HIS Day the Knights Brethren of the most ancient and most noble Order of the Thistle, being summoned to attend at a Chapter of that Order, to fill up the Stalls that were vacant by the Deaths of the late Marquess of Lothian, Earl of Tankervile, and Duke of Athol; His Majesty was pleased for this Time to dispence with the Formality of their appearing in their Robes, and only held a private Chapter of the Order in his Closet, where the Right Honourable the Earls of Essex and Dalkeith had the Honour to be invested with the Green Ribbon by the Hands of the Sovereign, and by a particular Dispensation, were allowed forthwith to wear the Star of the Order; and at the same, the Sovereign was also pleased by Commission to appoint the Right Honourable Alexander Earl of Marchmont, His Majesty's first Ambassadour and Plenipotentiary at the Congress at Cambray, to be invested with the said Order, which will speedily be sent to him.

St. James's, the 5th Day of February, 1724. His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint Richard Smith of Padbury, Esq; Sheriff of the County of Bucks.

Madrid, Jan. 22, N. S. Some Days ago an Auto de Fé was held at Cuença, when (among others) Doctor Zapata, a famous Physician of this Town, who was seized about three Years ago by the Inquisition and kept in close Prison, received his Sentence; by which he was condemned to a Year's Penance, to be during that Time instructed by some learned Divine, half of his Money and Effects consistated, and to be banished for ten Years from residing in this or any other of the chief Cities in Spain. On the 16th Instant the Marquess de Almonaci and Castel Rodrigo died suddenly, being upwards of 80 Years of Age: He was the oldest Counsellour of State, and was formerly Master of the Horse to the Queen of Spain, which Employment he could not attend for several Years past by reason of his Instrmities: He has left great Part of his Estate to the Children of the late Prince Pio, whose Mother he had married. The 20th Instant being the Birth-Day of the Instante Don Carlos, there was a great Appearance at the Pardo of all the foreign Ministers and the Nobility to pay their Compliments to their Catholick Majesties on that Occasion. Letters from Cadiz of the 15th Instant advise, that the two Spanish Men of War, the Brandon and Oneto, so long designed to go to the West-Indies to cruize against the Pyrates in those Parts, sailed out of that Port the 14th Instant with a Register-Ship and two Advice Boats, under the Command of the Count de Clavijo.
