THE Beginning of this Month the Pope's Nuncio went to St. Ildefonso, where on the 5th Instant he performed in the Pope's Name, the Ceremony of giving the Possession of the Abbey which the King has erected there, to Don Domingo Guerra Father Confessor to the Queen, conferring on him the Title of Abbot of St. Ildefonso, with Preeminences and Honours equal to a Bishop, and with the Income of one Thousand Ducats a Year; the said Father having refused to admit of any greater Revenue, which his Catholick Majesty was desirous to grant. The Countess d' Oropesa having been restored to the Enjoyment of all the Estates of that Family (which were confiscated on Account of her Husband's following the Emperour's Party in the late War,) has been at St. Ildefonso, where she kissed the King and Queen's Hands, and was very graciously received by them. The Employment of Lord Steward of the King's Household, which was become vacant by the Death of the Duke of Escalona, has been granted by his Catholick Majesty to the Count of St. Estevan de Gormaz eldest Son and Heir of the deceased: And the Command of a Troop of Guards which the said Count has quitted, is given to the Duke of Ossuna. His Catholick Majesty has declared, that on the 27th Instant he will come hither, in order to be present at the Bull Feast which is to be performed in the Plaza-Mayor on the 30th. On the 9th Instant the Count de St. Estevan del Puerto (late Ambassadour and Plenipotentiary of Spain at the Congress of Cambray) arrived here, and the next Day went to St. Ildefonso to wait on their Catholick Majesties. This Day arrived a Courier from Vienna, with the Original Ratifications of the late Treaty of Peace between the Emperour and Spain. The Marquess Mari sailed from Cadiz some Days ago with a Squadron of five Ships of War, and having been joined by six Gallies at Malaga, proceeded for Barcelona.

Paris, July 24, N. S. On the 19th Instant the Articles of Marriage between the King and the Princess Mary Daughter of King Stanislaus, were signed here by the Keeper of the Seals of France, the Marshal Duke of Villars, the Count de Maurepas Secretary of State, the Count de Morville Minister and Secretary of State, and M. Dodun, Comptroller General of the Finances, commissioned by his Majesty for that Purpose; and by the Count de Tarlo for King Stanislaus: And on the 26th Instant the Duke of Orleans sets out Post for Strasbourg, having a Procuracy from the King to marry that Princess in his Majesty's Name. We have Advice, that the Duke de Richelieu Ambassadour of France to the Emperour, is arrived at Vienna. On the 20th Instant the Count de Cereff Brancas set out from hence, being appointed Ambassadour to the Court of Sweden.
