the ordinary from thence, we had advice, that the Queen Regent had given orders for the remitting forthwith hither, a Million of Crowns, which we may now in few days expect from thence, with promise of farther assistance, both of Men and Money, as shall be found needful.

Yesterday in the Evening arrived here the Sieur de Risencourt from Cologne, and this afternoon had a private Audience of his Excellency the Count de Montecery; it is thought, his Errand may be to negotiate some matters relating to the Prince de Vaudemont, who is coming with a Regiment of Horse into the service of these Provinces. Since our last advices from Cologne, all the discourse is again of the succors to be sent thither, as well by the Emperor and the States General of the United Provinces, as from hence; it being said, that his Excellency has given orders for three Regiments to march immediately towards those parts.

To morrow or next day we expect here the Prince de Chimay from Luxemburg, where the Sieur de Louvoigny is to continue in chief pro interim. We are told of 25 Troops of Horse that are Comanded to be ready to march on the first orders, though whither; or upon what account, is not said. The Count de Charney is gone for Spain, whither several other persons of quality of these Countries are preparing to follow, on a Vessel his Excellency is sending from Ostend, with a very noble and rich Coach, which hath been made here for the Queen Regent.

His Excellency hath caused about 150 Reformed Officers to be drawn out of the Walloon Regiments, to be employed as we are told, in the new Leavies. Here are Letters in Town from Lille, which tell us, that the Marechal d'Humieres Governor of that place, had lately, according to the directions he had received from his most Christian Majesty in that behalf, caused the Burreau at Warneton, erected there some time since by the French, to be taken away; but of this we expect by our next Letters from those parts to have a farther account.

Hague, Decemb. 15. The States of Holland, having been altogether employed this week, in debates concerning the affairs of his Highness the Prince of Orange; they have made no great progress in the other publick matters, which though of great importance, are not, as is said, to be brought on the Bord, before this concerning the making his Highness Captain General and Admiral be first determined; yesterday the several Deputies went home to consult their respective Principals therein, at whose return, we may expect to hear farther. Some Propositions have been made by the Deputies of Utrecht for the Fortifying that place, in order to their farther defence and security. The States of Holland having written to the Veit Marshal Wurtz at Hamburgh, concerning his late Proposals, he is accordingly on his way hither.

From Hambrough they tell us, that the Count de Conningsmark continues very busy in those parts, for the completing his Leavies for his most Christian Majesties service: And that the Dukes of Littenburgh are likewise raising Men.

Whitehall, Decemb. 9. On Wednesday last dyed here the Lady Katherine, his Royal Highnesses youngest Daughter, being about ten Months old; and on Friday in the evening was privately Ingered in King Henry the Sevenths Chappel at Westminster.

Disso, 10. His Majesty hath been pleased instead of Daniel Haynes Esquire, to appoint John Loder Esquire to be Sheriff of Berks.

Whereas a Brief hath of late been carried about the Country, for the repaying a pre ended Losse of Fire at Tansey in Derbyshire, it appears at present by the Testimony of Sir John Twiss, and Mr Low, Justices of the Peace of that County, under their Hands and Seals, bearing date the twentyeth of October last past, That the Certificate, by means of which the said Brief was obtained, was Forged, for which one George Foxcroft had been apprehended, and found Guilty at the Sessions held for the City of London: And by another Certificate of several of the Principal Inhabitants of Stensley aforesaid, that there had happened no such Fire, or were living any such Persons as were mentioned in the said Forged Certificate; Of which we have been directed to give this Notice, to the end, peoples Charity might not be abused in this particular, and that the Authors of this Forgery being discovered, may be brought to Condidgn punishment.
